### THE PRESBYTERY.

The Presbytery of P. E. Island met last evening in Zion Church Hall and was constituted, Mr. D. Sutherland, Moderator pro tempore with whom were present Messrs. Sterling, Spencer, Fullerton, Millar, Campbell, McLeod, Robertson, Layton, minister; Mr. T. C. Jamieson, and Hon. D. Laird, elders.

The Presbytery, upon a conjoint review of all his appearances, sustained the trial of Dr. Rob. Grierson and resolved to license and ordain him to the office of the holy ministry.

The Rev. Mr. Ness, who was present, was associated.

The Rev. Mr. Millar was nominated as a member of the committee on "Bills and Overtures" at the forthcoming assembly.

Arrangements were made for Dr. Grierson's preaching during the month of June.

The Presbytery then assembled in the church and public worship was conducted by Mr. Herdman, who preached from Isaiah 63.3, "I have trodden the wine press alone."

Mr. Sutherland narrated the steps and offered the ordination prayer, and Dr. Grierson was designated as missionary to Corea.

Mr. Sterling addressed the missioener and Mr. D. B. McLeod the people. The following resolutions were carried:

Whereas the Federal Government has decided to submit the question of the prohibition of the manufacture, importation and sale of intoxicating liquors to a vote of the people by a plebiscite;

And whereas the General Assembly has earnestly exhorted members and adherents of the Presbyterian Church in Canada to use their utmost endeavours in every lawful way to carry the plebiscite in favour of prohibition;

Therefore resolved that this Presbytery urges upon the sessions and congregations within its bounds to vote for and to use their influence in favour of such prohibition when the said plebiscite is taken.

This Presbytery places itself on record as opposed to the sale of intoxicating liquors as a "beverage" under a license tax, or any other system.

The Presbytery then adjourned to meet on the 2nd day of August, in St. James' Hall, Charlottetown, at the hour of 11 a. m.

FULLERTON'S MAR H BRIDGE is reported to be in a fearful state. The government do nothing about it, and those who reside in the vicinity are contemplating the holding of a "social" to obtain money for its repair.

My father and mother, and all my forebears, were Scotch exclusively. Your faithful and obedient servant, W. E. Gladstone."

AFTER OATS.—The steamer Annandale arrived from Liverpool this morning and will load with oats for Great Britain. The cargo will consist of about 100,000 bushels and will be shipped by Messrs. Rattenbury and Toombs. It is expected that the steamer will be ready to leave port about the 10th inst. The passage out was made in twelve days.

A NEW INDUSTRY.—The Farmer says: A new industry has been started this spring at the Narrows, near Bidford. Mr. Albert Williams, of Bidford, is acting for a Mr. "Caffer" of New York, and is about shipping nearly a hundred bags of quahaugs to the American commercial metropolis. These shellfish are raked up in the Narrows by the ordinary oyster tongs and are then placed in strong, coarse canvas bags. They are considered a great delicacy in New York.

SUNDAY SCHOOL MEETING.—At the annual meeting of the First Methodist Church Sunday School, last evening, the following officers were elected: superintendent, J. A. Moore; assistant, James Paton; secretary, Wesley Davy; treasurer, A. E. Smith; librarian, Chas. Dree; organist, Mrs. George Stanley. The reports of the various departments showed the number of officers to be 10, teachers 42, scholars in bible class 106, intermediate department 285; primary department 114, a total of 565. The average attendance was 317. The number of library books in circulation was upwards of 1,000.

RECKLESS DRIVING.—Complaints are made regarding reckless driving on the park road way. Last evening whilst several young men were racing their horses about the place, one of the "teams" came in collision with a carriage driven by Miss Louisa Lawson and Miss Laura Foster, causing their horse to become unmanageable and the occupants of the carriage to be thrown out. Both ladies were somewhat injured, and the carriage was damaged. It is said that the persons who caused the accident never stopped their horses to ascertain the danger or render assistance. It is too bad that such a state of affairs should be allowed to exist so long on this beautiful thoroughfare and it is hoped that for the future racing and reckless driving will be absolutely prohibited.
