

THE EXHIBITION. SECOND DAY. Among the Live Stock. A CREDITABLE SHOW. Improvement in Breeding.

To-day we were blessed with good exhibition weather, and a stream of visitors began, early, to pour into the Exhibition building and thence to the show ground beyond.

As yesterday, so to-day, the centre of attraction was the horse ring, with the Union Jack flying in the midst, and the Judges on their elevated platform, out of the mud, dispensing prizes.

Very interesting classes were those of the imported trotting stallions and the Island-bred trotting stallions. The former included "Physician," imported and owned by John Richards, of Buford; "Premier," imported and owned by George Tweedy, jr., of this city; "John E. Rysdick, Jr.," imported and owned by McRae & Robbins, of Bedouque, and "General Cleveland," imported and owned by Alexander Blue "All Right" and "Hernando" were both absent in the flesh, though represented by many beautiful and promising colts and fillies.

The latter class included "Black Pilot" and his brother "Robbie Lee," owned by the brothers Dockendorff of North River; "Capt. Jeff," a handsome brown stepper of fine action, owned by Mr. James H. Dingwell, of Morell, another notable horse whose name we failed to obtain. In all these classes there is hope for the future of our Island turf, and for fast and stylish horses to sell at high prices.

The good results of breeding to standard horses were strikingly shown in William Miller's beautiful black colt by "All Right," in J. A. McLean's equally beautiful brown colt "Machinist," by the same sire, in James Simpson's splendid filly by "Hernando," standing at seventeen months old, fourteen hands and an inch high, with first-class limbs and beautifully proportioned; in Mr. Newson's remarkably fine filly "Hernando," by "Hernando," and in many other excellent colts and fillies which could be mentioned, if we had but time and space. Mr. Weeks' filly, by "Hernando," was admired by all the admirers of horse flesh on the grounds. "She is a perfect beauty," was the verdict of public opinion. "Black Pilot," "Robbie Lee," "Capt. Jeff," and other home-bred horses of good blood were also represented by progeny of a high class. Mr. Walter Simpson's colt by "Robbie Lee"—weighing at sixteen and a half months old, 860 lbs.—is a large one, with splendid bone and action.

The imported cart horses on exhibition number five, viz.: "Barrister," owned by Dr. Dodd, "Lucky Lad," owned by C. C. Gardner, "Honest Lincoln," owned by George Tweedy, "Liberty," owned by James Gauril, and "Heppern Clyde," owned by McMillan and Annear. A gentleman present remarked their equals could not be found this side of Ontario; and we have no doubt that the statement was correct. The judges had very great difficulty in coming to a decision in respect to this class, keeping them on the ground a long time yesterday and recalling them again this forenoon.

There was very keen competition in respect to cart colts and fillies; and here again the great advantage of breeding to the best was seen. "Barrister" was exceedingly well represented by his progeny; and there were several young horses by "Oak's Heart," the English shire horse imported by George Tweedy a few years ago. "Liberty" and "Lucky Lad" were also shown to be first-class sires. A colt by the latter, owned by John Scott McLean, was greatly admired. "Sunk Island Hero," "Honest Lincoln," "Duroc," "Brown Stout," and "Challenge," were also creditably represented by the young stock on the ground. Altogether the entries of horses numbered 167.

The parade of horses to-day was a splendid sight—witnessed by thousands.

CATTLE. There were on exhibition twenty-five pure-bred Short-Horns, sixteen Ayrshires, thirteen Jerseys and Guernseys and fifty-two grades. The entries in cattle numbered altogether 106. Pure bred stock is evidently coming to the front. Among the exhibitors were Hon. T. H. Haviland (whose pure bred Jersey cows and young stock are certainly admirable), Councilor McLean and E. R. Brow (who exhibited Jersey and Guernsey sires of the best strains for milking and butter), Henry Longworth and D. Ferguson each exhibited splendid specimens of Durham and Ayrshire cattle. George Mason, A. McRae, Albert E. Smith, D. G. McKinlay, B. E. Wright, Lt.-Col. Irving, R. E. Fitzgerald, William Miller, W. F. Carter and St. Dunstan's College were exhibitors of pure bred cattle of excellent grades.

Sheep. The classes of sheep comprised 28 entries of pure-bred Leicesters, 37 of Downs, 5 of Cotswold, 30 of Long Wool grades, 24 of Short Wool grades, and 6 of Medium Wool grades—139 in all. It was pleasing to see both King's and Queen's Counties well represented in this class, and that, as in the case of cattle, pure-bred animals are on the increase. Among the leading exhibitors were Henry Longworth, Albert Boswall, George Tweedy, Charles Hazard, Stewart Burns, Robert Dewar, and there were many others whose names our reporter failed to obtain.

Pigs and Poultry. Of pigs, there were on exhibition 14 pure-bred Berkshires, 4 Yorkshires, and 6 of other breeds. The poultry were comprised in 73 entries. In both there were excellent specimens of the different breeds.

SPECIAL EXHIBITS. Mr. Richard Jordan's excellent exhibit of pure cod liver oil and emulsion of cod liver oil is well worthy of notice. This is the genuine article and no mistake. We hope that Mr. Jordan will be able to supply the home market with this necessity of all invalids.

Several buggy boys and buggies in competition for the Dawson prize, are worthy of note. The buggies were manufactured by Messrs. Large, McInnis Bros., and McDougall and McGee, and the buggy tops by Mr. I. P. McCoubrey. The workmanship displayed in these vehicles seemed to be excellent, and they were all shining in coats of McCaskill's Standard Varnish. It is alike pleasing to see that so many of our farmers can afford to drive these buggies, and that we have workmen at home capable of supplying the demands of the most fastidious customer.

Mr. Donald McKenzie, general agent for A. Harris, Son & Company, of Brantford, made a capital exhibit of agricultural machines and implements—just what's wanted. Among other machines shown by him, THE EXAMINER reporter noticed the Brantford Binder—of which Mr. McKenzie has sold about a hundred in this Province, (thirty-eight in this season alone.) Wisner's Sectional Seeder, a Fodder Cutter, a Fleury Grain Crusher, and a number of Bell's Ploughs, etc. We are informed that Messrs. Harris & Son sold this season no less than 4,163 Steel Binders, 2,300 Mowers and 700 Reapers, making a grand aggregate of over 7,000 machines; and that almost incredible as these figures are, they have found it necessary to erect new and greater workshops in order to meet the demand.

Alex. Horne, Esq., also makes a creditable exhibit of ploughs, etc., such as our farmers want. An admiring friend calls attention to specimens of crochet work by Miss Ada Godkin, of this city.
