Balding showed no ill effects of his illness in the final against Tucker. He won the second hole with a short birdie putt and after that the match became a run-away. Tucker, who appeared tired, went to pieces.

Balding forged into a seven-up lead after nine holes and closed out the match on the 12th with Tucker winning a hole.

Collision Mars Speedboat Race

SEATTLE (AP)—Little Jack Regas rode Hawaii Kai to victory Sunday in a Gold Cup speedboat race marred by a spectacular accident that sank defending champion Miss Thriftaway.

The finish of the 90-mile gold cup race on Lake Washington came almost as an anti-climax to the near tragedy in which champion driver Bill Muncey and five coast guardsmen were injured.

Miss Thriftaway, rudderless and helpless, tore into the 40-foot coast guard picket boat like a torpedo. Both boats sank.

Muncey, who established a record of 101.978 miles an hour for the race here in 1957, was plucked from the water two minutes after the spectacular accident and lifted by helicopter to shore. He was found to have only cuts and bruises when examined at a hospital. None of the coast guardsmen was injured seriously.

Regas picked up almost all the available points, garnering 1,200 for three heat victories, a bonus of 400 for the fastest heat, and

Captures Women's Golf Crown For Fifth Time

SASKATOON (CP)—Mrs. Marlene Stewart Strait played one of the best golf rounds of her career Saturday to win the Canadian women's open golf championship for a fifth time.

In an approximate medal score, the tiny 24-year-old veteran was eight strokes under par for 30 holes over the par 76 Saskatoon Golf and Country Club course to defeat Mary Gay of Calgary 8 and 5 in the 36-hole final.

It was the fifth time Miss Gay, formerly of Kitchener, Ont., had won in the open final, but it was no disgrace for the 26-year-old secretary fired a fine round of golf herself.

"I've never played that well in match play," said Marlene, whose accurate wedge shots left

her short putts for birdies time after time.

Rita Lohnes of Lunenburg, N.S., came through with a win in the championship consolation, defeating Jo-Ann Percy of Winnipeg 2 and 1 in Saturday's finals. Both are juniors.

FINE APPROACHES

The five-foot two-inch Mrs. Strait was two-under-par in the morning round, but with some fine putting and spectacular approach shots, Miss Gay kept the margin to one hole, shooting even par herself.

Marlene warmed up in the 35-degree heat of afternoon sun and when Mary was down in par, Marlene was down in one under par. The brilliant Ontario golfer was under par on five of the first seven holes and was never over par during the third nine holes
