PROGRESS OF THE ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH.—Rev. Dr. Kilroy, of Stratford, preached at St. Michael's Cathedral, Ottawa, last Sabbath. In the course of his remarks he stated as illustrative of the progress of Roman Catholicism in Canada, that 42 years ago there was but one church between Quebec and Sarnia, while to-day there are two archbishops, 14 suffragan bishops with 421 priests, attending to the spiritual wants of the Catholics, nineteen twentieths of whom were Irish exiles, or their immediate descendants.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, March 21. The House met at 3 o'clock. Sir Richard Cartwright inquired when the Budget speech would be delivered. Hon. Mr. Foster replied that his present intention was to deliver it on Thursday next. Mr. Blake then called attention to the unsatisfactory manner in which the private bill legislation is carried out, and announced that if the Government would entertain favorably the proposition, he would take steps to initiate a new system to be considered and reported upon by a joint committee of the Commons and Senate. The House then went into supply, taking up the appropriations for the Inland Revenue service, remaining in committee until midnight. The House adjourned at 12.15 until Wednesday next.

The Prince of Wales in Berlin.

BERLIN, March 21. The Prince of Wales arrived here this morning. He was received at the railway station by the Emperor, Empress Frederick and her daughters, and a number of Princesses of the reigning families of the German Empire. A guard of honor was also at the station. When the Prince alighted from the train the English National Anthem was played by the band. The Emperor and Prince of Wales entered a carriage and were driven to the Castle, escorted by a detachment of cavalry. The Emperor was attired in a uniform of a general of the English Dragoons, while the Prince of Wales wore the uniform of a German general. A large crowd assembled along the route from the station to the Castle, and warmly cheered the Emperor and Prince.

After Improved Communication.

OTTAWA, March 21. Mr. Russell, of Shediac, and Richard Hunt, of Summerside, P. E. I., are here, and will have interviews with the Minister of Finance and Minister of Public Works to-morrow. They want communication between Shediac and Summerside improved, and will ask the government to have an amount put in the supplementary estimates for that purpose. At present vessels loading deals at Shediac have to lay outside the harbor and have the deals floated to them. This Mr. Russell wants remedied, and will ask Sir Hector to have the harbor so dredged and deepened as to allow vessels of any size to come to the wharves and ship the deals dry.

The Architects Bill.

TORONTO, March 21. The Legislative last night struck out the vital clause in the bill constituting the profession of architects a close corporation. It was strongly attacked by the Opposition and the Government was left in a minority by a vote of 32 to 25. The clause gave power to architects to expel from their body a member guilty of disgraceful professional conduct.

British Politics.

LONDON, March 21. The House of Commons this evening, rejected, by a vote of 201 to 139, a motion to abolish hereditary representatives in Parliament, made by Labouchere. The Marquis of Salisbury moved in the House of Lords to-day, that the report of the Parnell Commission be approved. The motion was adopted without a division.

The Orange Bill.

OTTAWA, March 21. The Orange Bill, which was passed by the Senate Banking and Commerce Committee this morning, was read a third time in the Senate this afternoon and His Excellency will give it along with other measures the royal assent on Wednesday next.

Got Six Months.

MONTREAL, March 21. The Canadian Jute Co. has been lenient with Alex. Shaw, bookkeeper, who defrauded the firm out of \$25,000. They entered complaint for one item only, \$40 to-day Judge Dugas sent Shaw to jail for six months with hard labor.

Major-General Cook Dead.

CHICAGO, March 21. Major-General George Cook, U. S. A., in command of the department of Missouri, died at the Grand Pacific Hotel, this morning, very suddenly, of heart disease.

The Kemmler Case.

ALBANY, March 21. The Court of Appeals has confirmed the judgments of the courts below in the Kemmler murder case, declaring the electrical execution act constitutional.

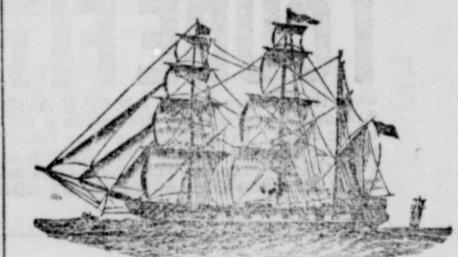

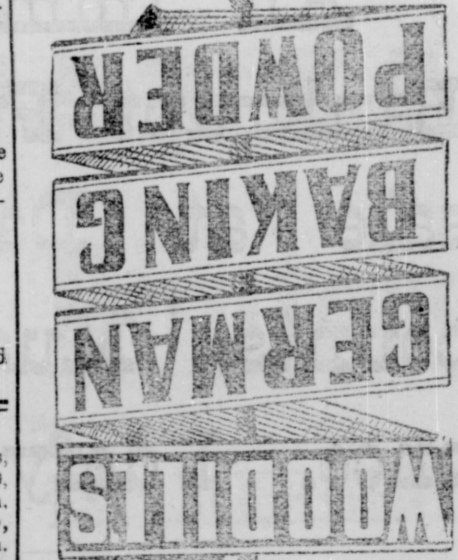
