

Cement Plant Is Announced

The immediate construction of a \$2,000,000 cement storage and distribution plant near Port Borden, Prince Edward Island, by the Maritime Cement Company Limited, was announced yesterday by B. Hamilton, president and general manager of that company, and by A. Austin Scales, president of Industrial Enterprises Inc., Charlottetown. The plant is expected to be in operation early in 1967.

Port Borden, Mr. Hamilton said, is an ideal site for the plant because of its year round transportation facilities and its easy access to such important commercial centers as Charlottetown and Summerside. The new plant will be of the most modern design and will provide an ample supply of all well-known Maritime cement brands, including normal Portland cement, masonry cement and high early strength cement.

"The decision to build a storage and distribution plant in Prince Edward Island," Mr. Hamilton said, "was based on the growing demand in the province for the Maritime Cement Company products. Today in Prince Edward Island, there is a marked increase in the use of cement for construction of all types. Concrete and concrete products are being used extensively in new buildings, bridges, roads and in various other areas such as the construction of docks, breakwaters, water and sewage systems, in residential construction, on the farm and in the new Causeway."

"The province of Prince Edward Island is among the leaders in this country in the use of soil-cement as a road stabilizer."

Water Talks Proposal Is Rejected

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. House of Representatives has defeated a resolution to authorize the spending of \$1,200,000 for an 11-day international conference on water for peace in Washington next May.

The conference, to be attended by 1,200 delegates and 2,800 observers from 95 countries, including Canada, would be held to consider the world's water problems.

The vote for the resolution was 161 to 154 but under a procedure requiring a two-thirds majority, the resolution was lost.

The Senate passed measure can be brought up again under a procedure requiring a simple majority for passage.

Representative H. R. Gross (Rep-Iowa) assailed the resolution.

"We received a message from the president last week saying we ought to practise prudence and austerity," he said. "I don't see much austerity in this measure."

Representative Dante B. Pascell (Dem-Fla.) said the conference is necessary in order that there can be an exchange of ideas of the water problems of the world.

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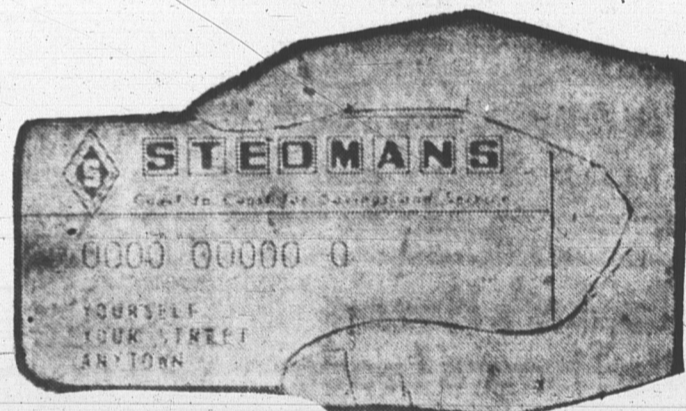

Fish Landings Reported Heavy

TIGNISH — With cramped facilities and a shortage of manpower the Tignish Fisheries Co-operative are facing the heaviest ground fish landings ever recorded in the history of the fisheries. Fifty boats are landing record catches of dressed fish as high as five and six thousand pounds a day.

The fish processed at Tignish Run go through a mechanical like process that takes them from the wharf to the splitting room, then on to the salting room where they are put into vats, from there they are transported by truck over to Jude's Point where they are filleted and packaged for shipment.

A causeway from Jude's Point to the north side of the Tignish Run is anxiously looked forward to by the Fisheries, as it will eliminate over four miles of road travel for just a few hundred feet.

Over two million pounds of fish has been landed so far this summer and transported over the road. Over fifty thousand pounds of fresh fillets were processed during the month of August in the new cold storage plant at Jude's Point.

The fishermen are not landing mackerel at the present time, but it is understood mackerel fillets are much in demand.

The spring lobster season at the Tignish plant broke all records by ten thousand pounds. The fall catch is expected to be the same as last year if the last two weeks continue to have favorable weather.

The markets for all fish are reported by the manager Wilson J. Shea to be excellent.

It looks like a lot of fish when you visit the expanding plant, but with demands of fish on the increase it looks as if some orders will be left as in the past year unfilled.

Blaze Destroys Trailer

SUMMERSIDE — Approximately \$400 damage was caused two miles east of here last night when a trailer load of straw went up in flames on the main highway about six o'clock.

The tractor-trailer was heading to Summerside with a load of straw from the farm of Roy Simmons in Wilnot Valley, and was driven by Kenny Milligan. Milligan just unhooked the tractor from the trailer in time. Otherwise it too would have been lost in the fire. The trailer which was being used for the first time and \$30 worth of straw were destroyed in the flames.

Observers at the scene said that the fire probably started from a spark which blew back from the tractor. A brisk wind fanned the flames quickly and in an effort to get the fire off the main highway, the ignited straw nearly capized on the tractor.

Although some of the flaming straw landed on the road, witnesses brushed it to one side, and traffic was not impeded. Some stopped to observe the unique sight of a trailer of straw on fire.

The fire burnt itself out in about one and one-half hours.
