Britain Saved Egypt From  
Israel Eight Years Ago

WASHINGTON AP—The story came light Sunday of a dramatic New Year's Eve dash by a U. S. ambassador to deliver a British ultimatum that forced Israel to withdraw its troops from Egyptian soil in 1948-49.

James G. McDonald, first U. S. ambassador to Israel, delivered the message, according to testimony released by the Senate Armed Services and Foreign Relations committees. McDonald credited it with "saving" Egypt from defeat at the time.

McDonald said that in December, 1948, Israeli troops were about to cut off the Egyptian army at El Arish and near Gaza and needed only 48 hours to complete their encirclement.

On the afternoon of Dec. 31 McDonald said he received "a top secret urgent telegram" from the state department ordering him to deliver to Israel's Premier David Ben-Gurion "an ultimatum from the British government that unless the Israel troops at once withdrew from Sinai, Britain would enter the war against Israel."

Strikes It Rich

OTTAWA (CP)—Nathan E. Tanner, former Alberta mines minister, cleaned up paper profits in the hundreds of thousands of dollars when the stock of Trans-Canada Pipe Lines Ltd. went on the market last week.

The stock went on the market at a nominal \$10 a share—boosting the value of Mr. Tanner's investment automatically by about \$10,000—and is being traded unofficially over the counter at prices ranging into the \$15-\$20 range. Tanner took up 55,000 common shares.

The prospectus also states that Mr. Tanner, making \$10,000 a year as minister when he quit the Alberta government five years ago, now gets \$35,000 as Trans-Canada's president.

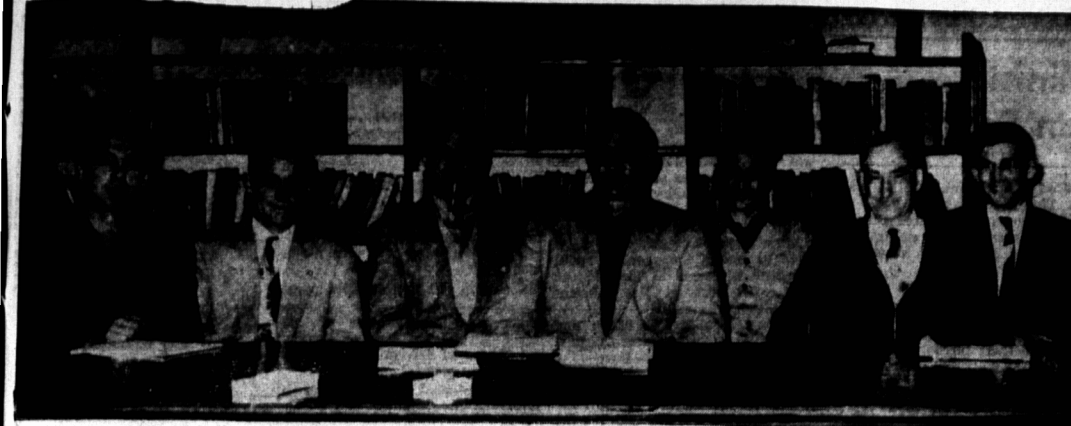
In addition, he is guaranteed a "retirement allowance" of \$15,000 a year for five years after he leaves the company. And he also is assured of his presidency—unless he wants to drop out—up to March 9, 1959.

S'side Legion Presses M.P.  
To Back Pension Increase

A resolution was approved at the monthly general meeting of the Summerside branch of the Canadian Legion held Monday evening, requesting J. Watson MacNaught, M.P. to stimulate action in Parliament in support of the request of the Dominion Executive Council of the Canadian Legion, in its demands for increases in disability pensions and for war veterans allowances. The meeting was held in the Legion Home and presided over by Com. Dr. H.B. MacNeill.

In proposing the resolution, Com. Lorne Monkley, Immediate Past President of the branch, reiterated his recent criticism of the Dominion Command executive for not presenting their request for increases to the government with more vigor. He referred the members to an article in the February edition of "The Legionary" written by Dominion President David Burgess, in which the writer points out that in 1920 a cleaner or helper in the Civil Service got \$900 a year, by a 100 per cent pensioner. Today the same Civil Service employee gets \$2,780 but the pensioner receives only \$3,500 or \$260 a year less than the civil servant. This means, states Mr. Burgess, that the pensioner is not even enjoying the standard of living which he had in the early 1920's. The increases in his pension do not nearly compensate for the rise in prices since 1920 and are totally inadequate today.

NO ACTION  
The Legion's November brief to the Government asked for an increase of 33-1/3 per cent in pension rates, but to date no action has been taken. Com. president MacNeill stressed the importance of the brief to the Government and the member of Parliament supporting the resolution and added "If we want to get anything we'll have to fight for it."

The late Rev. John Archibald MacDonald was born in Hamilton district, Indian River Parish, May 26, 1881, the son of the late John Alex MacDonald and his wife, the former Annie MacKelvie. He received his primary education at the district schools in Hamilton and Rustico.

He entered S.D.U. in 1900, and commenced his theological studies at the Grand Seminary, Quebec, in 1905. He was ordained in St. Mary's Church, Souris, October 25, 1906, by Bishop J.C. MacDonald, fourth Bishop of Charlottetown.

For a time following his ordination at Souris, he was Curate in that parish. From 1919 to 1931, he was pastor at St. Mark's, Lot 7. In 1931 he was appointed Parish Priest at Tignish, until an accident, suffered around Easter 1935, from which he never recovered fully, required him to retire.

He is survived by two sisters, Mrs. C.H. Hickey, Calgary, Alberta, and Mrs. W.P. Callaghan, Summerside.
