

Local and Other Items.

FIRE WARDENS' MEETING.—The Fire Wardens will meet at seven o'clock to-night, sharp.

POLICE COURT.—Two Scott Act cases were adjourned for one week and four were dismissed.

INVESTIGATION.—The Board of Fire Wardens will hold an investigation into the fire of Saturday night, at the City Building, this evening, at 8 o'clock.

AT SOUBIS.—The SS. Stanley and about twenty fishing schooners were anchored at Soubis on Monday, owing to the northerly wind.

THE SHIFT.—The Artillery shift team to go to Quebec this year are determined to keep up the reputation of the Island. They did the shift last night in the excellent time of four minutes and 20 seconds.

ACKNOWLEDGMENT.—Mrs. McKinnon and Miss McGill beg to tender their thanks to the members of the Fire Department for their arduous and successful efforts to prevent the extension of the fire on Grafton Street on Saturday night last.

FIRE.—The store, warehouse and contents of H. C. Corpton, on the Commercial Road, Lot 61, was burnt last night at 10 o'clock. The property was insured in the Glasgow and London Insurance Company, F. Hyndman, Agent. Nothing except the scales was saved.

THE BOOM AT SPRINGHILL.—All the pits are working at Springhill and the mines are in full blast. Shipments are being made by rail to points along the I. C. R., and to Parrboro, to be re-shipped by vessel. At Parrboro several vessels are now taking cargo for various ports across the bay and for St. John. The mines have heavy orders on hand, and will be taxed to the utmost capacity for a long time to come.—Moncton Times.

SCHOONER SEIZED.—The schr. Snow Drift, Capt. Thomas Thistle of Souris, was seized on the 20th ult., at Great Bras D'Or, C. B., for violation of customs law. Fifty gallons rum, two cases gin and one case spirits were found on board and not entered on the clearance. Officer Kerr did the seizure. The schooner is now stripped, and a \$400 fine will probably be exacted before she is released. The Captain says the liquor was brought on board at French St. Pierre without his knowledge. He is chief owner of the vessel and purchased her not long since at Halifax at a cost of fifteen hundred dollars.

MOONLIGHT EXCURSION.—The annual moonlight excursion of the Artillery Brigade Band was held last night. The steamer St. Lawrence left the S. N. Co's wharf shortly after eight o'clock, and proceeded down the Hillsborough and out on the Bay as far as Point Prim. The night was lovely, the moonlight making it almost as bright as day. The water was calm as a mill pond. Everybody thoroughly enjoyed themselves. Music for dancing was furnished by the "String Band" and many were the couples who "tripped the light fantastic toe." Although there were between three and four hundred people aboard, there was no crowding or crushing as is sometimes seen, and after a most delightful sail the steamer arrived in town shortly before midnight.

A DASTARDLY ACT.—Last night, or early this morning, some miscreant entered the South End Boating Club's boat house and stole therefrom two of the row-boats belonging to their new four-oared shell, which was entered for the race to take place at Pictou this afternoon. The thief left no clue whatever, only the monkey wrench which he used in accomplishing this treacherous act being found on the floor, under the boat. What the miscreant's motive was for so doing is hard to say, but he evidently intended to ruin the reputation of the oarsmen of the South End who are endeavoring to keep up the reputation of Charlottetown in aquatics. This mean, contemptible, dastardly act cannot be laid at the door of anyone but a villain, who, with not enough heart to revenge himself on any one individual, took this underhand way of revenging his spite. Our only hope is that the coward will be captured and punished to the utmost extent of the law. We understand that the boat went, nevertheless, the crew agreeing to use two odd rowlocks.

THE RIFLE.

Matches at Ottawa—Good Shooting by Members of the Island Team.

OTTAWA, Sept. 2.

In the Nursery Match Corporal Baird wins four dollars, and in the McDougall match Sergt. Davison wins the fourth prize, fifteen dollars, Lieut. Stewart six dollars, and Surgeon Gillies five dollars. There is a large attendance of competitors.

OTTAWA, Sept. 1.

The Rideau Range was alive with marksmen to-day. The weather was fair and the wind tricky, with the consequence that there was poor shooting. In the Macdougall match, ranges 400 and 600 yards, five rounds at each, the principal prizes went as follows: Pte. Abbott, 596, cup and \$30, 45 points. Lt. Cream, 20th, \$25, 44 points. Lt. Loggie, N. B., \$20, 44 points. Lt. Davison, Ch'town, \$15, 44 points. Sergt. Gillies, 91st, \$15, 43 points. Sergt. Lordly, \$6, 39 points. Sergt. Henderson, \$6, 38 points; twenty-two thirty-sixes counted out. In this match three hundred and ninety-four competitors entered. The skirmishing match was completed, but the results are not fully known. It is understood that first place is taken by the 43rd of Ottawa.

The Rifle League held a very satisfactory meeting to-night. The officers were re-elected with very few changes. Sir Adolphe Caron has promised free ammunition and also a trophy for next year. On the whole the League is considered a great success.

PICTOU, Sept. 2.

In the interprovincial boat race held here to-day, the boat's crew from Charlottetown won the four-oared race by ten lengths. Time, sixteen minutes. The double scull race was also won by the Charlottetown crew, F. Collins and J. McKenna.

Tariff Amendment.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 1.

Senator Sherman presented to the Senate to-day what he said he would offer as an amendment to the Tariff Bill at the proper time. It was: "Whenever it shall be certified to the President that the Government of Canada agree by law or regulation to admit free of duty into all its ports coal mined in the United States, he shall make a proclamation of the fact, and thereafter, while such law or regulation is in force coal mined in Canada shall be admitted free of duty in all ports of the United States. Further, when it shall be duly certified to the President that the Government of Canada have declared a desire to enter into such commercial relations as will result in the complete or partial removal of duties upon the trade between Canada and the United States. He shall appoint three commissioners to meet those who may be designated to represent Canada, to consider the best method of extending the trade relations between Canada and the United States."

Reardon Captured.

FREDERICTON, N. B., Sept. 1.

Deputy Sheriff Hawthorne returned yesterday with Bartholomew Reardon in charge, whom he arrested at Northampton, Carleton County, on a warrant issued by Police Magistrate Marshen, on the information of Manus Gallagher, of Canterbury, for killing four of his cows by mixing poison with salt and scattering the mixture on the grass. Reardon was remanded till Wednesday morning for examination.

A Rough Passage.

CAPE TRAVERSE, Sept. 2.

The Press Cape left here at 9.30, and arrived at Cape Tormentine at 11.30. They had it very rough going over, owing to the high wind which prevailed. A good many of the party were sea-sick.

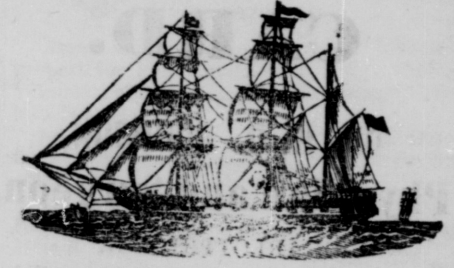
