An English lady has given \$15,000 to the Bishop of Rupert's Land to provide for the salary of a chaplain to work among the English immigrants arriving at Winnipeg. The Rev. H. F. Leslie has been appointed to the position. Mr. Leslie was, for a short time, at Bell's Corners, in the Diocese of Ontario.

The imports of wood, hewn and sawn, into the ports of the United Kingdom for seven months ending with July of this year, display a very considerable increase over those of the same period last year. The total quantity, as given by the Timber Trades' Journal, was 2,925,450 loads of hewn and sawn; as against 2,144,691 loads in the like seven months of 1881.

The year 1883 is the periodical cholera year. The first appearance of the pestilence was in 1832, and it has since appeared at intervals of seventeen years—in 1849 and 1866. It is now raging in the Philippine Islands, and has manifested itself at other points in the far Orient. The important question is whether it will strike the British troops in Egypt.

Little as is done by England in regard to the reduction of the national debt, she is not quite idle. In the year 1881 she paid off close upon 7 1/2 millions sterling, and the total is now £762,800,000. Of this about 30 millions is represented by loans to others, which are reported as recoverable, and which nearly £4,000,000 is represented by Suez Canal shares, on which interest is duly paid.

The London Magazine of Art generalizes about American work as follows:—"American artists seemed to be divided even more sharply than the English into the two camps of old and new. Their difference are extreme—the bygone work being perhaps even more inartificial and inelegant, and that which is educated, being more expert and complete, than the corresponding achievements of Englishmen."

General Ducrot is dead. He was the general who, having escaped from the Germans after Sedan, was charged by them with having broken his parole. They even threatened to shoot him if they took him prisoner during the siege of Paris. He led several desperate sorties, and rather foolishly declared on one occasion that he would come back dead or victorious. As a matter of fact, he came defeated.

Cetawayo, says London Truth, objects to the barbarism of taking different kinds of food on the same plate, and insists upon having his vegetables served separately. What would he think of a beauty at a celebrated watering place hotel, who had on her plate a roast, two entrees, mashed potatoes, succotash, and several sauces and juices, and then, pointing her jewelled finger at a dish of wine jelly, said to the waiter, "Bring me some of that liver!"

A foreign paper, speaking of simony as practiced in England, says:—"The Church of England is very largely regarded as a sort of asylum or charitable institution for the maintenance of the younger sons of the upper classes. Hence no politician has dared to grapple boldly with this scandal. If he were to do so, he would find that he had put his foot into a wasp's nest, and he would make himself peculiarly repugnant and unacceptable to the classes which are chiefly interested in the maintenance of this scandal."

Philadelphia Times:—"In the memory of the oldest mamma who for years has had marriageable daughters in the resort market there has never been a season quite like this one. The great ballrooms have echoed only to the sound of their own music; the surfs have been almost deserted and the young woman climbers in the mountains have been compelled to protect themselves from snakes and other wild and dreadful things. Just why, in a year of good crops, increasing exports and an easy money market the young man should refuse to thrust his neck into the hyemal yoke is a problem which the disappointed match-makers will ponder and discuss all winter. It is certainly a question worthy of diplomatic attention."

There is probably no one subject of study which is so generally voted irksome by the average pupil in the public schools as English Grammar. Many enthusiastic and successful teachers will assure us that there is none which is capable of being made more delightful or more serviceable as an instrument of education. Whence the difference? Simply in the mode of instruction pursued. Grammar taught dogmatically and synthetically from a text-book of the more usual kind is an abomination. Taught analytically from the language of daily life or of books, it may become as enjoyable and stimulating as an experimental science. When all teachers perceive that grammar is the science of language, rather than the art of solving word puzzles, or memorizing and applying obscure definitions and rules, then and not till then may the study become a joy instead of a dread to the young mind.
