A SERIOUS CHARGE.

The Patriot charges that "The Examiner is neither generous nor just to Sir Louis Davies." This is a serious charge,—if seriously made and well sustained. It is good policy, as well as good manners, to render honor to whom honor is due; for honor is the delight of able men and such men ought to be encouraged to enter and remain in the public service. A newspaper which fails to do justice and to be generous to the public men of the country is, therefore, to be contemned.

But let us see what ground there is for the charge of injustice and lack of generosity as preferred by the Patriot against THE EXAMINER. The Patriot seconded a suggestion that Sir Louis Davies should be accorded a public non-partizan reception on the sole ground of Sir Louis' eloquence. THE EXAMINER ridiculed this reason, and alluded to the Patriot's significant omission of the words which give meaning to the line "Honour to whom honour." Further we stated that "when Sir Louis shall have secured the construction of the Southern Railway and the Hillsborough bridge, direct communication with Great Britain, cold storage and greatly improved means of winter communication with the mainland, he will be entitled to all the honor that the grateful people of his native Province can bestow." This is the extent of THE EXAMINER'S offence. We submit that the Patriot's charge is not justified. Nor is THE EXAMINER'S position in regard to the suggested public reception to Sir Louis in any degree impaired by the fact that Parliamentary grants have been made for the maintenance of the public service in this Province and for certain improvements. The P. E. Island railway authorities have, for instance, been straightening the line and putting in switches for years past; and no one ever before heard a suggestion that anyone should be honored with a public reception and that account. The Patriot's manner of promoting the proposed public non-partizan reception is certainly not by any means flattering to Sir Louis Davies.

DEBT ACCUMULATION.

It is truly remarked by the Montreal Star that, "No political falsehood was ever more thoroughly misleading or dangerously plausible than the too common doctrine that a nation can borrow money without feeling the weight of the debt. Even if it be decided never to pay the loan back, nothing is gained; for the interest charges must be kept up year after year out of the tax-money of the people. To increase the debt is to increase the annual tax for interest and to decrease the possibility of reducing taxation. If the farmers no longer want taxation reduced, if they are now indifferent as to whether or not it be made heavier, they can regard the augmentation of the public debt with equanimity. But it is inconceivable that the men who pay a good share of the taxes and who work hard for the money they get to pay them with, should be anything but appalled under present industrial conditions at the prospect of having these taxes permanently increased." Still, the farmers of Prince Edward Island voted a few weeks ago for the Debt-Accumulating Peters Government.

NICKEL

The announcement that the British Government have decided to adopt nickel steel as the material for the protection of the warships to be built within the present year, has an important bearing upon Canada; for Canada is the greatest nickel producing country in the world. The London Daily Graphic, describing the new naval construction programme, says:—"The principal item is the cost of laying down four new warships of an entirely novel pattern. They are to be cruisers and battleships in one. In speed they will fall

little behind those mighty cruisers the Powerful and Terrible, but they will also carry armour which will enable them to resist the direct fire of six-inch guns. At the same time, although their armament is practically the same as that of the Powerful and her sister ship, their displacement will be nearly 2,500 tons less. The secret lies in the adoption of nickel steel for the armor plating, this material giving the same resistance as steel for much less weight."

The opening up of Canada by the great railways constructed under the auspices of the late government has made the nickel deposits of Canada available to the world, and placed within the reach of Canadians an in exhaustible source of wealth.

—The Montreal Star aptly remarks that "It is seldom that an Opposition has been in a better condition than the present to stand by and let the Government party quarrel among themselves."

—"Welcome the coming, speed the parting, guest!" Having sent the Emperor of Germany home in high good humor the Czar now stretches out the hand of welcome towards the President of France. President Faure left Dunkirk this afternoon on board the French war-ship, Potemkin, escorted by the Bruix and Surcouf, and will arrive at Cronstadt on Monday, Aug 23. The first day of the French President's sojourn in Russia will be devoted to his reception at Cronstadt and at Peterhof, to the exchange of official visits, a banquet at the Peterhof Palace, and a gala performance at the Imperial Theatre. The President and the Czar will start for St. Petersburg on August 24. At the Russian capital M. Faure will be welcomed by the municipality of St. Petersburg and will receive in audience delegations from the principal cities of the empire. Russia is perhaps lucky in having both Germany and France courting her good will.

Quarterly Session of the Grand Division,

Interesting Public meeting in the Evening.

The Grand Division S. of T., met in quarterly session in Cavendish Hall yesterday at 11 o'clock a. m. Grand Worthy Patriarch Anderson presiding. After routine business and the appointment of committees, an adjournment was made till two o'clock. At two o'clock, when the Grand Division re-assembled, the spacious hall was filled with representatives and members of the Order.

Among those present was the Most Worthy Associate of National Division, W. J. Gates, Esq., of Halifax, who was received by the Grand Division with the honors due to his position in the Order.

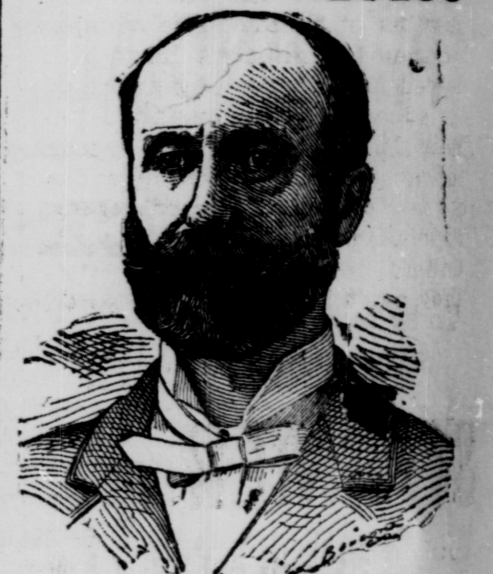
