City Resident Assessed \$125

During a Saturday morning session of city police court, Magistrate A.J. Haslam, Q.C. fined Arthur H. Coffin of Charlottetown \$125 and costs or 30 days after the accused pleaded guilty to a charge of impaired driving.

Omar Ferguson, Beaton Mills, charged with impaired driving was remanded to May 10 for trial.

Joseph McCloskey, city, charged with assault had a bench warrant issued for his arrest for failing to appear in court Saturday morning on a summons.

David Morris McCormack, city, charged with leaving the scene of an accident, was fined \$50 and costs or 30 days.

Keith MacLean, city, charged with failing to report an accident over \$100, was fined \$50 or 15 days. MacLean, also was arraigned on a charge of reporting an offence had been committed when it had not been committed. He was represented in both cases by Frank Sigsworth.

Rodney Douglas MacCallum, Dunstaffnage, charged with driving a motor vehicle without due care and attention, was fined \$40 and costs or 20 days. Lieutenant-Governor Addresses Graduates

Most Rev. Malcolm A. MacEachern, bishop of Charlottetown, and chancellor of St. Dunstan's University, presided at yesterday's convocation exercises and conferred degrees on the graduating class.

Lieutenant Governor W.J. MacDonald, who addressed the graduates, received an honorary degree of Doctor of Laws as did Rev. Canon E.M. Malone, former rector of St. Peter's Cathedral, Charlottetown.

His Honor told the graduates that life will be what one makes of it for himself or herself, no matter what profession is chosen to follow and in spite of wars, elections, the pill or the bomb.

Lieutenant Governor MacDonald regretted the inability of His Excellency, the Governor General and Madame Vanier, to be present. He cited them as "a truly Christian couple who are leaving their imprint on the Canadian nation that will not soon be erased."

INTEGRITY ESSENTIAL

The Lieutenant Governor told the graduates that integrity was the most essential quality for a good life and he cautioned them to be honest with themselves. Quoting Shakespeare His Honor said, "to thine own self be true, thou canst not then be false to any man."

His Honor was a member of the graduating class of 1922 and he looked back on St. Dunstan's and compared the one he knew with the St. Dunstan's of today.

"Change must be allowed for," he said, "but for an institution to have any value, it must

have some rigidity. St. Dunstan's is that type of structure; her foundation of faith and learning are as secure as ever, while the fabric of her tradition remains firm though flexible."

"We have been privileged to witness and to participate in a vast explosion of knowledge. No wonder that in our rapidly changing environment it is difficult to maintain a proper balance. Keeping balance on the tight-rope of modern education has become a great adventure. At St. Dunstan's keeping a proper balance has always been a tradition."

His Honor told those gathered that a university, like a nation, needs a sense of history as much as a sense of future. "It needs tradition as a means of measuring itself. This is especially so when much emphasis is placed on excessive specialization or too-early professionalism."

STAFF COMPARISON

In comparing the staff of St. Dunstan's in his time to the present the Lieutenant Governor noted there was one layman and several priests; now 60 per cent of the faculty are laymen and the calendar lists a faculty of 55, including several women.

His Honor said, "now students are receiving degrees today than the combined enrollment of all the university students attending here in 1922. The numbers are larger today and their aims and ambitions are different."

"Today students seek a voice

an university policy. They become personally involved in political and civic affairs; they lead an active social life. In interests which were hardly possible a generation ago. And the remarkable fact is that today's students pursue such interests even while being pressed to meet even higher standards of academic achievement."

On behalf of the Senate of St. Dunstan's University, Rev. Francis Ledwell and Rev. Charles MacDonald requested of the Chancellor, Most Rev. Malcolm A. MacEachern, that he confer the degrees of doctor of laws (honoris causa) upon Lieutenant-Governor W.J. MacDonald and Rev. E.M. Malone.

Father Ledwell delivered the citation for the Lieutenant-Governor, and Father MacDonald performed a similar function for Canon Malone.

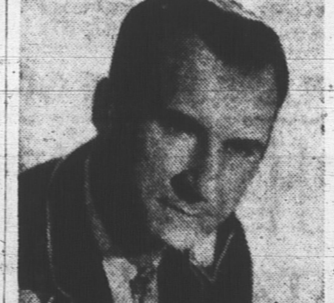
Fishing Boats Are Repaired

The severe pounding taken by the boats loosened the caulking and several of the boats had to be taken from the water immediately on arrival at the wharf. With the assistance of the boat plant staff the men worked throughout the weekend and had their boats ready for the water on Monday in time to overhaul their lobster traps. Without the slip several days fishing could have been lost at a cost of many hundreds of dollars.

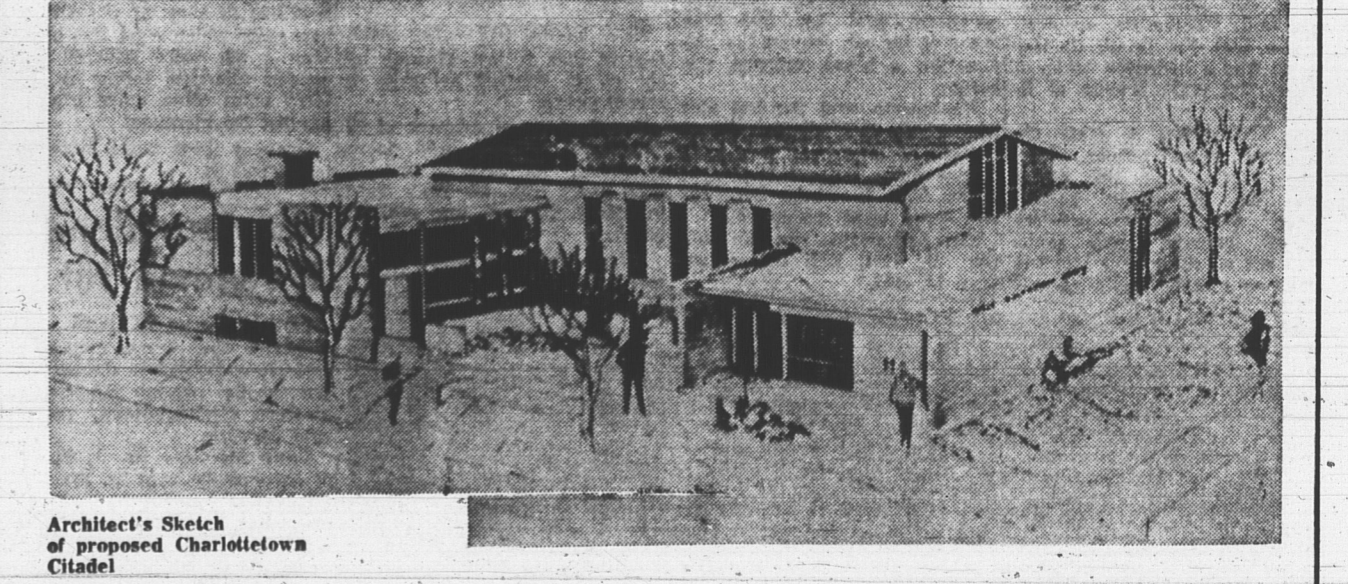
