Noted Scientist Arrives To Deliver The Robertson Lecture

Dr. O.M. Solandt, former President of the National Research Council and now Asst. Vice President of the Canadian National Railways, arrived Wednesday evening to deliver the Robertson Memorial Lecture at Prince of Wales College tonight. He was accompanied by Mrs. Solandt. Dr. and Mrs. Solandt were met in Moncton by Mr. George Greenough, Island Superintendent of the C.N.R. and they were met on arrival in Charlottetown by Dr. Frank MacKinnon, Principal of Prince of Wales College and Dr. L.E. Prowse, President of the P.E.I. Medical Association. The lecture will be delivered at 8:30 p.m. Dr. Solandt will be introduced by Dr. MacKinnon and thanked by Dr. Prowse. As a physician Dr. Solandt is noted as one of the leaders of his profession in Canada. The subject of his lecture will be "Scientific Research in the Modern World" and he is noted for his popular presentation. The public is cordially invited to attend.

Hard Of Hearing Ass'n Meets

A meeting of the Hard of Hearing Association was held on March 27, 1957 at the Visual Education Board, Prince of Wales College and three very interesting and instructive films were shown to the members through the kindness of Mr. Stanley M. McInnis.

Following this the meeting was called to order and the Secretary read the minutes of the previous meeting, held on February 25th, which were adopted. On business arising out of the minutes the Secretary reported that on February 28th he had talked to Mr. J.E. Ramsay, Acoustic representative from Halifax and had been assured that second hand aids are available free of charge through any of the service clubs, such as the Kinmen Club to children of families unable to obtain new aids. Also Mr. Ramsay agreed to address the Association sometime in April or May at which time he would demonstrate the use of the audiometer and also the various types of hearing aids. A discussion followed on membership fees which it was suggested might be one dollar yearly but this was left over to the next meeting.

A lengthy discussion followed on ways and means of enrolling into the Association all those in Charlottetown and vicinity who have a hearing loss. It was moved and seconded that Mrs. P.J. Proud, 98 Upper Hillsboro Street, act as chairman of the enrollment committee and any and all interested persons were asked to contact her. Unemployment Insurance Regulations Re Fishermen

Under the new unemployment insurance regulations, effective April 1, 1957, those employed in the fishing industry become eligible for the protection afforded by unemployment insurance. Fishermen begin paying contributions into the unemployment insurance fund on April 1, 1957, and the first seasonal period during which benefits will be paid begins on January 1, 1958. For purposes of the Unemployment Insurance Act, the term "Fishing" includes the gathering of sea products such as Irish Moss and shellfish, as well as the catching of fish.

All commercial fishermen are insurable, except for the few cases noted below. A fisherman is insurable whether he works as a wage earner, on shares, or is self-employed. He is insurable no matter how large his earnings in the year, and even though he is an officer in the company employing him.

In the following cases, a fisherman is not insurable. He is not insurable in respect of fish he sells directly to householders, restaurants, etc. He is not insurable in respect of fish scales he sells to anyone other than the buyer of his fish. He is not insurable in regard to seal fishing, unless he is employed under a contract of service. A buyer of fish is not insurable.

Construction of an addition to the rear of the Island Telephone Company's building in Summerside has been announced and tenders are now being called for the extension which will be 41 feet deep, 24 feet in width and two stories in height. After construction is completed a micro-wave system will be installed with an 80-foot steel tower for supporting the reflectors. It is anticipated that the job will take about three months to complete.
