PRINCE OF WALES COLLEGE.

The Closing Exercises at the Opera House Last Night.

The closing exercises of Prince of Wales College took place last evening in the presence of an audience which filled the Opera House. The students participating occupied seats on the stage, and the others were massed in the gallery.
Hon. A. B. Warburton, D. C. L., presided, having on his right Mr. D. A. McKinnon, M. L. A., and on his left the College Principal, Dr. Anderson.
The programme prepared for the occasion was carried out with the exception that Hon. H. C. Macdonald was not present to address the graduates. The musical portion of the exercises was under the direction of Mr. S. N. Earle, and formed a very pleasing feature.

The essayists were Mr. Lemuel Miller and Miss Nellie Hodgson, in the order named. Mr. Miller's essay was a critical analysis of the character of "Shylock," and Miss Hodgson reviewed "The Merchant of Venice." Both essays were well written and were read in good form.
The Valedictory was read by Mr. Everet McIntosh, of Victoria. He pointed out that during the past term nearly 250 students have attended the College, and stated that never since the establishment of the institution was the lack of room, sufficient accommodation and proper equipment so manifest as it was during the year. He expressed the hope that before another commencement has been numbered with the past a stately edifice, as pictured in the plans already prepared, would adorn the college grounds. Mr. McIntosh also made fitting references to Dr. Anderson and those associated with him on the teaching staff of the College, of whose work, he said, it was impossible to speak too highly. Appropriate allusions were also made to the College hockey and football teams; and deserved praise was accorded Miss Katie McLean and Mr. Earle for their efforts in developing the musical talents of the students.
Dr. Anderson, in the course of his reply to the valedictory, expressed his appreciation of the kind references to himself and those associated with him on the teaching staff, and spoke highly of the manner in which he had been supported in the work of the College by his assistants. The amount of work done in the College last year was exceedingly creditable when it is remembered that much sickness prevailed among the students during the winter. The bad air of the College building showed its effects upon the students, and rendered them very susceptible to disease. He would not say much regarding the new college building, to which reference had been made by the valedictorian. He hoped however that its erection would not be delayed much longer, for hope deferred made the heart sick. In conclusion, Dr. Anderson counselled the students to be thorough in their preparation for the battle of life, to train their intellects and to be conscientious. In this connection he spoke of the late Right Hon. W. E. Gladstone, and paid an eloquent tribute to the deceased statesman's high character and great ability.

Hon. H. C. Macdonald was not present to address the graduates, and Mr. D. A. McKinnon, at the request of Dr. Anderson, said a few words to them. He urged them to be thorough in everything they did, and expressed his approval of what had been said respecting Gladstone by Dr. Anderson.
Premier Warburton's address was also brief. He spoke of the thoroughness of

the instruction imparted in the College and the benefits it must be to the student whether he or she remained at home or went abroad. He hoped there would soon be increased room for the students, and said it is possible that the day is not far distant when a new College building will occupy the site of the present structure. He did not despair of seeing this done in the not distant future.
The presentation of medals and diplomas was an interesting feature of the proceedings, and the winners were treated to the usual remarks by their fellow students. Premier Warburton, in making the presentation, said a few words of congratulation and encouragement to each student.
The National Anthem closed the proceedings.
