S'side Students Register Today

SUMMERSIDE — Registration of students attending Summerside elementary and high schools will commence today, although classes will not begin until next Tuesday, September 8.

Grade One students with birth certificate and proof of vaccination will be enrolled this morning commencing at 9 a.m., while the Grade Two students will be enrolled this afternoon at 2 p.m.

Grade Three will register on Wednesday morning. Grade Four on Wednesday afternoon. Grade Five on Thursday morning, and Grade Six on Thursday afternoon. Grades Seven and Eight on Friday morning. Grades Nine, 10, 11, 12, and commercial classes will be enrolled on Friday afternoon.

Although about a half dozen new classrooms have been added within the elementary school, two others in the auditorium basement, and three more in the basement of the high school, more than 700 students from the now closed St. Mary's Academy are expected to combine with the normal enrollment of the schools in taxing the available classroom accommodation to capacity.

Although sufficient additional teachers have been hired to provide tuition for all the students who will be attending the school, it is understood that students in Grades 1 and 2 will be attending staggered classes.

Half of them will be attending morning classes and the remainder attending afternoon classes, alternating each month so that morning classes in these grades in September will be attending afternoon classes in October, and the September afternoon classes will attend morning classes in October, in grades one and two.

Building Site Is Prepared

SUMMERSIDE — Removal of old buildings to make way for Sobey's Summerside Supermarket is progressing on schedule, under the supervision of Trueman Jerrey of Summerside. His crew expects by Wednesday night to have completed the removal of lumber and foundation material from the site of the former MacNeill Motors building which has been completely torn down. Much of the lumber has been salvaged and sold for other local construction.

Prince Co. Plowing Match Has Expanded Entry List

O'LEARY — The second Prince County Plowing Match is scheduled to get underway Thursday morning at O'Leary. Present indications are for a considerable expansion in the events inaugurated last year and held in conjunction with Achievement Day for the O'Leary 4-H Calf Club.

Entries in the various plowing events, pretty well confined to the O'Leary district last year, are coming in from all districts of the county and this year's champion is expected to compete for Island honors at the provincial match.

A tractor rodeo, junior sports and other competitions are included in the day's program which will conclude with a dinner given by the Community Hospital Ladies Aid.

The official opening is planned for two o'clock with prominent speakers in attendance. The plowing match will be held on a farm owned by the chief supervisor Therin Ellis. Other officials are Raynall MacNeill, president and Alvin Palmer, vice-president.

Postmaster General To Visit P.E.I. Today

The Postmaster General of Canada, Hon. William Hamilton, is scheduled to arrive in the province at noon today via M.C.A. from Moncton Landing at Summerside he will make a tour of postal facilities in that town and meet with local department officials.

Late this afternoon he will travel to Charlottetown by postal staff car accompanied by F. A. Coyle, area superintendent of the Post Office department with headquarters in Charlottetown. On his Maritime tour Mr. Hamilton is being accompanied by J.B. Montague, Moncton, regional director of postal services and F.E. Ketchum, Saint John, N. B., district inspector.

While in Summerside representations are being made to the Postmaster General regarding the institution of a home delivery service. On numerous occasions attempts have been made to have this service put into operation in the Summerside area.

With the construction of the Hillcrest Park and several new homes it is felt the Summerside area should now qualify for this public service.

At the Summerside airport Mr. Hamilton will be met by O.H. Phillips, M.P. for Prince and other members of the Conservative party along with Mr. Coyle and either Charles I. Peters, Summerside, postmaster or the acting postmaster Eric MacKay.

On Wednesday forenoon Mr. Hamilton will tour the postal department offices in Charlottetown and confer with a number of the local employees and officials.

No one but yourself will know how you vote — not even the officials and agents in the polling booth.

HOW TO MARK YOUR BALLOT

1. On receiving your ballot, or ballots, proceed to the private compartment in the polling station.
2. Mark an X with black lead pencil (not pen) within the space between the dark lines containing the name of the candidate for whom you intend to vote.
3. Fold the ballot paper so that the initials and stamp on the back of it and the number on the counterfoil can be seen without opening it.
4. Hand the ballot paper, still folded, to the Deputy Returning Officer.
5. Remain until the Deputy Returning Officer places the ballot without unfolding it in the ballot box.
