**MR. DANIEL HOCKIN**, Stipendiary Magistrate of Pictou, and for twenty years Custos of Pictou County, died very suddenly on the morning of the 17th inst.

We regret to learn that Senator Howland is very ill. His illness is the result of his late accident. It is reported that he is in a critical state.

**AQUATIC**.—The three mile race for five hundred dollars a side, between McKay of Dartmouth, and Conley of Portland, Me., took place on Bedford Basin, on the 18th inst., and was won by the latter.

The Souris tea-party, on Wednesday last was successful in every particular. Fully three thousand people were in attendance. The secretary deserves great credit for the accommodation and amusement of those who attended.

**MR. SAMUEL MITCH**, Teacher, Georgetown, was presented with an address accompanied by a valuable locket and chain by the Captain and crew of the brig, *Plymouth*, as an acknowledgment of the valuable instructions given to them by him on the "old School House on the green."

At Bridgetown, N. S., on Saturday night, a man named McLean was stabbed by a negro named Mitchell, and died. Mitchell was, at last advice, still at large, although quite a number of the populace are in search of him. The deceased was a respected and industrious citizen, and leaves a wife and four small children to mourn his sad death.

The new shaft required by the S. S. "Carroll" will be made by the "Nova Scotia Forge Company." The work will be accomplished within one week, or half the time it would take to get it from Boston, and at a much less cost, not to speak of the immense saving to the steamer in time. Hitherto, all steamers with broken shafts have had to wait until new ones came from the States.

**TO-NIGHT'S LECTURE** by DR. LEEMING.—We again draw the attention of our readers to the farewell lecture on "Mary Queen of Scots," which takes place to-night, at Market Hall. Dr. Leeming leaves for Halifax by tomorrow's boat, so that this is the last occasion on which he will speak to a Charlottetown audience. As considerable interest has been taken in the Rev. gentleman since his arrival, and varied opinions formed of his oratorical powers, no doubt a large number will assemble to hear his final address. The Press, we notice, speaks in the highest terms of this lecture.

**PATRICK CAVANAGH**, seventeen years of age, was released from jail on Tuesday last, where he had been confined for larceny. A few hours after his release, Patrick, in order to show that "his predatory instincts were inveterate," stole a pair of reins from a team which was standing in front of Mr. LePage's store corner Queen and Sydney streets. He was arrested for the offense yesterday, and to-day the Stipendiary Magistrate sentenced him to six months imprisonment with hard labor.

**EXHIBITION NOTES**.—The Advisory Board have made every necessary arrangement, for securing a fair representation of the Products of this Province at the General Dominion Exhibition to be held at Montreal next September. The advertisement over the signature of the Secretary, published in all the Island papers offering prizes for Grain, &c., is an additional proof of the desire evinced by the Board to encourage our farmers to forward samples of their industries.

The Baptist Sabbath School Picnic and Excursion yesterday was well patronized. The steamer had as many as she could well accommodate. The day was very pleasant. The trip down to Orwell was very enjoyable. On arrival at Orwell, the keen appetites of the excursionists were soon satisfied. The afternoon was pleasantly spent. The steamer was late returning to Orwell and did not leave for the city before seven. The return passage was rough, which excited a little seasickness and other innocent amusements, which were enlivened by vocal and instrumental music. The party arrived here at 10.30, having the benefit of a moonlight excursion the greater part of the way.

**NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.**

**EUROPEAN.**

LONDON, Aug. 18.

During a riot at Danganon, on Sunday, many of the police were wounded. Their ranks were several times broken. They finally fired buckshot into the crowd. The firing was returned from revolvers, and showers of stones fell, many of the rioters almost rushing on the points of the bayonets in the eagerness of the attack. Subsequently a volley of ball was fired and many were wounded. One man had the side of his head riddled with buckshot and received a bullet in the abdomen from which he died.

In a fight at Downpatrick, between Catholics and Orangemen, firicams were used incessantly from 11 a. m. on Sunday night until three on Monday morning. Several persons were severely wounded.

The *Times'* Dublin despatch says: In consequence of the statement of Mr. Foster Chief Secretary for Ireland, that a thousand marines will be quartered in Mayo, attention will be eagerly directed thither for some time and some sort of confirmation will be lent to the rumors that the government expected an insurrection among the peasantry.

At Belfast, yesterday, rioting was renewed. The mounted police charged the mob and twenty persons were arrested. Some houses were wrecked by the rioters.

Hon. William E. Forster, Chief Secretary for Ireland, yesterday received a telegram from Ireland, and after consultation with his colleagues sailed by this morning's mail steamer for Dublin. Information contained in despatch was so serious that Forster decided to go to Ireland himself in order to report personally on State affairs to the Cabinet.

The Press Association has a despatch from Cork saying that there is no truth in report of plot to blow up the barracks.

PARIS, Aug. 18.

Miss Neilson's death is attributed to drinking a cup of iced milk, which a medical writer in a Paris journal says is very indigestible. She was twelve hours in mortal agony. Her body was claimed at the morgue by an aged naval officer.

LONDON, Aug. 18.

The Viceroy of India telegraphs to the Foreign Office that Mr. Lepel H. Griffin sent the following from Gaudanuk to-day: "Trustworthy correspondents report the situation in Cabul as generally satisfactory, although slight disturbances have occurred in the city. The general feeling is said to be friendly to the English, except among the lower class of the population of the city."

A Quetta despatch says: The last body of troops forming Candahar relief column has left Sibi for the front. Heat is still terrible and troops suffer greatly—many are disabled.

As a result of the meeting of the iron masters of Scotland, on the 11th, many furnaces in Lanarkshire are now blown out. The strike is spreading to Ayrshire.

**UNITED STATES.**

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 18.

The Yaeger flouring mill, the costliest establishment of the kind in the city, having twenty runs of burs, was burned last night. The loss was a quarter of a million; insured in from 80 to 90 companies, mostly eastern and foreign.

CHICAGO, Aug. 18.

To-night all the theatres gave free entertainments to the knights and ladies, and concerts were given at Music and Concert Halls, all being filled to the limit of their capacity.
