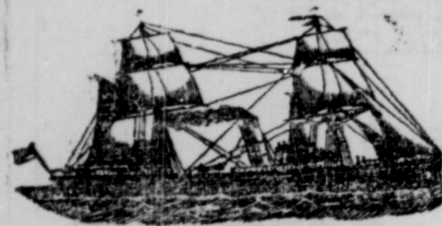

WANTED.

Better Trading Facilities Between Georgetown, Souris and Annandale.

Letter No 2.

Sir,—As the minds of the husbandmen are now free from the worry and care caused by the work of preparing and seeding the soil from which they expect, a few months hence, to reap a bountiful harvest as the reward of this toil, I will now take the opportunity of bringing before them, (as well as all other citizens of our common country), some facts regarding the way that we have been defrauded of our share of the public money by both the Local and Dominion Governments. As for Souris I have no cause for complaint, as it has received from all parties a bountiful share. But Annandale and Georgetown have not. Since confederation Souris has expended in protecting its harbor hundreds of thousands of dollars. But I do not for one moment wish to say that Souris harbor did not need this protection for it really did; what I complain of is that we have not received a widow's mite in comparison to our needs. For, sir, any competent person will admit that there is a far better show for a first-class harbor at Annandale than ever there can be at Souris, whilst Georgetown's merits are so well known to need any mention. Since the Dominion Government commenced to look after the wharves there has been spent on the three Dominion wharves at Grand River about seven thousand dollars, and sir, you must take into consideration the fact that there is shipped from these wharves the surplus produce of seven of the finest farming districts of this Province,—districts that would, if given anything of a fighting chance, be a credit to the Dominion, leave alone this Province. The Local Government used to grant a subsidy to a sailing or steam packet, but, like the exhibition grants and the magnificent encouragement to School teachers, it has been taken away to fill the hungry pockets of some sturdy friend of the party. While the present Dominion Government, with a little more magnanimity than its predecessors, have, out of their full coffers donated a few score (they never reach hundreds) dollars per year to patch up Annandale wharf they must keep down in the secret recesses of their hearts wonder what sort of simple minded people live about here that can be satisfied with so little public money. The late local Conservative Government did build ferry docks at Lower Cardigan; but the story has been given (I do not know how truly) that one of the chiefs of the Liberal party in confidence you know as they always do, that there would never be a steamer put on; and I must not forget to say that the dredge Prince Edward dug a few scow-loads of mud at several different points in the river a few years ago for the purpose of keeping the men in exercise as we could always keep the vessels afloat inside if we could only get water enough on the bar to bring them in.

I will now close, and in my next and last I will give a list of some improvements that are needed on Grand and Cardigan rivers to make the settlements on their banks hives of industry.

STANHOPE NOTES.

Times are looking brisk here this summer although the fishing has not been as good as other years.

The Mutch Hotel is preparing for a large season's work as eight American families are already booked. Mr. Devlin and family has just arrived and the whistle of his steam yacht will soon be heard.

The government sent their engineer out here last March and sold three hundred dollars worth of repairing work between Shaw's Cove and Mutch's Hotel on the Stanhope Road to six different parties and appointed Mr. Bruce Leitch inspector. The work commenced about the middle of April and still continues and will for at least six weeks yet. Much to the satisfaction of the inspector who receives over one dollar a day for about ten minutes walk every day. But that is to be expected as there seems to be a family compact with the government: A brother in the Savings Bank, father-in-law getting a summer's work on the bridges of the district, a wife's uncle getting large contracts on roads with out sale or tender, with two cousins drawing about \$150 a year from the Dominion Government for the lights and buoys at Covehead Harbor.

Is that the policy Mr. A. B. Warburton promised us in his speech last winter. They talk about the old family compact. It could not be worse. The bridges in this part of the district, never were in a worse condition, as can be seen by Cass's Bridge, the third largest bridge on the Island, which is so bad that teams with loads will not cross it. I would advise the present leader of the Government, if such a person exists, to get the loan of the chains from the Hon. D. Farquharson with which he said he used to anchor the West River Bridges under the Tory Government and send them to Inspector Leitch to anchor Cass's bridge to keep it from floating down Covehead Bay and Garney's Bridge from going down the stream. With a Commissioner of Public Works, Engineer, Supervisor, and a host of others drawing pay from the Government, the farmers are getting their eyes opened and are ready for a change.

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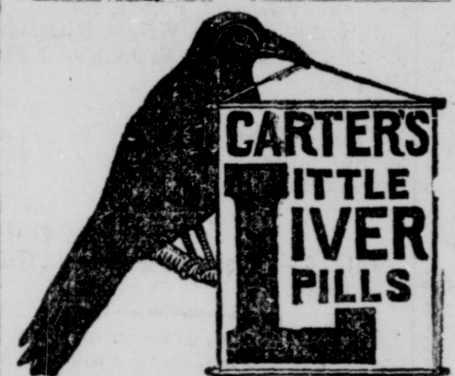
