**Soviet Protest Seen As Cover-Up Action**

MOSCOW (Reuters)—Russia has warned the United States, Britain and France that she "may be compelled... to take necessary measures" as a result of "dangerous provocations" against East Germany by West German officials, it was disclosed here.

Notes to the Western embassies here were delivered and published in the government newspaper Izvestia.

Russia blamed West Berlin police and "fascist elements" for a series of incidents from May 23 to 27, including the killing of an East German border guard and a West German soldier.

The notes made no reference to Western announcements that an exchange of fire took place on a 15-year-old East German boy was fleeing to the British sector.

The notes said such action would not have been possible in power did not encourage such provocative activities.

U.S. TO REPLY

In Washington, U.S. officials said the Soviet note appeared to be a cover-up for "the brutal and unnecessary shootings by East German police of people attempting to escape to freedom."

Lincoln White, the state department spokesman, told a press conference that so far only a brief preliminary report of the note's contents had been received from the U.S. embassy in Moscow.

He said a reply would be sent to Moscow in due course after the full text of the note had been received and studied.

In Bonn, a West German foreign ministry spokesman said provocations on the sector border had been started by East German police and militiamen.

The Russian note said that "stepped-up machinations of reactionists and militarists from West Berlin confirm once more how ripe is the task of normalizing the situation in West Berlin and of eliminating the occupation regime there."

**Settling-Down Of Stock Market Is Experts' Hope**

NEW YORK (AP)—Wall Street calmed down last week and stock market experts hoped for a settling-down process that might last weeks or months.

The consensus was that only by such a stabilization could values in stocks be judged once more on their merits rather than as emotion.

Stocks took another "blue Monday" jolt—about half as big as the preceding Monday when the market suffered its worst dive since 1929. After some session Tuesday, the list went into gear for a vigorous advance Wednesday which recovered about half of Monday's loss.

The final two days brought a great decrease in trading and, on balance, a slight softening in prices. The dullness was a great relief to many in the Street.

"Anything that allows us to regain our equilibrium is good," said one broker.

"Biggest news of the week was President Kennedy's pledge to ask Congress for an across-the-board tax cut effective next Jan. 1. The market showed little response to this, however, because of Monday Treasury Secretary Dillon had said substantially the same thing. The fact that it would take effect—if adopted by Congress—next year rather than this removed some of the speculation."

This hand was played in the 1950 Masters Pair championship in England. Fourteen pairs participated in the event, which was won for the fourth time by Terence Reese and Boris Schapiro.

Three North-South pairs arrived at six trump, while the other four pairs (including Reese and Schapiro—on the bidding shown) strained for the ultimate and contracted for seven trump. At every table the declarer made exactly twelve tricks.

**RIPPLES BELIEVE IT OR NOT**

The grand slam was by no means a hopeless contract. It fell when declarer, at some point in the play, led a heart from dummy and finessed the jack in an effort to obtain a thirteenth trick.

Had the finesse w.o.n., the grand-slam-bidders would have come out all right, but with West having the queen, they went down one.

Precisely enough the grand slam could have been made—though by an abnormal line of play—had declarer been working out the solution in well-timed order. It is strictly a double-dummy proposition.

The way it works is this: Declarer wins the diamond lead in club, and plays the jack of hearts. West must cover with the queen; otherwise, declarer can let the jack ride.

North takes the ace and cashes all the clubs. Declarer then plays a diamond to the queen, whereupon this becomes the position:

South now cashes the king of diamonds, discarding a spade from dummy. East is queafed. If he discards a spade, declarer plays a ruse to the ace, felling the king, while if East discards a heart, declarer cashes the king of hearts to capture the rest of the tricks.
