Toronto Club Starts To Work

The Toronto Maple Leafs headed for training camp yesterday and team coach George 'Punch' Imlach announced that every position on the team is wide open with the exception of the goaltending job which will be shared by Terry Sawchuk and Johnny Bower.

Over the past few years Imlach has stuck with his regulars, but after getting knocked out in the Stanley Cup semifinals last year the 'straw boss' of the Maple Leafs has decided to shake-up the line-up.

The Leafs have several established NHL stars that will be making their debut in a Toronto uniform this season. Newcomers who have previous NHL experience will include: Marcel Pronovost, defence, Larry Jeffrey, Eddie Joyal, Orlando Kurtenbach and Andy Hebenton, all forwards.

With these newcomers plus all last year's team returning (with the exception of Dickie Moore) as well as several promising rookies, it will be tough to crack the Toronto line-up.

HUNTER'S CORNER

September's Cool Evenings Bring Back Many Memories

September is within a few short days from mid-month and night's already have that slight, undefinable tinge of winter on their breath. We have no regrets over the past summer for it was one that will long be remembered. Visiting tourists feel that we live in a sort of dream-land... surrounded by blue water, smooth, snowy beaches almost underfoot, red clay soil and an azure blue sky. We came near feeling that way ourselves this summer but we cannot forget snow clogged highways and howling nor'easters that almost take our breath away. Be that as it may old P.E.I. sure gave visitors something to remember last summer.

During the week this columnist has received numerous telephone calls in connection with recent happenings at Pisquid Pond, Peakes. It appears that a party of Indians from Manitoba have established a camp at Pisquid Pond and are as busy as beavers harvesting a bumper crop of wild rice. They have been described as 'a plague of locusts' as they leave nothing behind them but a swath of destruction. Residents of the area are concerned over what will happen to the ducks that flock to this 'food bonanza' every fall and duck hunters see their sport evaporating like mist before the rising sun.

Several hundred black ducks have been visiting the rice fields... or at least were making it a nightly point of call... and each flight was attracting more members. Pisquid has always been a favorite haunt for waterfowl and to say the least residents of the area as well as outside gunners flock to this pond for their opening morning sport. Local gossip has it that good quality wild rice... and Pisquid Pond rice is tops... is fetching one dollar per pound in the wild rice market. There is a rather tense atmosphere developing at Peakes and St. Patrick's Road districts and members that the proper authorities should investigate this touchy situation at Peakes without delay. Unless this wild rice matter is studied by competent Government officials the situation could get out of hand. I first started a hide and seek game with the Pisquid Ponders in 1930... and that wasn't yesterday... and can read them like an open book and, I'm not guessing when I suggest prompt action, in some form or other, without delay by qualified Government officials.

I had a talk with Eddy Acorn this week. He informed me that he had received word as to the identity of the animals. The one with the 5 1/2 x 4 prints is a Canada Lynx.

I have been requested not to divulge the identity of the other animal... and there is another... until some inquiries have been made in connection with its escape which is thought to have occurred three years ago. In all fairness I wish to state that the Wildlife Park at Rustico is not connected in any way with the two animals' entry into this province. It is this columnist's opinion that the Canada Lynx came to this province via the ice floe method.

