NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

Ottawa and Foreign News.

OTTAWA, April 23.

The Special Committee on Chinese Immigration met this forenoon, and examined Mr. Dewdney, M. P. He expressed generally a favorable opinion of the Chinese, and was not opposed to their being employed on our public works. The only danger he apprehended was their coming over in too large numbers.

A caucus of Conservative Senators is said to have been held on Saturday last for the purpose of considering the question of Cabinet representation in that House.

A conference of legal members was held this morning with reference to the Supreme Court. They proposed that there should be three fixed sittings of the Court to be held on the third Tuesday in February, the second Tuesday in June, and the first Tuesday in October.

It is probable that the Minister of Justice will incorporate a clause to this effect in the Bill now before Parliament amending the practice of the Court.

There was a meeting of Conservative Senators on Saturday afternoon to discuss the representation of this body in the Cabinet.

After considerable consultation it was arranged that things should remain as at present.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 23.

A peasant has been arrested with a letter containing a plan of attack upon the winter palace and the prison in which Solovieff is confined.

Although the letter was probably a hoax, the garrison was called out.

The Czarowitch has received anonymous letters warning him to go abroad. Murders continue.

The Russian Government find it impossible to secure porters to guard the doors of houses and prevent the posting of placards in St. Petersburg, because the Nihilists threaten with death all who undertake the service.

Gen. Gourko seems to have been removed from the Dictatorship of St. Petersburg because of the impracticable nature of his orders.

LONDON, April 23.

The Khedive will yield to the demands of England and France, that he hand the portfolios of Finance and Public Works to English and French Ministers.

Our Washington Letter.

GRAND SUCCESS OF FINANCIAL POLICY—A DISINFECTING INVENTION.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 19, 1879.

The grand success of the financial policy thus far pursued by Secretary Sherman is the wonder of Washington, and even the Greenbackers and inflationists are free to admit that it is a surprise to them, and an achievement "worthy of a better cause." The fact is, the success is due to no one man and no party, but is the result of returning confidence in business and the ability of the Government to meet its obligations. Sec'y Sherman announces to-day that Department's circular No. 60, of April 16, 1879, is hereby rescinded, all the 4 per cent. bonds therein offered for sale having been sold. The ten dollar refunding certificates will hereafter be exchanged for lawful money, in sums not to exceed \$100 at one time, by the Treasurer and Assistant-Treasurers of the United States, and by all public officers bonded for that purpose. They will not be issued hereafter upon the certificate of any national bank depository. Commissions on such exchanges heretofore or hereafter made will be allowed at the rate of one-eighth of 1 per cent. on an aggregate of \$1,000, without regard to the period in which such exchanges are made. These announcements indicate that the Government is now in a condition to run economically by saving a large amount of money now paid for extra interest on the 10-40 bonds. After the 1st of July these will be replaced by 4 per cent. bonds, and the work of refunding will have been completed, so far as it can be done, for several years.

The debates in the Senate and House go on interrupted by the public business, Republicans and Democrats alike seeming bent upon making campaign thunder rather than to hasten the essential work of the session. It looks now as if the 4th of July might be celebrated with congressmen at the Capital.

The only bill finally passed this session is that making an appropriation for the refrigerating and disinfecting ships to protect Southern ports from yellow fever. The ship will be ready for work by July 1st, probably. I should not fail to mention that the success of the plan of Professor Gangee, who is the inventor of the process to be applied by this vessel, has inspired a private company to organize for the construction of another vessel supplied with his apparatus for making ice to furnish the markets of cities on the lower Mississippi. They anticipate that this will also, in an emergency, prove of general good as a sanitary agent. I should not forget also to mention that Prof. Gangee is the gentleman who, for several years, investigated the causes, and tried to ascertain the cure for the cattle diseases which have so troubled the country. The information thus gained is likely to save the Government a large sum of money. Commissioner Le Duc, of the Agricultural Department, has asked Congress for \$250,000 to do the same work which has already been done. Prof. Gangee at once went to Congress and denounced the demand as a job, and recommended that the inquiry be entrusted to the National Board of Health, who will do the work for one-eighth the sum demanded by LeDuc. This is a commendable move, and will probably be endorsed by Congress.

The Republicans are first in the field with their campaign work. A joint caucus of Senate and House was held by them last night when a Congressional campaign committee was announced.
