AT BOARD OF TRADE ANNIVERSARY

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Need Immigrants Now For Next Expansion, Is View

Canadian Press Business Editor TORONTO (CP)—Now is the time to be looking for immigrants to meet the needs of the next period of expansion, Dr. J. R. Petrie, Montreal consulting economist, said Wednesday in an address to the joint annual meeting of the Bureau of Municipal Research and the Citizens Research Institute of Canada.

"From the time an applicant for immigration enters the 'pipe line' to the time he lands in Canada takes 18 months," Dr. Petrie said.

"Accordingly, if I were in charge of immigration — believing as I do that Canada will enter its next expansionist spurt in about two years time—I would have my agent in Europe rounding up workers now, rather than holding back."

"If we close the pipe line, after the present recession we will have a desperate shortage of some types of workers—as we had two years ago."

"Even in today's unemployment, there still are shortages in many skilled trades and professions. I suggest there always will be such shortages."

Dr. Petrie agreed that immigration should continue to be selective but Canada should go after the kind of people wanted, even to the extent of subsidization.

Post-war immigrants, Dr. Petrie said, are for the greater part either skilled workers or members of the professions.

"They brought substantial assets and had invested \$1,000,000, 000 in Canada's capital expansion. Many had founded industries."

"They had created vast new consumer markets which would grow — because, like everyone else, they are aspiring to increased standards of living."

ALMOND TWISTS 1. Measure into bowl 1 cup lukewarm water Stir in 2 teaspoons granulated sugar Sprinkle with contents of 2 envelopes Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast Let stand 10 minutes, THEN stir well. 2. Cream 1/2 cup butter or margarine Blend in 1/2 cup granulated sugar 1/2 teaspoon salt 2 well-beaten eggs Add the yeast mixture and 1 teaspoon vanilla Stir in 2 cups once-sifted all-purpose flour and beat until smooth and elastic. Work in an additional 2 1/2 cups (about) once-sifted all-purpose flour. 3. Turn out on lightly-floured board; knead until smooth and elastic; place in greased bowl. Brush top of dough with melted shortening. Cover. Let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk—about 1 hour. 4. Meantime prepare and combine 3/4 cup finely-crushed cracker crumbs 1/2 cup blanched almonds, finely-ground 3/4 cup granulated sugar 1 slightly-beaten egg 2 tablespoons water 1 1/2 teaspoons almond extract 5. Punch down dough. Turn out and halve the dough; set one portion aside to shape later. Roll one portion into a 12-inch square. Spread 3/4 of square with half the crumb mixture. Fold plain third of dough over crumb mixture, then fold remaining third over top—making 3 layers of dough and 2 of filling. Cut rectangle into 18 strips. Twist each strip twice; place on greased cookie sheet. Press 2 or 3 blanched almonds into filling of each twist. Brush with melted butter or margarine; sprinkle with sugar. Shape second portion, then repeat. Bake in moderate oven, 350°, 20 to 25 minutes. Yields 36 twists.
