

# NEW PRINCIPAL OF QUEEN'S APPOINTED

Dr. R. C. Wallace of the University of Alberta Succeeds Dr. W. Hamilton Fyfe.

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) KINGSTON, Ont., May 19. It was announced at Queen's University today that Dr. R. C. Wallace of the University of Alberta, Edmonton, has been appointed principal of Queen's University to succeed Dr. W. Hamilton Fyfe, who has accepted the principalship of Aberdeen University.

Dr. Wallace will assume his duties Sept. 1. Dr. R. C. Wallace, newly appointed principal of Queen's University, was born in Orkney, Scotland, June 15, 1881, son of James and Mary Wallace, both of Orkney. He was educated at Deerness Public School, Kirkwall Burgh School, Edinburgh University where he received his Master of Arts degree in 1907, Bachelor of Science in 1907 and Doctor of Science in 1912.

At Göttingen University in Germany he acquired his Ph.D. in 1909. Dr. Wallace went to the German University for graduate work from 1907 to 1909 and in 1909 to 1910 he took graduate work at St. Andrew's University, Aberdeen where he was a demonstrator in crystallography.

In 1910 Dr. Wallace came to Canada to become lecturer in geology and mineralogy at Manitoba University, later becoming professor of geology and mineralogy, a post he held until 1928. While in Manitoba he was commissioner of Northern Manitoba from 1918 to 1921 and in 1927 he was named commissioner of mines, the following year going to Alberta as president of the University of Alberta at Edmonton.

He is a writer of note and has held office in numerous organizations. From 1924 to 1925 he held the president of the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy. On May 9, 1912 he was married to Elizabeth Marcus Smith, daughter of Charles Smith of Orkney. They have one son and three daughters.

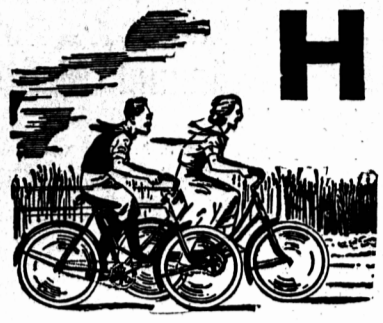

### Longshoremen Refuse To Load Vessel

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 20.—(C. P. Cable)—Because St. John's longshoremen refused to handle the consignment, the Furness-Withy line freighter Incomore sailed to-night without loading a cargo of 2,500 quintals of fish which had been sold to an Alicante, Spain, firm.

It was the day's second development in Newfoundland's longshore labor troubles. Earlier, the firm of W. J. Moores one of the Island's largest codfish exporting concerns, closed down after dock workers refused to unload 1,000 barrels of fish loaded at the company's carbonear fishery by non-union men.

The Alicante consignment had been brought from Carbonear on the vessels Ada Les haver and Lincoln.

Moores claim the union recently formed in Carbonear is not properly constituted and therefore refuse to recognize it.

St. John's longshoremen have been supporting the Carbonear organization with the hope of having it recognized.

Moores, who sent about 40 vessels to Labrador and last year carried 800 fishermen's accounts, say they will not supply this season. They claim it is useless catching fish if they are unable to sell the catch.

### Hocktide Kisses Not For Visitor

(By The Canadian Press) HUNGERFORD, Berks, England, May 19.—Ancient romantic customs are like rules—made to be broken. Not so many years ago men celebrated Hocktide Tuesday in this Berkshire town by demanding—and getting—kisses from the local girls. Today, one reporter says, "it's all a big swindle."

The Danes about 1000 A.D. Tuesday is the men's day, the male population demanding kisses. Traditionally if the girl demurs, they, by ancient law, pay forfeit. For this year's celebration several hopeful persons came to town, "banking" on plenty of kisses; or lots of forfeits according to his personal charm and the taste of the Hungerford women. Among the visitors was a London News-Chronicle reporter "not for an onlooker." Here are his findings: "First of all, only two men are entitled to demand these favors at Hocktide. They are two Tutti men who, hundreds of years ago, were called tithing men and whose job it was to keep watch and ward over the inhabitants of the town. Secondly you must be a commoner of Hungerford, sharing in the fishing and grazing rights given to the town by John of Gaunt, otherwise you have no chance of getting the glad eye. And thirdly, it rained and sleeted and drove everybody indoors.

"The only women I saw all afternoon were the waitresses at the hotel. They were too busy serving the Town Constable, the Keeper of the Keys and the common Coffer, the Ale Tasters, the Hayward for the Common Port Down and other ancient-holders, who were elected at the Town Hall this morning, with lunch and bowls of hot punch.
