Mrs. MacInnis Gives C.C.F. View

Mrs. Muriel MacInnis, CCF candidate for Prince in the forthcoming election addressed a well attended meeting in Wellington Hall on Saturday evening June 1st. Mrs. MacInnis, dealt with the aims, policy and platform of the CCF party as opposed to the old line parties. She scored the concentration of capital and control of Canadian industry in the hands of a few powerful corporations and said that the CCF is the party of the common people working for the good of all instead of for the benefit of the few. She said that the Health Insurance being offered by the Liberals was a mere fragment of the complete coverage sought by the CCF and now in operation in the CCF Province of Saskatchewan. Unemployment Insurance For Farmers Next?

voluntary basis for Canadian farmers is receiving serious consideration by the Government, Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, Liberal candidate in Prince County, told a public meeting in Kensington last evening, and added that he hoped that the farmer could soon participate in the plan.

Mr. MacNaught made the announcement while discussing the recent addition of fishermen under the Unemployment Insurance Act, and other benefits provided by the Government for fishermen, which included insurance on lobster traps and fishing boats.
