A correspondent who has just returned from a tour through the heart of Zululand reports the natives on the eve of a war of mutual extermination.

The British barque "Carnatio," Captain McPhail, from Bai Wan Foo, May 21, for New York or Montreal, has foundered; crew saved and arrived at St. Helena.

The Standard's Hong Kong despatch says troops continue to arrive from the north. Large amounts of bullion are on the way from Canton, supposed to be for war expenses.

Special reports of the corn crop outlook in the Western States are favorable for a grain of 75,000,000 bushels over last year, but South and elsewhere will about equal in amount short, so its entire crop promises about the same as last year.

Madden and Mitchell were at Kansas City on the 6th inst., Madden telegraphed Rice, manager for Slade, that unless a reply is received by Monday morning, accepting the proposal to fight in Mexico, he and Mitchell will return to New York and the fight will be declared off for ever.
