

New Children's Section For The Ch-town Library



Dr. L. W. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Education, Miss Jean Gill, chief librarian of the Charlottetown Public Library, and His Worship Mayor Stewart are shown above at the official opening of the new children's section in the library, which took place on May 10. The new section is separated from the main library by a handsomely designed set of bookcases, in counter shelving style, and occupies about one-quarter of the total floor space. It provides accommodation for about one thousand new books for children and teen-agers. The design of the new shelving gives an air of spaciousness to the library and is in every way a decided improvement. The City and Prince Edward Island Libraries share the cost of providing the new equipment, which includes also an adjustment in the lighting facilities. Children's tables and chairs are being provided by local I. O. D. E. chapters and will be added later. While no announcement had been made of the opening of the new section, many children were aware of what was going on and over 100 new books were taken out on the first day. The facilities have since been in great demand.

Guides And Brownies In Church Parade Yesterday

Queen's County Guides and Brownies, three hundred strong, paraded to St. Dunstan's Basilica, Trinity United Church for the morning services on Sunday. The various city church units were augmented by troops from Parkdale, Southport and Central Royalty. The parade assembled at Rochford Square and moved off under command of Mrs. James MacLean, acting District Captain. Girl Guide and Brownie leaders taking part in the turnout were Mrs. Gordon Hutcheson, Provincial Commissioner, Miss Iphigenie Arsenault, Division Commissioner, Miss Susanne MacKinnon, District Commissioner, and Miss Lillian Duchemin, Public Relations Commissioner.

The march followed eastward on Kent to Queen, thence South to Richmond, to the intersection of Great George St., where the troop under Miss Arsenault was diverted to the Basilica. Rev. Mr. Irwin welcomed the visitors to Trinity and Rev. A. S. Weir, of Pownal, President of the Maritime Conference of the United Church preached the sermon. At the Basilica, Rev. Prisoners Are Recaptured After Break From Jail

Two prisoners in Queen's County made a successful bid for freedom early Sunday morning, but their liberty was short lived. The escape was made by removing a grating from a third story window on the west side, and the getaway lasted for roughly one hour. The other escaped man was recaptured fifteen minutes later while taking part in a brawl on Sydney Street.
