National Park Shows Boost In July Visitors

The total number of visitors and campers to the P.E.I. National Park showed a normal increase for the month of July, despite the rain and abnormally cool weather. E.J. Kipping, park superintendent, reported yesterday.

July figures substantiate those of last year, he said, noting that when the actual traffic count was used at the park for the first time last year, a tremendous increase of visitors was indicated over previous years. This proves that before 1961 estimates were too low, he said.

Campers at the park during last month totalled 16,260, while the 1961 figure stood at 13,354. July's total visitors to the park this year numbered 49,505; last year's visitors were estimated at 47,191. Golfers and visitors to Green Gables also indicated a normal yearly increase.

"If we have a good August we might even do better," Mr. Kipping said.

4th Prince Liberals Nominate

ELLERSLIE — An enthusiastic crowd of about 130 Liberals last night nominated Harris Rogers, Brown, and Randall MacNeil, Mount Royal, for the post of councillor and assemblyman respectively for the 4th District of Prince in the next provincial election.

The meeting, held in Edwella Hall, was addressed by both of the newly-nominated candidates, provincial Liberal leader Alex Matheson, J. Watson MacNaught, Q.C., J. George Mackay, and Neil MacLeod. Clint Morrison presided at the meeting.

Mr. MacNeil was nominated by acclamation, while Mr. Rogers' lone opponent was William Newcombe, Northam. Ballots were cast in this case by representatives from each polling area in the district. Included was the delegation from the Lennox Island Indian reservation, who were exercising their new franchise for the first time.

A number of interesting comments were made by all speakers. MacNaught moved and provincial Liberal leader Alex Matheson seconded that the meeting send a resolution of sympathy to national Liberal leader Lester Pearson on the recent death of his mother.

The meeting also agreed to extend a vote of sympathy to the family of the late William Noye, who was termed "one of the great men of the party from this area." Mr. Noye died in December 1961.

Mr. Wood was born in Charlottetown on July 4, 1907, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Robert J. Wood.

At a very early age his father died and the family moved to Summerside where his mother operated a cannery which was owned by her late father, W. Arthur Leard.

Mr. Wood received his education in the Summerside schools before going to work with Brown, McKay and Co. as a cashier.

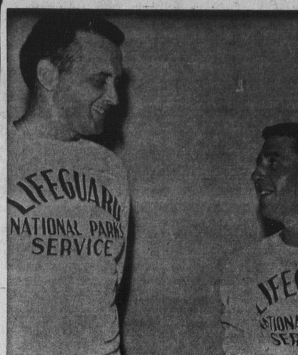

McQuaid Has Comment On S'ide Arrest Case

Attorney-General Melvin McQuaid issued the following statement yesterday in connection with a seven-day confinement in Prince County Jail of Stanford MacDougall and the M.F. Schurman Co. Ltd. for the past 25 years, was well and favorably known throughout Prince Edward Island.

The "unfortunate misunderstanding" reported in yesterday's press and which resulted in a confinement of Stanford MacDougall for a week in jail on a charge which "should never have come before the court" cannot be attributed to the lack of a Crown prosecutor for Prince County. At the time of Mr. MacDougall's confinement G.R. MacMahon was the Crown prosecutor for that county.

"If, as reported by Magistrate Hinton, Mr. MacDougall had an Aug. 2, already spent one week in jail, he must have been confined on or about July 27. Mr. MacMahon's resignation until July 31 and his services were therefore available before this information was laid.

"This 'unfortunate misunderstanding' is therefore attributable to one of two things: either the Crown prosecutor was not approached for advice before the information was laid and the warrant for arrest issued, or he was approached and refused to act in the matter.

"If the former is the case, then certainly no blame for the unfortunate misunderstanding can be placed on the attorney-general's department. If the latter is the case and Mr. MacMahon refused to act, the matter should have been immediately reported to the press, at that time Mr. MacMahon was very definitely an employee of my department.

"In any case, Magistrate Hinton was in error when he said, as reported in the press, that Mr. MacDougall's confinement would not have taken place if there had been a Crown prosecutor for Prince County.

"While no replacement has as yet been found for Mr. MacMahon, arrangements have been made to have services of a Crown prosecutor available when requested and required. This will include consultation service for both the RCMP and the Town of Summerside police in all cases in which they are in doubt as to whether or not information should be laid.

"There will certainly be no 'duals of justice' to any citizen of this province on the part of the attorney-general's department so long as I have charge of the administration of that department."

Shaw Resting At Home, Said 'Much Better'

Premier Walter R. Shaw is feeling "much better" and resting comfortably at home, a government spokesman said yesterday. The premier is undergoing a complete two week rest before returning to hospital for surgery.

While he is at home he is completely inaccessible and govern-

ment ministers have taken on his heavy government responsibilities, the official said.
