Lenten Meditation

From The Columns of The Times, London TEMPTATION AND FAITH

Out of the many attempts that have been made to interpret the meaning of the interior struggle recorded in the story of the temptation in the wilderness certain points emerge as generally agreed. The issue at stake is the working out of a vocation. That he is called to a unique task, that he is himself the bearer of a unique responsibility, and indeed a unique character, Jesus knows. But how charged and that character expressed is as yet uncertain.

The vivid pictorial forms in which the temptations are described almost certainly represent three possible conceptions of the role of Messiah which spring from the current religious and political expectations of the time. The ordinary man might well draw the immediate inference that the story will have little light to throw upon the problems with which he finds himself confronted in his own personal or public life; he would be mistaken. For behind the specific forms which the temptations derive from their contemporary Jewish setting there lies a single moral issue which it is safe to say is not greatly altered either by the passage of time or

by any change of locality. The really significant phrase in the whole narrative is to be found in the answer which Jesus returns to the suggestions made in the third temptation in Luke's version: "Thou shalt not tempt the Lord thy God." The words are a quotation from the very early passage in the record of Hebrew history. It is not surprising, therefore, to find that the idea of "God-tempting" has a long history. The three temptations are proposals which, in one way or another, suggest to Jesus that he can fulfil his destiny by taking a short cut, by adopting a policy which will force God's hand, by striking a bargain on his own terms. Is that a temptation which belongs only to the first century?

There are few among those whose religion is a reality who would not admit that it is among the most common and the most deadly of the assaults which gentleness and faith in God has to resist. The nature of its deadliness is plain. It is precisely the denial of faith. It is refusal to trust. It is the one thing which we may not do, for it is making God a means to our ends.