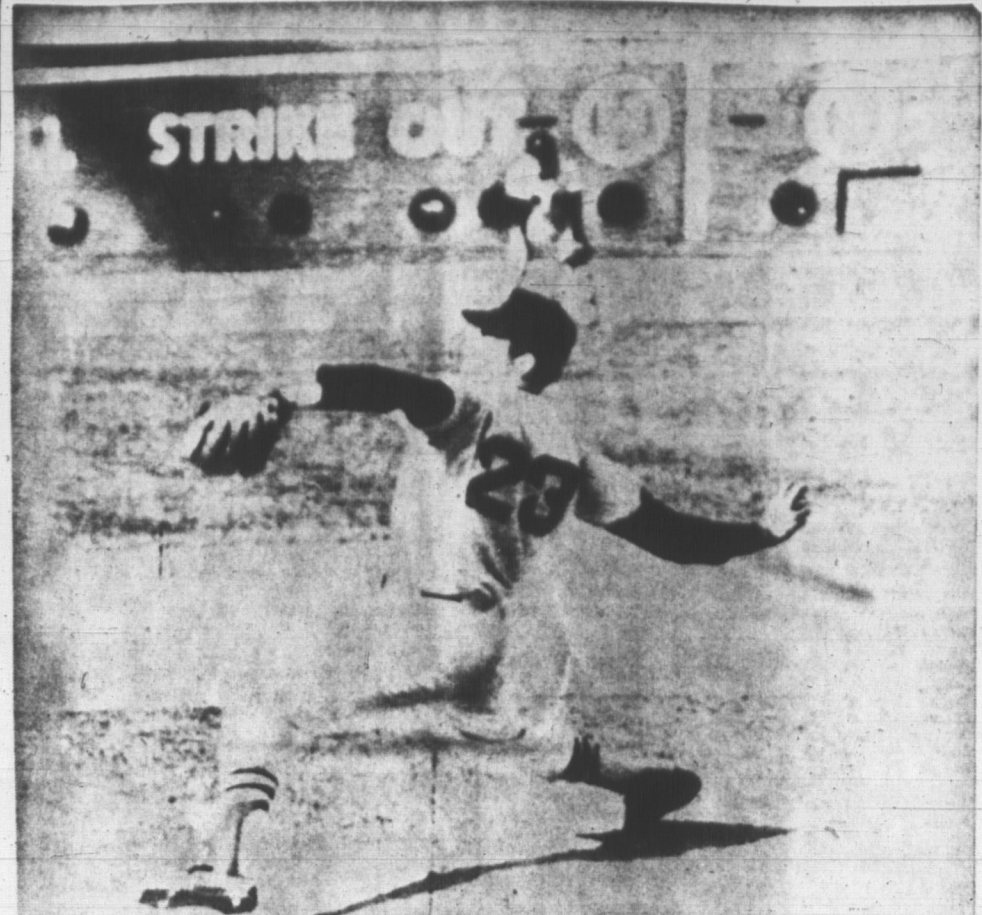
The 52-year-old entrepreneur, born in Hamilton but now an American citizen who lives in nearby Beverly Hills, made the announcement at a press conference.

Bostons Dave Moorehead Huris No-Hitter At Tribe

Dave Moorehead pitched—the first American League baseball no-hitter in three years Thursday, allowing only one man to reach base as Boston Red Sox defeated Cleveland Indians 2-0.

Morehead, a 23-year-old right-hander in his third year with Boston, walked Rocky Colavito second inning, then retired the on a 3-2 pitch leading off the next 24 batters in a row. After Colavito walked, Morehead struck out Fred Whitfield, Chuck Hinton and Pedro Gonzalez, retiring the side.

That walk kept Morehead from duplicating Sandy Koufax' feat of exactly one week ago when the Los Angeles Dodgers ace pitched a perfect game against Chicago Cubs in the National League.

In other afternoon baseball action, the Mets defeated Cincinnati Reds 7-3 at New York. The defeat dropped the Reds into a tie for second place in the National League with Los Angeles

Dodgers who shut out the Cubs 2-0 at Chicago.

At Boston, the Red Sox didn't get a run for Morehead until the sixth inning when Jim Gosger got the second Sox hit off Luis Tiant, his second single, and raced home as Dalton Jones tripled. In between Gosger's hits, Tiant retired 17 consecutive batters.

Morehead, who has been playing professional baseball for only five years, reached a three-all count to only two other batters, going 3-1 to Tiant and retired Colavito on a grounder.

Morehead was strong in the ninth. Larry Brown batted for Duke Sims leading off the inning and lined to shortstop Eddie Bressoud, who made a leaping catch. Lou Clinton then batted for Tiant and lined to Gosger in centre field, the fifth

ball hit to the outfield off Morehead.

Vic Davalillo batted for Dick Houser. Davalillo took two called strikes, then hit a soft tap back to the mound. Morehead fumbled the ball, then threw into the dirt, but first baseman Thomas scooped it up for the final out.

The victory was the 10th for Morehead, who has lost 16 games for the ninth-place Red Sox. He struck out eight.

