# Street Improvement Program Has Large

The paving program allowed to approximately \$100,000. Town Manager Joe Brophy said yesterday when questioned on the various projects which the Town of Summerside had undertaken this summer.

During the summer, Park, West and Clark streets were paved; Central, from Maple to the town boundary was widened; and also paved were Arcona, from LeFargy to Victoria Road and from Rogers Lane to Green Street; Ottawa, from Rogers Lane to East Street; Rogers Lane, from Granville to Arcona; Highland, from Central to Duke; Water Street was widened from Queen Street to the west rail, was crossing and sidewalks were also put in along this street.

Water Street was also widened from Spring Street to the CNR station. Both street widens and paved from Summer Street to Cedar. Granville was widened from the town boundary to sidewalks laid from Boston Ave. to Ryan Street. New sidewalks were also installed on Granville from Victoria Road to Boston Avenue and on Central from Maple to the town boundary.

Modern street lighting in the form of mercury vapor, color corrected lights were installed along Water Street, with the same type of lighting being removed along this street, being installed on Water Street East. This project was completed in the town approximately \$12,000.

A ten-inch bypass sanitary sewer was installed on Northumberland Street east of the town and a storm sewer storm sewer was installed from Central to Duke Streets.

Mr. Brophy also mentioned the fact that the town police department headed by Chief S. D. Pennington, had moved into new quarters earlier this month.

The old fire hall was renovated and modernized for police department. The Town, Mr. R. S. Hinton, Q.C., now holds his court in this building and meetings are also held there.

# Sophie Ramsay Dies Monday

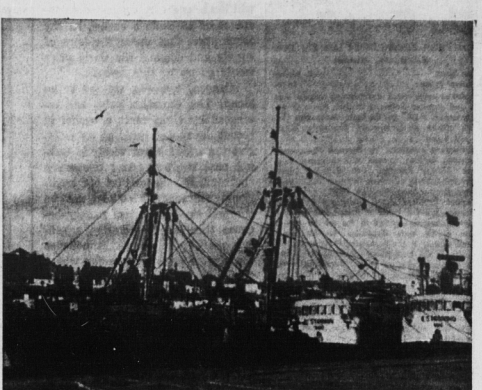
ALBERTON — The death of Miss Sophie Ramsay occurred Monday morning at the home of her brother, George Ramsay, South Killara.

# Regional Conference Of CWL Held In Tignish

TIGNISH — Members of St. Simon and St. Jude's parish council of the Catholic Women's League, spent the weekend of the first of the series of three regional CWL conferences for this year which was held at Tignish, Sunday afternoon and evening with some 190 delegates from 13 parish councils in the area.

The conference was chaired by the provincial president, Miss Iphigene Arsenault, Charlotteville, who also gave a resume of the important decisions reached at the national CWL convention held in Calgary during August.

Mrs. Harold Cormier, president of the Tignish parish council, as well as Rev. M. J. Moore, pastor of St. Simon and St. Jude's church and director of the CWL in Tignish, extended a welcome to the delegates.

Highlighting the afternoon session was the presentation of a past president's pin by Rev. George MacCormack, the provincial director, to Mrs. W. J. DesRoches of Misouche.

An excellent report on the Atlantic Provinces League conference held in Antigonish in late June of this year was given by Mrs. DesRoches who was one of the three CWL delegates in attendance from this province.

Plans for the national CWL convention to be held in Charlottetown on Oct. 18-19, 1963, were outlined by Mrs. Fred Macmillan of Charlottetown who is the convenor of the convention committee. This will be the second time this convention has been held in Charlottetown, the first having been held in the city 30 years ago when Mrs. W. J. DesRoches was national president.

CLEAN ELECTIONS — Important resolutions passed at the provincial and national CWL conventions were dealt with by the present assembly which urged councils to take local action particularly with regard to encouraging residents to promote clean elections by avoiding any type of bribery, and insisting on campaigns to eliminate litter from our streets, highways and public places.

Miss Arsenault mentioned the fact that three of the 15 resolutions adopted at the national convention were sent forward from this province including one recommending "CWL Week" to be held in each parish council in the month of April each year.

MINIMUM WAGES — Rev. George MacCormack spoke on several pertinent subjects including minimum wages. He stated that the new Minimum Wage Act should be made more realistic, the communication between employers and employees, Catholic programs on radio and television and a memorial gift to the new Mother's House of the Sisters of St. Martha.

Resolutions with regard to minimum wages and the liquor law were discussed and will be brought before the next assembly which is to be held Oct. 20 in Charlottetown, and Oct. 27 at Georgetown.

# Not Guilty Is Plea To Stealing Curse

Pleading not guilty to stealing a purse containing a sum of money less than \$50, Richard D. Castrod, Charlottetown, was remanded until Oct. 16, by Magistrate A.J. Haslam, Q.C. in city police court yesterday. Bail was set at \$100 cash.

Ernest Robert Johnson, Charlottetown, was given a one-year sentence for possession of a quantity of cigarettes and gum valued at less than \$50. The sentence was obtained by a commission of an indictable offence. He will also be required to enter into recognizance of \$500 composed of two sureties of \$250.

René Laviettrie, Cornwall, Ont., charged with disorderly conduct failed to appear in court. In this case it was decided that the accused would forfeit bail and a bench warrant would be issued for his appearance.

Leo Peters, 28 Commodity St., Charlottetown, charged with obstructing a police officer in the performance of his duty, was fined \$20 and costs or 10 days in jail.

Joseph Cannon, also of Charlottetown, was arraigned on a similar charge when he complained his wife. He was sentenced to 20 days in jail.

Ann Gaudin, Charlottetown, was fined \$10 and costs or five days for driving without due care and attention.

The case of Sunny Lake Farms, charged with delivering to a purchaser a motor vehicle not complying with the provisions of the Highway Traffic Act, was adjourned to Oct. 17.
