

P. E. Island's Initial Tree Farmer Certified Wed.

A young St. Louis farmer Ralph Peters, has the distinction of being Prince Edward Island's first certified tree farmer.

A Canadian forestry association certificate in recognition of his achievement was presented to Mr. Peters last night by Hon. Eugene Cullen, provincial minister of agriculture.

The award was made in Palmer Road Hall following a program planned to mark the unique event.

R. C. Parent, superintendent of the Charlottetown Experimental Farm, provincial forester J. F. Gaudet and W. M. Proffitt, George Label, of the extension dept. of St. Dunstan's University and Allan Palmer, agricultural representative for Prince County, were among those in attendance.

Before proceeding to the hall, a tour of the woodlot where Mr. Peters has been practicing selected cutting and proper forestry

management, was made by those present for the occasion.

J. Clovis Doucette of the Palmer Road Farmers' Institute acted as chairman for the program.

FIRST VISIT

The first speaker Mr. Cullen said it was his first visit to Palmer Road and he was very pleased to be present for the unique occasion. He congratulated Mr. Peters and considered he had worked hard and to good effect on his woodlot.

Mr. Cullen stated he had visited similar developments in the state of Maine and had been impressed with what could be done in preservation and improvement of woodlots. He congratulated Mr. Peters for leading the way on Prince Edward Island.

300 FARMS

Mr. Parent recalled many visits to Palmer Road some years ago when an illustration station was in operation on a farm owned by Sylvane Peters and said he was very happy to

be back again.

He informed the gathering that although tree farming only started in Canada in 1953 there are now 300 certified tree farms. He congratulated Mr. Peters for making the memorable occasion possible and commended Mr. Cullen for initiating the tree farm programme on P.E.I.

"Our forests are valued at approximately a million dollars," he said, "and with proper management could be worth four times that amount."

Mr. Gaudet, provincial forester, thanked the local Farmer's Institute for sponsoring the program, and gave an interesting address on "Tree Farming." In closing he congratulated Mr. Peters for his wonderful work over the 4-5 years.

The final speaker, M. W. Proffitt, spoke on the "Rules and Regulations of Tree Farming."

Proper management could result in doubling the growth on P.E.I., he said, and greatly reduce the annual import of lumber to the Province.

Road Paving Progressing

ALBERTON—The Hayes Paving Company has completed repaving the Tignish to Alberton highway (formerly light pavement) as far as Montrose Bridge and are now working on a three-mile section to connect St. Louis with the main highway.

The new asphalt surface is 201 feet wide and is of the same high quality asphalt as on the Trans Canada Highway.

Tenders have been called for a new bridge at Montrose, five feet higher and considerably wider than the present narrow bridge.

As far as could be learned last night to work of repaving will be continued through Alberton to the R.C.M.P. barracks following completion of the bridge.

Johnstone and heard short addresses by Walter Shaw, Provincial Leader of the Progressive Conservative Party; Dr. George Dewar, M. L. A. (2nd Prince); Dr. Orville Phillips, M.L.A. for Prince; Leo Rossister, M. L. A. (2nd Kings); and R. R. Bell, M. L. A. (2nd Queens).

The chairmen of the various committees, Resolution-Bennett Carr; Constitution—Gerald Foster; and Secretary—Lloyd MacPhail submitted their reports.

Fifteen members, one for each of the districts on Prince Edward Island were elected to the Executive Committee. Those elected included: Kings—Stewart Cameron, East Point; Stewart McEwan, St. Peter's Bay; John S. MacDonald, Cardigan; George White-way, Murray River and Garnet Reid, Murray Harbour North.

Queens—Lea Reid, Hope River; Sterling MacRae, New Wiltshire; John Smethurst, Marshfield; Lloyd Martin, Vernon and Carl MacKenna, Charlottetown. Prince—Billy Campbell, Alberton; Calvin MacLellan, Tyne Valley; George Riley, Malpeque; Ron Kennedy, Kensington and Urban Laughlin, Sherbrooke.

Among other resolutions passed were: the pledging of the Y.P.C.'s loyalty and devotion to Her Gracious Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II.; the Rt. Hon. John D. Deifenbaker, Leader of the Progressive Conservatives of Canada and W. R. Shaw, a life time Leader in the field of Agriculture and Leader of the P. C. Party in P. E. I.; the commending of the four outstanding members representing P. E. I. in the House of Commons for the great accomplishment in connection with the Federal participation in the road program for this province, thus benefiting the many farmers and fishermen as well as the tourist industry. Also the expansion of the airports as a necessary mode of travel in this as well as many public work programs.

In regard to the Hospital Insurance Plan it was noted that it has been some time since P. E. I. was committed to participate in the plan and that up to this date, no definite action has been taken on the part of the Matheson Government.

DISSATISFIED
The committee viewed with dissatisfaction the failure of the part of the Government of P. E. I. and it was time real action was taken to insure the Island's participation in the Hospital Plan.

The Young Conservatives recommend further action on the part of the Federal Government to provide unemployment insurance benefits to farm workers. They noted that it was increasingly hard for farmers to get enough farm help due to the competition provided by other branches of the employing industries offering superior employee benefits.

Noting the difficulty for farmers to get adequate long range farm credit and the fact that this Island's farm population was dropping at an alarming rate, The Young Conservatives recommended a system of farm credit supervised by the Government of P.E.I. along the lines suggested for the last two elections in the Progressive Conservative platform. Whereby a million dollar fund loaned at rates sufficient to pay the cost of administration be set up as soon as possible.

VOTES FROM WHEELCHAIR
CANBERRA, Australia (AP)—For the second time in a year the government has been defeated in the Senate on a "pajamas and wheelchair" vote. Labor summoned its full strength including Senator Donald Grant who was convalescing from an operation to defeat the government Wednesday 30 votes to 29. Grant, in pajamas, was brought from hospital in an ambulance and wheeled into the chamber.

\$36,391 Paving Work Approved By Council

SUMMERSIDE — A further expenditure of \$36,391 for street paving in Summerside was approved at a special council meeting last evening with the tender of Curran and Briggs Ltd. being accepted.

Mayor W. A. Currie presided and all councillors were present.

This expansion in the current street paving program was approved at a special meeting of council Sept. 10th and includes Cedar Street—from Notre Dame to Beaver at a cost of \$12,512; Summer Street—from the existing pavement, north to Coronation Avenue, cost \$3,965; Coronative Ave.—from Summer St. East to Granville, cost \$8,569; Victoria Road—from Granville to Ernest Walker's driveway, \$11,355.

The specifications for all streets include grade, curb, gravel and three inch asphalt concrete. Storm sewers are not included.

A provision was added to the Summer Street project stating that paving will be done if the full width of 24 feet can be obtained. This was added after a query by Coun. H. E. Clark in regard to this narrow portion of

The millionaire contractor filed the suit Monday against Local 1, Bricklayers, Masons and Plasterers International Union. Kelly accused the local of stating in a pamphlet that his company was behind in its payments to the union's welfare fund.
