## Increase Is Noted In Eligible Voters

Though the population of Charlottetown has apparently levelled off at approximately 18,000, the number of eligible voters in civic elections continues to advance.

It is expected that approximately 4,600 city residents will be eligible to vote here Feb. 14, when all offices, from mayor to councillors and water commissioners will be open.

While it is not believed there will be contests for all seats, vacancies occurring through death or resignation will make elections necessary — or at least open the way for acclamations for one councillor in Ward 4, and for a third water commissioner.

In the civic election of 1954, there were two candidates for the majority, there were 2,843 voters cast. In 1958, when the post was contested again, 3,665 of the 4,292 eligible voters went to the polls. Last election for mayor, in 1960, saw a total of 3,556 votes cast out of a list of 4,513 eligibles.

With the same number of candidates contesting the ward, the total votes jumped from 3,867 in 1956 to 5,251 in 1960, an increase of almost 2,400 ballots.

A similar sharp increase is noted in the voting for water commissioners over the 10-year span.

In 1952, with four candidates contesting the three seats, there were 5,679 votes. With six men running in 1954, there were 6,528 votes. The winners that year were re-elected by acclamation the next election, but in 1958 there were five candidates and 9,222 votes cast. Last time, in 1960 with six contestants, there were 9,519 votes.

**BIG INCREASE**

Thus a comparison of the years 1954 and 1960, in each of which there were six men running for the three seats on the commission shows there was a hike in the number of votes of almost 3,000.

Over those same years the official population of the city, as indicated by the amount of the provincial government grants on the basis of \$9 per capita has been: 1952, 15,689; 1954, 15,687; 1958, 15,687; 1960, 15,677.

**WARD ONE CONTESTS**

It is interesting to note in the past five elections, covering the alternate years from 1952 to 1960, there was only one contest in Ward 1. That was in 1958. In all other years the nominee won by acclamation.

In two of those elections, 1952 and 1956, the mayor was also elected by acclamation. Other acclamations came in Ward 2 in 1956; Wards 3, 4 and 6 in 1960; and for the water commissioners in 1956.

In a majority of the wards, little change in the number of voters is evident over the years, but in some it is striking.

To illustrate this, Ward 5 has seen a contest in every one of the past five elections, with the number of nominations for the three council seats varying between four and six.

The voting in the ward is difficult to analyze, at least so far as stating the exact number of ballots cast, because each voter presumably votes for three candidates. However, some voters may simply 'plump' for one man only.

## Rustico Canning Fined \$50 On Five Charges

Fines totalling \$50, and costs of \$8.50, were levied against North Rustico Canning Company Limited in Queens County magistrate's court last night as a plea of guilty was entered in six charges of violation of the Unemployment Insurance Act.

Five of the charges were that the company failed to have unemployment insurance books available when a representative of the Unemployment Insurance Commission called to audit the books. The sixth charge was that the company failed to deliver unemployment insurance books to the commission on demand.

On each of the first five charges, a fine of \$5 was imposed. The sixth charge was considered the most serious and the fine was \$25. Court and police costs of \$8.50 were tacked on to the first fine.

Emmett Gallant, president of North Rustico Canning Company Limited, was represented by Alban Farmer, QC, Charlottetown. The Unemployment Insurance Commission was represented by C. R. McQuaid, Charlottetown.

Also attending the hearing was Unemployment Insurance Commission auditor, E. I. Fraught.

Queens County Magistrate James B. Johnston presided.

Also housed would be an attack warning centre, fallout plotting facilities and communications equipment.

When the headquarters building is chosen, tenders for renovations will be called for by the federal government.

Nova Scotia's regional emergency headquarters is now under construction at Debert, at an estimated cost of \$2,000,000. In addition to P.E.I., New