It was the fourth no-hitter in the majors this year, including the one by Koufax. Cincinnati's Jim Maloney pitched the other two. He held New York Mets hitless for 10 innings before Johnny Lewis led off the 11th with a home run on June 14, then completed a 10-inning no-hitter against Chicago Cubs Aug. 19.

At New York, John Stephenson, who had only one home run going into the game, drove in four runs with a pair of homers as the Mets stopped the Reds. Stephenson smashed a three-run homer off starter John Taitouris in the third inning and came back with a leadoff homer against Garry Arigo in the eighth. He also beat out a bunt for a single and scored on pitcher Al Jackson's squeeze bunt in the Mets' two-run sixth.

Ron Hunt got the Mets started with his first home run of the season in the first inning. Jackson checked the Reds on four hits through seven innings. But Pete Rose and Vada Pinson singled in the eighth, and Deron Johnson, smacked his 30th homer with two-out, raising his major league-leading runs batted in total to 124.

KOUFAX IN RELIEF

After Osteen walked Billy Williams

came on and retired the Cubs in order.

Ch'ship Fight Set For Nov. 22

NEW YORK (AP) - Heavyweight champion Cassius Clay announced Thursday he will defend his title against Floyd Patterson at Las Vegas, Nev., Nov. 22.

"It's all set - the greatest fight in the history of boxing," said the champion, who prefers his Muslim name of Muhammad Ali.

Clay made the announcement himself at a press conference. Present were Herbert Mu-

hammad of Chicago, a son of the head of the Black Muslim sect, and Al Bolan, a Patterson adviser, who will be general manager of the promotion.

Bolan said the Nevada Athletic Commission, headed by Bud Traynor, had agreed unconditionally that it would be recognized as a world title fight.

NOW CONFIRMED  
"I received a wire from Traynor confirming this," said Bolan. "The story from Reno Tuesday was erroneous in saying that it would not be recognized for the title."

Sources involved in the promotion had expected to announce the Nov. 22 date and Las Vegas as the site at a press conference Tuesday. But a hitch developed in the plans when Edward Jacko, Clay's attorney, failed to appear, and the Reno story that it would not be a title fight in Nevada broke several hours before the press conference was scheduled to start.

The 15-round fight will be telecast coast to coast in the United States by closed circuit. Bolan said Clay will get 40 per cent and Patterson 20 per cent of the receipts.

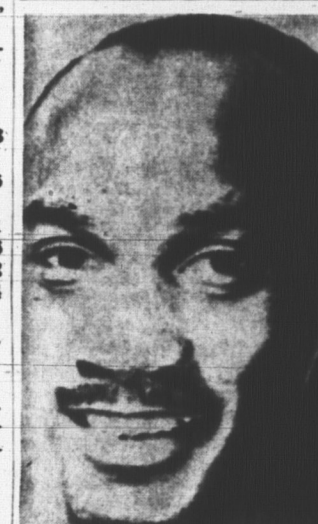
In Las Vegas, Jim Deskin, World Boxing Association president, disclosed that the fight would become part of a round-robin to settle the WBA heavyweight title.

Both Patterson and Clay will be asked to post bond to guarantee that the winner of their fight would defend his title in six months against the winner of a Chuvale-Terrell fight.

George Chuvale and Ernie Terrell will fight in Toronto Oct. 25.

The victor in that fight between winners of the first two bouts would be recognized as WBA champion, Deskin said.

George Dixon Quits Football

MONTREAL (CP) - Halfback George Dixon, the Eastern Football Conference rushing champion in 1962 and 1963, has advised Montreal Alouettes he is retiring from the game because of a knee injury.

Dixon announced his decision following a Thursday afternoon practice.

Dixon told Alouettes coach Jim Trimble several weeks ago he would retire if his right knee did not respond to treatment, and if he was unable to help the club.

The Thursday decision was reached after a consultation with team officials. In his earlier conversation with Trimble, Dixon had indicated his willingness to remain with the club until a replacement could be found and until he could further test the injury.

HOUSTON (AP) - San Francisco Giants whipped Houston Astros 5-1 Thursday night as they stretched their winning streak to 14 games and increased their National League lead to 4 1/2 games.
