Hitch Hiker From Vancouver On Visit To Montague

The other evening a very interesting conversation was held at Montague with a gentleman, Mr. Charles Brooks from Vancouver. Mr. Brooks hitchhiked from Vancouver this summer, leaving there May 15th and arriving here the middle of June. He related his many travels to a very interested audience in the Guardian Office, Montague. Born in Ireland, he moved to Western Canada when only two years of age. A veteran of World War One, he spent a number of years overseas, and visited many European countries, spending time in Paris, London, Dublin, Belfast, Edinburgh, and other well known cities.

Not only has Mr. Brooks hitchhiked from coast to coast in Canada several times, but he has visited forty-eight states in U. S. A., and spent months in various American cities, including Hollywood, Los Angeles, Austin, (Texas), Miami, New York, Cincinnati, Chicago, Las Vegas, Bangor and many others. He further stated that he had visited Mexico, and the Yukon, but found the latter too cold to stay any length of time.

Having visited and spent so much time in various Canadian cities, Mr. Brooks told his audience he had many acquaintances across Canada. A former resident of Sackville, N. B., was present at the time and to his surprise learned that Mr. Brooks was very well acquainted with some of his former neighbours and close friends.

Mr. Brooks said he planned to leave for Vancouver around the middle of July and would visit here again next summer.

ed out the marketing difficulties caused by tariffs and surpluses due to overproduction.

Mr. Shaw said it was through help of the Marketing Board that the starch program was established with a price of 44 cents to the farmer. He told of farming conditions and co-operatives in Norway, Sweden, Denmark and Holland and stated that it was through co-operatives that they had been able to place agriculture in a primary category with respect to large returns to producers.

The speaker added that reduced potato acreage was an important factor in retaining a high price and said a 30 per cent decrease was proposed. He also stated that promotional work was under way in the matter of trying to sell Island potatoes to the Southern States.

After the reading of the minutes of the last annual meeting, which were approved, a resolutions committee was appointed including Wilfred MacDonald, J. W. MacLean, Alden MacLaren, Mrs. Percy King, Louis MacGuire.

Mr. J. L. Dewar, secretary of the Prince Edward Island Federation of Agriculture presented his report on Federation activities which showed the various programs in which the federation engaged; namely, potato price support, quota system for marketing potatoes, educational program on care of grass, rural telephones, veterinary service, bull bonus policy, campaign on warble fly, freight assistance on feed grain, ferry service between Georgetown and Piclou, and the Newfoundland trade. He asked the members of the Federation for their continued support.

Mrs. Edwin MacDonald, Panmure Island, was appointed to fill the vacancy made by the resignation of Mrs. David Johnston.


Marketing Board

A short meeting of the Provincial Marketing Board was then held with J. L. Dewar as chairman.

Mr. David Wright, Lower Montague, was re-elected Director on the board. The Federation meeting then continued with Mr. Charles Yeo, president of the Prince Edward Island Federation of Agriculture, presenting his views on the Farm Radio Forum, in which he stated that the Forum was the educational program of the Federation, and urged the establishing of such units in the country. Bitter Resistance

TOKYO, June 28 — (Friday)— (AP)—Chinese Communists bitterly defended the approaches to Kung Central Korean stronghold at Kumsong Thursday, holding United Nations forces to gains of less than a mile.

Resistance was spotty elsewhere along the 100-mile front.

Lt.-Gen. James A. Van Fleet, Eighth Army commander, cautioned that the Chinese appeared to be building up for another effort to overrun Allied lines.

However, Van Fleet did not think a major enemy thrust could come immediately. He said his troops were better prepared than they were in April and May when they hurled back the Reds with staggering losses in Communist manpower and equipment.

An air of expectancy nevertheless swept Van Fleet's headquarters over the Soviet cease-fire proposal.

paratively small.

During the evening a special vote of thanks was tendered Mrs. Henderson for her work during the past 24 years as Chairman of Finances, and to the Ladies Auxiliary for the excellent work they had accomplished. Miss McLean, the new matron of the Orphanage and Mr. Stewart, Chairman, also received expressions of gratitude from the meeting.

A general vote of thanks was extended to St. Paul's Hall Committee, the Clergy, Press, Secretary, and to all who in any way contributed to the success of the work.

Chairman's Review

"The work of our Protestant Orphanage continued its forward march during the year and success has again crowned the combined effort of the many who gave freely of their time and energy to achieve it.

"We had our measure of sadness in the loss of one of our most faithful members of this Trustee Board, Mr. Heath Strong, K.C., of Summerside, who passed away suddenly in the latter part of the year. In 1930 Mr. Strong succeeded Mr. A. S. MacKay on the Board and his interest in the work never waned throughout his twenty years of valuable service.

"We had also a change in the Nurse In Charge of the institution to cope with as Miss Eva Lillian Beers retired on September 1st. Miss Beers took up her work with us in February, 1927, so had twenty-three and a half years very efficient service with the institution. We were fortunate in obtaining as a successor, Miss Margaret MacLean, who comes to us exceptionally well trained for this work.

"In the last report mention was made of the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the Orphanage in 1902; it would seem fitting that some special celebration of this

event should be held.

"Very few institutions have had such signal success year after year and it is due largely to the long, faithful and untiring service of some still on the board, who have made this their life's work in which the greatest reward will be that final "Well Done."

"1950 marks the twenty-fourth year that Mrs. H. S. Henderson has had charge of our finances and year after year she has been the dynamic force that inspired all workers; the work has increased steadily as the years passed; many thought that 1949 had reached the peak in collections but this year has exceeded even that; some plan must soon be devised to relieve her of part of the burden and a glance at the statement following will give but a slight idea of the immensity of that burden.

"The Adoption Committee has carried on their very important work for the unfortunate children with the best interest of the child itself ever in mind. During the year thirteen children were admitted and fourteen discharged, so that the average number in our care has changed but slightly. Two of our older boys were successful in passing the Entrance to Prince of Wales College and are now attending that institution; our thanks are due to a group of young people of the City who so greatly helped in making it possible for these boys to continue their education.

"The Property Committee had a busy time keeping the building and grounds in good condition; the old car had to be replaced at considerable expense; work was completed on the rear basement entrance and is now in good condition; one furnace had to be repaired as well as some replacements in bath rooms. Some new equipment is badly needed in the kitchen; the grounds have been kept in good condition and throughout the summer presented a very pleasing appearance.

"The school is providing very satisfactory instruction for our
