

Ten Indians Held By Chinese Reds

NEW DELHI (Reuters)—Communist China Sunday informed India that seven of the 17 Indian border police reported killed in a frontier clash last week are alive and in Chinese hands.

A note received by the Indian external affairs ministry showed that Chinese forces in the Kashmir province of Kadekh hold a total of 10 Indians.

The note informed India that Chinese forces arrested three members of an Indian party in Ladakh last Tuesday.

The Chinese are holding another seven Indian border police from a clash Wednesday and have recovered the bodies of nine Indians slain then, the note said.

ONE MISSING

This means that one Indian is missing of the 17 reported Friday by India to have been killed in Wednesday's clash.

The casualty list was released while Indian army troops were reported on the move to reinforce northern frontier posts threatened by Chinese forces.

Wednesday's clash was the most serious in a series between Indian border guards and Chinese troops in two separate regions of India's mountainous frontier—the Northeast Frontier Agency and Ladakh.

An Indian communique Friday said armed Chinese intruders, using grenades and mortar fire, made a surprise attack in superior force on the Indian patrol.

China said Indian troops violated Chinese frontiers and launched an "unwarranted army attack on Chinese frontier guards."

CLAIM LAND

The Chinese claim a 6,000-square-mile slice of Ladakh and recently built a road in the area. India says the place where the attack took place is 40 to 50 miles inside Indian territory.

Newspapers urged Prime Minister Nehru's government to think again about its policy of friendship toward China. Many called for a display of force to counter Chinese incursions.

Nehru Saturday at public meetings voiced India's determination to protect its frontiers but urged "restraint and responsibility" in the face of Chinese action.

University Subsidies Planned For Quebec

MONTREAL (CP)—Premier Sauve announced Saturday that Quebec province plans a program of regular yearly subsidies to universities.

He also said the province will help university building and expansion programs by guaranteeing loans contracted by the universities and defraying all or part of the interest charges on amortized funds.

He said the government must see to it that everyone of average income can afford a university education. Legislation would be introduced to promote this aim.

Speaking at a dinner in his honor at the University of Montreal, of which he is a graduate, Mr. Sauve said the aid programs will come from Quebec's own resources and not from federal grants.

POSSIBLY MORE

However federal grants, if they became available, would make Quebec's resources that much larger.

Since 1953, Quebec universities have received federal grants because of objections from the late premier Duplessis. About \$25,000,000 in federal money is being held in trust for them.

The universities have received annual grants from the provincial government, but these grants are given at the discretion of the government and not by legislation.

Mr. Sauve said there is no use developing the natural resources of a province and neglecting its

human resources. University education must be available to all who have the desire and the ability.

If universities had to rely on tuition fees alone to cover their administration costs, fees would be so high education would be restricted to the wealthy classes.

Yet universities must be able to rely on a certain yearly income. Otherwise they would not be able to plan ahead. The universities must be free of political pressure, and the public must be able to check on the spending of public funds.

EARLY ACTION

"For this reason the government will, on the first day of the legislature session, propose on the order of the day a bill to assure universities of a steady income," he said.

The government would see to it that by making grants to reduce yearly administration costs, universities would be able to keep their fees down to a level that people of average income can afford, and down to a level that those of below-average income could afford with the aid of the usual provincial government bursaries, loans and scholarships.

Mr. Sauve, who spoke in French, said the government intends to revise its procedure on contributing to building funds so as to avoid over-burdening the present generation for the benefit of future generations.

He said the government in the past has made outright grants to help universities put up new

Price Juggling Charged On Gas

TORONTO (CP)—H. C. M. Gordon, vice-president and general manager of the Dominion Coal Company, said Saturday natural gas companies are charging householders artificially high prices in order to attract more business from industries by offering them lower rates.

He also charged that oil companies have fixed high gasoline prices in order to sell heavy fuel oil at less than the cost of crude oil plus refining costs.

Mr. Gordon made these charges at a discussion on energy resources at the conference here of the Institute of Public Administration of Canada.

He suggested that the federal government ask the national energy board to take action to prevent these "unfair" prices, which were damaging the coal industry and leading to the loss of hundreds of thousands of tons of coal reserves.

RAPS ARGUMENT

The argument that resident consumers had to pay more to ensure an uninterrupted service was "fallacious," and "a mere subterfuge to capture markets formerly served by coal."

In the United States 70 per cent of gas was in steady supply, and the pattern in Canada followed this closely.

Mr. Gordon called for a higher duty on heavy fuel oil.

He denied that coal was an all-Industry or that its troubles

were due to inefficiency. The industry's "distressing" situation was due to competition from alternative fuels.

In about 15 years there would be a revival in the demand for coal, but heavy maintenance costs mean coal mines could not remain unproductive this long. The result would be permanent closure. 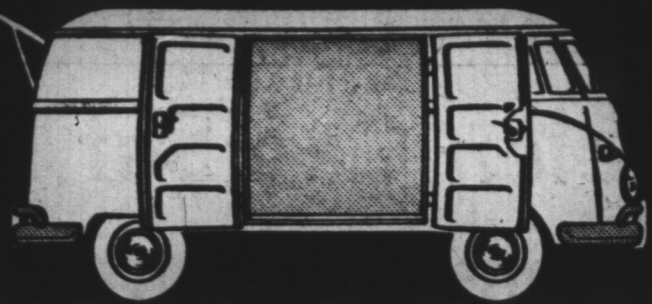
