EDISON'S WORKSHOP.

His Laboratory is Filled With Wonderful and Strange Things. Since the burning of his laboratory and workshop, some weeks ago, N. Kola Tesla, the electric inventor, has been making experiments in Ward Edison's factory, at Lewis in Park, N. J.

Edison's workshop is a large, four-story brick building, with an amazingly well-tanked on the roof. There are a very small building near by, and a high and strong fence so around is the whole place.

Edison himself or one of his assistants. Even with a pass, the ordinary visitor is not allowed to enter the workshop. There are many rooms in which delicate and often secret experiments are made, and where visitors would not be welcome if they were not admitted.

It is only the visitor who goes by Mr. Edison's special invitation, and who is taken around the workshop, pausing from time to time to explain, and who is escorted to him, who really sees many of the wonders of the place.

The largest room in the workshop is called the stock room. It is as big as two large houses, and it is fitted with thousands of drawers, cabinets, closets and shelves. In these receptacles are kept one of the greatest assortment of chemicals in the world. When Mr. Edison has a new idea he wants everything at hand for making his experiments.

If he had to wait to send for any material, the idea might be lost. It is not the electric lights nor the photographs nor any of the other things with which Mr. Edison's name is connected, that strikes the visitor as the greatest part of his work. It is the largest room in the workshop, the stock room, with which these things are made. The idea of the electric light would have been of no use to the world without a stockroom, and the same is true of the other parts. All of these machines had to be invented and made by the electrician, and there are thousands of them—some no bigger than a toy engine, some as large, nearly as a house. Many of them are so delicate that they are operated with a belt no longer than a shoestring. One of them is used in polishing jewels for use in the photograph. Without being touched by anybody it holds the tiny jewel in every possible position, shifting it, turning it, absolutely feeling it, while its delicate fingers are at work rubbing at the jewel, which is as big as the head of a large pin. No boy could move his fingers more dextrously than this machine moves its parts in turning the jewel around.—New York Commercial Advertiser.
