GIFT OF PLATE.—Mr. David M-Gill, of Casseylands, having been for years of service to his Agricultural friends in P. E. Island, by his skill in selecting the most improved implements of husbandry, the best seeds, roots, and divers other articles, it was resolved, at a meeting of the Central Agricultural Society, held in Charlottetown, on the 6th of January last, to present our townsman with some token of regard, to mark at once the gratitude of the Association and the high sense its members entertain of "services alike unwearied and gratuitous."

The Annual General Meeting of the Princetown Agricultural Society was held at the house of Mr. George Bearsto, on Tuesday the 27th ultimo, when the Committee gave the following Report:—

The Committee would call the attention of the Society to the importance of its operations, since its institution in 1838, as manifested by the very superior state of husbandry at present, compared with what it was then—an improvement so conspicuous as to be apparent to the most superficial observer, and the good effects of which are so generally felt and acknowledged that your Committee need not use argument to support a fact which is already well established and incontrovertible.

the Society will be enabled to extend its enterprise, and thus operate upon a more extensive scale than formerly.

The Committee having audited the accounts and vouchers of the Society, find a balance in the hands of the Treasurer amounting to £36 5s., being an increase over last year of £8 13s. 5d.

Your Committee recommend the Society to advertise for tenders to have Fanners made to suit the mountings now on hand, and that the same, if not sold previous to the day on which the Princetown Fair be held, shall be sold publicly on that day.

The Committee further recommend that the Secretary be instructed to purchase a sufficient number of Wilkie's No. 2 Plough Mountings; also as much Clover, Timothy, and other seeds, of Island growth, as may be required for the Society during the current year.
