

MISCELLANEOUS NEWS.

The Governor-General and Princess Louise will visit Quebec on June 4th. Bismarck has requested the Emperor to grant him a furlough of seven months. There is a large quantity of counterfeit 25 and 50 cent pieces in circulation at Halifax. President Grevy has signed a decree pardoning another batch of four hundred Communists. One white and five colored prisoners were publicly whipped at Newcastle, Del., on Saturday last. The work of grading the grounds at Halifax for the provincial exhibition buildings is now being proceeded with. A cargo of sheep landed by a steamer from Boston at Thameshaven on the 16th instant was found to be effected with scab. Negotiations are proceeding for a commerce treaty between Germany and Japan on the model of the Japanese treaty with the United States. It is a terrible thing to be in debt. If a man owes you a small sum of money you can always know he feels bad about it though he never mentions the subject. The United States consul at Lyons reports the crops in the Rhone valley very unpromising. The demand for American wheat will probably exceed that of last year. Iowa girls are decisive and terse. A Nebraska man sent an offer of marriage to one of them the other day, and got for an answer this telegram: "Come on with your minister." The story stops here, but of course he went on. The rumour of the approaching signature of a concordat between Germany and the Vatican is denied. It is stated that Germany will not accept the Vatican's proposals. Negotiations for a *modus vivendi* are proceeding, but an early result is not expected. The United States commercial agent at Aix-la-Chapelle sends favourable reports in regard to the increasing demand for American products in Belgium and Germany. He recommends an increased effort to introduce American cooking stoves into Germany. This year nearly 800,000 Frenchmen will actually serve with the colors for a longer or shorter period. Of these 470,000 belong to the active army, 144,570 men and 2,850 officers to the reserve of the active army, and 117,800 men and 6,820 officers to the territorial army. TWO MEN BLOWN TO PIECES.—A terrible accident occurred at the quarry of Gooch and Bragdon, Biddeford, Me., on Monday afternoon, by which to men, George Littlefield, foreman, and Eli Ayer, were blown up and fearfully mangled. They undertook to drill out an old "Lewis" hole when the charge ignited, with terrible results. Littlefield had both arms, nose, and top of his head blown off, and must die. Mr. Ayer lost one arm, and his face was badly bruised and burned. The appointment of Sir Garnet Wolseley to the chief command of the British forces in South Africa may be taken as an indication that the Government is not satisfied, with Lord Chelmsford's conduct of the campaign, and that no effort is to be spared to bring the Zulu war to a successful termination. Gen. Wolseley's success in the campaign against the King of Ashante, and his excellent reputation as a tactician point him out as the most suitable person to bring the Zulu war to a close. While he will be ready to take the offensive in the field promptly, he has full power to treat with the Zulu King for peace. It is to be hoped that he may soon be able to bring the matter to a happy termination. The revenues of the city of Paris are swelled in various ways. One of these is a sum of \$44,000 paid by the proprietors of restaurants and cafes for the right of placing chairs and tables upon the pavement in front of their establishments, and about half as much is paid by the owners of shops for exhibiting their goods outside their windows. The book stands which are placed upon the parapet of the Seine, and the book cleaners and commissionaires contribute to this latter sum. The tariff for them is not a high one, but some of the proprietors of restaurants and cafes pay as much as fifty francs per metre for the privilege. All the unoccupied corners of streets and public buildings, where rubbish would otherwise be shot, are utilized, and the municipality obtains \$9,000 for permission to erect stalls there for the sale of knick-knacks. A much larger revenue is derived from the kiosks in which the newspapers are sold. Fifty francs is paid for each kiosk, of which there are over three hundred.
