

# Pat Supple Loses To Peter Keenan

GLASGOW (CP)—Pat Supple, a rugged little Montrealer who never stopped trying, extended Peter Keenan to the limit Thursday night in an unsuccessful attempt to lift the 30-year-old Scot's British Empire bantamweight boxing title.

Bothered by the Canadian's orthodox style, the champion lost ground steadily in the first six rounds. Jolted into action when he suffered a cut eye, he then took command and piled up a sufficient lead to win the 15-round decision despite suffering two knockdowns at the hands of the 21-year-old challenger in the final round.

It was the 17th championship fight for Keenan, who won his title in 1955. Shortly after his victory, it was announced that he has been signed to meet world cham-

pion Alphonse Halimi in Paris Nov. 17.  
**BEST CLOSE IN**  
Supple was at his best at close range and repeatedly rocked the champion in the early rounds with unorthodox uppercuts to the head while Keenan's left jab missed their mark. But the Scot took over when he switched to a two-handed attack that kept his younger rival at a distance.

Neither knockdown resulted from a punch. On the second occasion, Keenan was bundled through the ropes and took a count of three. The crowd cheered Supple as he helped his rival to his feet.

"He was a tough little character," Keenan said afterwards. "He was like a pit pony the way he kept coming at me with his head down."

## McGill Loses Star Fullback

MONTREAL (CP)—McGill University Redmen, already hard hit by injuries and player ineligibility problems, Friday learned that star fullback Wally Bulchak will be sidelined for a week at least and guard Chuck Arnold is lost for the remainder of the senior intercollegiate football season.

The word came to rookie coach Bruce (Bones) Coulter from team medical authorities just before the Redmen started their final practice drills in preparation for today's game here against the defending champion University of Western Ontario Mustangs. Bulchak, the team's leading scorer, suffered a severe nose injury last Saturday.

Arnold of Montreal, has entered hospital with recurring headaches brought on by head injury suffered two weeks ago.

All-star halfback Carl Hansen is out with a leg injury suffered in a pre-season exhibition game while tackle Tom Szefel and halfback John Moore have been declared ineligible as players under the intercollegiate transfer rule.

Stefel came to McGill from the University of Maryland and Moore is from Mount Allison University of Sackville, N.B.

**Elmer Wasko Suffers Injury**  
CHICAGO (AP)—A shoulder injury to Elmer (Moose) Wasko will bench the Chicago Blackhawks defenceman at least two weeks, it was reported Friday.

Wasko was hurt in Detroit Thursday night during a National Hockey League game which the Blackhawks won 7-2.

Dr. Myron J. Tremaine, club physician, said the left shoulder dislocation entailed a bone separation and torn ligaments.

## Britain Looking To The Sprinters

LONDON (CP)—British track and field enthusiasts, saddened by the passing of their golden era in the distance events, are looking to their sprinters to capture the next slice of international glory.

Britain's dominance of distances from 800 yards to three miles ended decisively at Cardiff this summer when a bevy of Australian speedsters headed by the incomparable Herb Elliott reduced such illustrious names as Derek Ibbotson and Gordon Pirie to the also-ran lists at the British Empire Games.

As the season ended, Pirie joined Chris Chataway and Roger Bannister, the world's first four-minute miler, in retirement. Ibbotson, shorn by Elliott of his world record for the mile, appeared no longer capable of matching competition. Of the old guard, only Brian Hewson, European champion at 1,500 metres, appeared to have retained edge.

Meanwhile, the most talked-of prospect for the 1960 Olympics is 19-year-old Peter Radford, a sprinter who couldn't make the first three in the 100-yard dash at two years with the national team. The Bradfordshire youngster, confined to a wheelchair for two years with a childhood kidney ailment, has reduced his 100-yard clocking to 9.6 seconds, a British record.

On present form, Britain's chances for Olympic honors look better in the women's sprints, with June Paul, Heather Armitage Young and Madeleine Weston offering a strong challenge to the Australians who swept the European champion at 1,500 metres in Melbourne two years ago.

# Calgary Stampeders Face Elimination This Weekend

Saskatchewan Roughriders may return a familiar scene to the Western Interprovincial Football Union Saturday. All they need do is defeat Calgary Stampeders.

