WASHINGTON (CP)—Canada and the U.S. Wednesday made what External Affairs Minister Paul Martin described as "considerable progress" in their talks on the proposed Canadian 12-mile coastal fisheries boundary and agreed to hold another round of talks at Ottawa next month.

Martin said the Ottawa meeting on the subject—will probably be the final one and that the two countries will reach a "consensus" on the issue.

Fisheries Minister H. J. Robichaud, who accompanied him, agreed that "good progress" had been made and that "we are coming to some agreement on this."
