Startling Predictions.

Professor M. G. ... Geological survey, who personally visited Charleston to investigate the earthquake and its causes, stated in a lecture last night that the area extended from Canada to Cuba, and from the Mississippi to the B. ...

He added the prediction that in the case of an earthquake, displacement and earthquakes go together, that the Eastern United States are in danger, for displacement is now in progress at a rate so astonishingly rapid as to occasion surprise that earthquakes are not more frequent, and in curious and unconscious defiance of the inevitable, the cities of Pittsburgh, Richmond, Fredericksburg, Washington, Baltimore, Fort Deposit, Wilmington, Philadelphia, Trenton and New York have been located on the very line of displacement.

The Biggest and the Fastest.

The International Navigation company, of Philadelphia has entered into a contract with the Lairds, of Birkenhead, England for an ocean steamship of 8,500 tons. The vessel will be 500 feet long, 62 feet beam 43 feet deep of hold, and will have engines of 17,000 horse power. She will be the largest steamer afloat when completed and will run between New York and Liverpool. It has been made a condition of the contract that she will be the fastest vessel engaged in the transatlantic or any ocean service, and the specifications have been approved by the British admiralty as coming up to the requirements for armed cruisers. The hull will be of steel and she will be divided into longitudinal as well as transverse bulkheads which are a new arrangement and will make the vessel practically unsinkable. She is to have first class accommodations for 350 state rooms, in addition to large intermediate and steering passengers. The International company is chartered by this state, and now owns the Red Star and Lunenburg steamers, in addition to the Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois of the American line. James A. Wright is the president and Clement A. Grisoom, vice-president of the company. Philadelphia Times.

Morbid Impulses.

What is the cause of a person having a feeling as though he had to jump or throw himself down, while standing near the edge of the wall of a high building, or place forty or fifty feet above the ground? This question is asked of the editor of the Herald of Health, and his answer in the journal is as follows: "This feeling is due, we think, to a sudden confusion of mind produced by the new situation in which one finds himself when brought to survey the prospect from a lofty elevation. It is a change in relation to one's surroundings that seems at first to set experience at fault, and the faculties of perception, therefore, are at first disturbed and out of co-ordination. Size, weight, locality, etc., in many persons may require time to adjust themselves to the new conditions. Men who are accustomed to work at great elevations—roofers, painters, etc.—do not as a rule suffer from such morbid sensations, because their faculties have become educated to the relations of altitude."

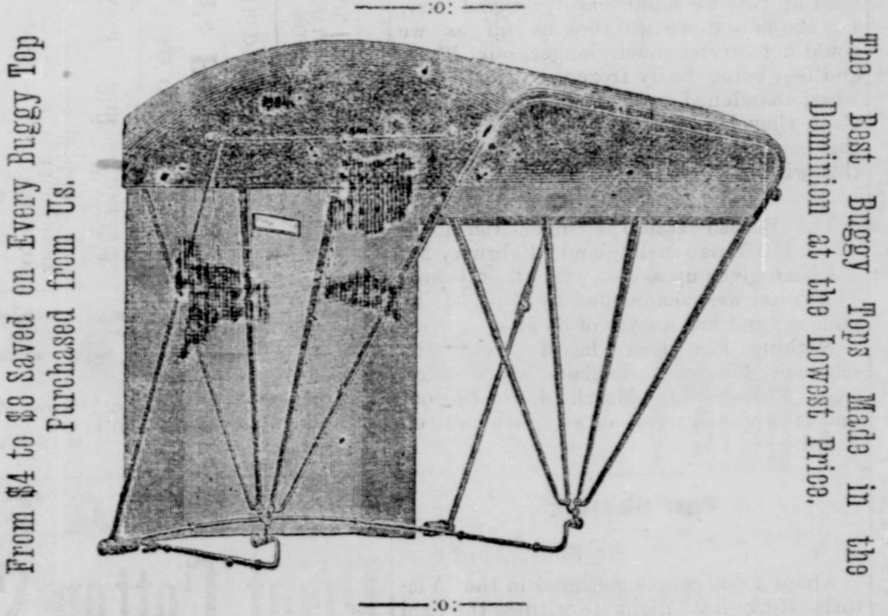