Since the cowboys won the Grey Cup in 1948 and reached the national final in 1949, there have been only two seasons in which Edmonton Eskimos, Winnipeg Blue Bombers and Saskatchewan Roughriders were not the three teams involved in the league playoffs.

Saskatchewan can assure that lineup again with a victory in Regina Saturday, for a single loss now will eliminate Stampeders mathematically, erasing any hope they have of grabbing the third spot away from Riders as they did in 1953 and again last year.

**B.C. UPSET THREAT**  
Esquimos can assure at least the top two spots are familiar if they defeat British Columbia's now-dangerous Lions in Vancouver Saturday, and Bombers can wrap up first place and a bye into the league final by defeating Saskatchewan in Winnipeg Monday.

Lions, with three victories in 13 starts, have no playoff hopes. Bombers, with 20 points, have a five-point margin over Esquimos, a seven-point spread over Riders and a 10-point lead over Stampeders. Riders have four games remaining, the other clubs three each.

That places the pressure squarely on Stampeders, who must win all their remaining games—two against Riders and one against Bombers—to keep their hopes alive.

**Cracks Ruskie's Stranglehold On Pentathlon Title**  
ALDERSHOT, England (AP)—Kurt Lindemann, a 27-year-old Finn with a determined stride, thrust himself over two and a half miles of hills Friday to crack Russia's stranglehold on the world pentathlon championship.

The five-day tournament of five events—riding, fencing, shooting, swimming and running—ended otherwise with overwhelming victory for the Russian team. Hungary was second, Finland was third and the United States fourth.

Russia's defending champion, Igor Novikov, won the individual crown with a world record of 4,924 points.

Lindeman, 26-year-old infantry lieutenant, spread-eagled the field in the 4,000-metre cross-country run which concluded the championship. He was clocked in 14:24.6.

Novikov shattered the previous best pentathlon mark of 4,833 points made by the fabulous Swede Lars Hall two years ago.

Hall won the world championship four times. Novikov now has won twice.

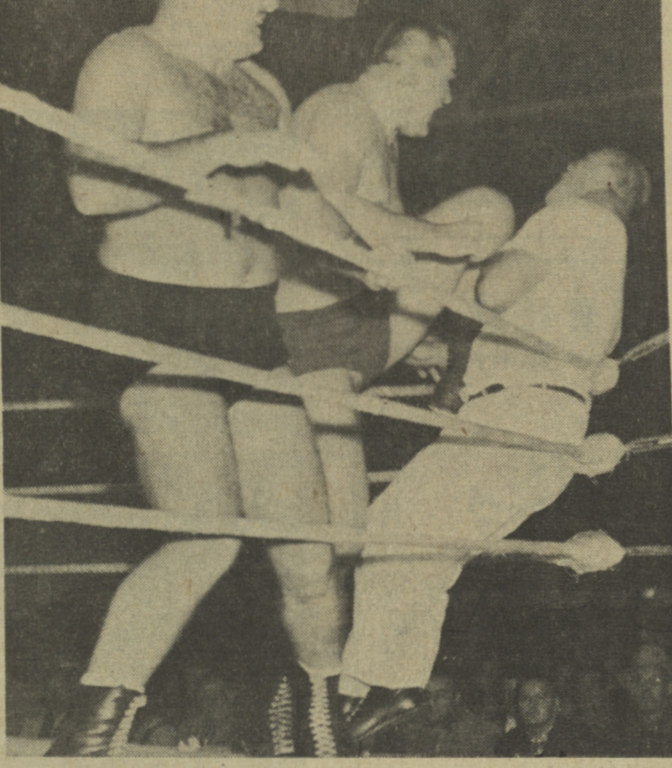

## SPORT FORUM

### 'Duck' Trainer Meets Nini At Sports Arena Here Wed.

Sir—Right now fight fans are interested in the Trainer and Nini fight, but back in the 20's they were interested in other fights and fighters.

Word came out of New York City in November, 1927, that James J. Braddock of New Jersey and Vic McLaughlin, born at Peakes P.E.I., fought to a 10 round, no decision bout.

McLaughlin's name was appearing quite frequently in the sports pages of those days. Jack McKenna was making quite a name for himself at that time.

