Successful Boy Scout Apple Day Reported

A successful Boy Scout Apple Day was held in Charlottetown Saturday when record sale returns were reported. Gross receipts were \$1300. Early Saturday morning until well into noon, Scouts and Cubs from City troops and Packs were playing the streets and canvassing business houses. The weather was cold and at times inclement but the youthful salesmen went about their task in a businesslike manner. Members of the Scout Executive, W. W. Reid, president, and George Fisher, financial chairman, expressed themselves as delighted with the response from the public and fine job of work done by both the scouts and cubs. Both officials felt that when province-wide returns are made the Apple Day of 1955 will go into the record book as the "best yet". Summerside Slemmon Park and Borden are to hold their Apple Day next Saturday, Oct. 29th.

economic life" said Mr. Mann. "Future improvement in the Atlantic economy will depend in a large measure on the region's ability to increase its productivity. Just how this can be done is a problem which, we hope, the Royal Commission and its staff of technical and research personnel will investigate as completely as possible," said the speaker.

In referring to the need for capital investment, Mr. Mann pointed out that the per capita investment in the Atlantic Provinces is only 52 per cent of the national, but the regional per capita investment of institutions and governments more nearly approximated the national per capita figures. "The point that such basic information clearly presents to us is that it is in the field of our existing producing facilities that first require our attention—the business that many of you are now working in—agriculture, fisheries, forestry, manufacturing and the service organizations." Mr. Mann told the Convention that DOSCO in Sydney have in an effort to bring the coal mines and the steel plants to a place where cost of production is in line, or near in line, with competitive products, spent \$50,000,000. He emphasized that this program is not designed to increase the total output of the steel mills and the mines. It was solely to make the operations of the company more efficient.

POPULATION GROWTH

Figures given by Mr. Mann indicated that while the population increase in Canada since the War years has shown an upswing of 23 per cent, that of Newfoundland, Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick have shown increases of 20, 12, 10, and 15 per cent respectively. He said that many of our young men and women are leaving the Atlantic Provinces to seek work and incidentally accomplish something elsewhere. "We only have to listen and to read, almost daily, of their accomplishments," he said.

The speaker felt that resistance to change was one of the principal deterrents in economic advancement in the Region. "Therefore," he said, "if lack of capital is our first problem, then our second problem is that of just plain good management—management in all its intricacies and diversities. We must have knowledge—lots of knowledge. Some of us have a lot of studying to make up for our lack of common sense but in so doing we tend to acquire more of it." He went on to say that knowledge gives confidence that one is right in his opinion and as a result can do a better job of selling. "In other words I am talking about the increasing of our productivity," said Mr. Mann.

The speaker revealed that some universities are giving courses in business administration for those in the management field and suggested to his listeners that a tremendous opportunity existed in such courses. TRANSPORTATION The APEC manager pointed out the growth of the regional market, noting the increasing transportation costs into and out of the four Provinces. As a result of these charges, he said that particular attention should be paid to the possibilities of the local market. Mr. Mann described the increase in transportation as somewhat a blessing in disguise, inasmuch as when the rates went up it made it possible for locally produced commodities to compete in the regional market with imported goods. The possible result, as pointed out by Mr. Mann, would be the establishment of regional processing and distributing centres in the Regional Provinces and as a result there should be greater scope for local enterprise.

The consignment contained 133 crates, which arrived at Alexandria last Thursday. RCAF Exercise Topcoat Ends

TRURO, (CP)—More than 12,000 aircraft ground observers took a rest Sunday night after a three-day test that kept many of them on the job almost continuously. The RCAF's Exercise Topcoat ended at 6 p.m. AST with more than 10,000 telephone calls from observer posts in the Maritime provinces and Gaspe peninsula handled at Truro and Moncton filter centres.

CLAIMS RECORD

Sqdn. Ldr. S. R. Miller of Halifax, area ground observer chief, claimed a world record for continuous tracking by ground spotters. He said 36 posts reported the continuous course of an aircraft for 7 hours 18 minutes, a flight of 1,320 miles. The previous record was 5 hours 42 minutes by a British Columbia unit. Sqdn. Ldr. Miller said the work-out showed the Ground Observer Corps is able to take its place in air defence, but it could have been more effective if all posts had been continually manned. More volunteers were needed. Many spotters went without sleep and forgot business during the three-day test. Poor weather hampered operations Friday but conditions were good the rest of the period.

Liguorian Credit Union Annual Meeting Held

The 20th annual meeting of the Liguorian Credit Union Limited was held in the Community Centre, October 22.

The meeting was presided over by Mr. Jerome Gallant, who also delivered the report of the Board of Directors. In his report Mr. Gallant gave special mention to a service offered by credit unions which he felt does not receive sufficient publicity. This is the savings and loan accounts. During the year ended Sept. 30, 1955, the families of deceased members of Liguorian Credit Union had been paid a total of \$1,228.47 in savings and loan claims. The president said this was a concrete example of the slogan, "Credit Union Debts die with the debtor." The credit committee report was given by Mr. Leonard J. O'Connor, and the supervisory report by Mr. James Coyle, Jr. Mrs. Stephen Trainor, delegate to the P.E.I. Credit Union League meeting held in July, gave a very complete report on the meeting and suggested that the ladies should take a more active part in the affairs of the credit union movement. The financial statement was presented by the treasurer, Frank Strain who reported that the profit for the year was sufficient to pay a 2 per cent dividend on paid up shares, and a 10 per cent interest rebate to borrowers. Later, the meeting voted to pay both. The present rate of interest charged by Liguorian Credit Union is 3-4 per cent per month or a true rate of 9 per cent per annum, with all loans insured. Visitors who spoke briefly to the meeting were: Rev. J. Gregory Murphy, C.S.S.R., Rector of Holy Redeemer Parish, Mr. Leo J. Corcoran, managing director of the P.E.I. Credit Union League, Mr. Don Smith of the Credit Union National Association, and Mr. Frank McMillan, treasurer of the Charlottetown Credit Union. Election of officers was as follows: Directors, Albert MacRae, Frank DesRoches (re-elected), and Mrs. Gordon Tombs; Credit Committee, Mr. Patrick Doyle, and Mr. Jack Lee; Supervisory Committee, Mr. Tom Bradley (re-elected).