In a bout sponsored by the Black Diamond Sporting Association in 1927 in Glace Bay, McKenna knocked out George Field of Toronto to gain recognition as Canadian Middleweight Champion. Earlier in that year McKenna, then claiming the Canadian Crown, had taken only five rounds to dispose of Maurice MacDonald of Alberta, another claimant.

In another bout at Charlottetown, following the victory over MacDonald, McKenna knocked out Harry Runcorn of Drumheller, Alberta, in five rounds.

Jack McKenna is now known to the current generation as a Halifax Boxing Commission referee.

Turning to the sport pages of October, 1921, it is noted that Roddy McDonald of Glace Bay and Bill McKinnon of Mount Stewart met in the fistie ring in this event and at the end of 10 rounds of rough battling the officials declared the bout a draw. In the semi-final Tom, one man, McCluskey making his first start in the squared circle, after an absence of seven years, battled to an interesting six round draw with Bob Stanley.

It was near the end of June, 1924, when Eddie Trembley of St. Louis, P.E.I. was awarded a 10 round decision over Sam the Boston Tar Baby Langford at Venus California.



DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

Probably the most sensational performance at the Lexington Trots was the winning of the S. A. Camp Memorial Two-Year-Old Trot, purse \$17,765, by Merrie Annabelle, a roan filly by Star's Pride, owned by Bryon D. Kuth. Describing her performance a writer in "The Horseman and Fair World" states:

"Merrie Annabelle, who might be the greatest two-year-old race trotter of all time, answered all questions as to her ability to handle anything in sight this season when she smothered a field of eleven colts in straight heats in the Camp Memorial Trot this afternoon. An old-time horse man, two hours later, was still shaking his head as he talked about it—'I've seen all the great two-year-old trotters, from Native Belle and the Red Lady right on down through Scott Frost and Yankee Lass, and I never saw one that could do what she did today.'"

Here is part of the summary: Merrie Annabelle (J. Patterson) 1-1, Flight Song (L. Huber, Jr.) 2-3, Diller Hanover (J. Chapman) 5-2, Brogue Hanover 3-4, time 2:04 and 2:01 4-5.

Three days later, on October 3, a tragic accident happened to the two-year-old champion, Merrie Annabelle, when she was being harnessed for another race. She reared up and fell, injuring her back so severely that she couldn't get up. The best veterinarians were attending her, and at latest report there was some improvement, but it is extremely doubtful if she will ever be able to race again. All the leading trainers were in accord with the opinion that, had she not met with the accident, she could probably have broken all world records for three-year-olds.

During the Lexington meeting, four trotters took marks of 2:00 or better, the fastest being Hickory Smoke, a four-year-old by Titan Hanover, owned by L.B. Sheppard and A.C. Mudge, time 1:58 2-5. The others were: Senator Frost, a three-year-old, by Victory Song, 1:59 1-5; Emily's Pride, a three-year-old by Star's Pride, 1:59 2-5; Rich Colby, a four-year-old by Colby Hanover, 1:59 2-5. Senator Frost and Emily's Pride also had other miles in better than two minutes. And finally there was the unfortunate two-year-old, Merrie Annabelle, that took a record of 2:00 flat.

There were ten pacers that stepped miles in 2:00 or better, with Shadow Wave, driven by Joe O'Brien, having the fastest time—1:58 1-5, also two other miles in 1:58 2-5 and 1:59 2-5. Joe O'Brien also drove the three-year-old filly, Sunbelle, in 1:59 4-5, which gave him four of the 13 two-minute miles paced at Lexington.

**SOLO WELL**  
The yearling sale at Lexington, to which we referred on Wednesday, probably deserves a bit more attention now that we have more information. For the third consecutive year it topped the million dollar mark, with 332 trotters and pacers bringing a total of \$1,110,200.

The highest price was realized for the yearling, Yankee Sweetheart, a full sister to Yankee Lass, 2, 1:59 4-5. She was in the Castleton Farm consignment and was sold for \$27,000 to the Clearview Stable, Winthrop, Maine and will be trained by ex-Maiden trainer Earl Avery.

Second top price was paid for the yearling, Hoot Frost, by Hoot Mon, Dan Nora, a full brother to Scott Frost 1:58 3-5, that our readers are so well acquainted with. He brought \$26,000 and went to the stable of Armstrong Bros., Brampton, Ont., whose horses are trained and driven by Del Miller.
