Beaten By Austrians

Canadian Figure-Skating Team Lose Championship

GARMISCH, Germany (CP) — Frances Dafeo and Norris Bowden, representing Canada for the last time in international competition, Thursday night lost their world pairs figure-skating title to the same Austrian couple that defeated them an Olympic title.

The Toronto pair lost out to Austria's Elisabeth Sissy Schwarz and Kurt Oppelt by a slim three points, 1,136 to 1,133 in their final appearance before retiring from tournament competition.

The defeat recalled the narrow margin by which Schwarz and Oppelt edged out the Canadians at Cortina d'Ampezzo, Italy, two weeks ago. The race then was so close that both couples were reported unofficially to have won.

In Thursday's competition young Barbara Wagner and Robert Paul of Toronto placed fifth with 1,073 points. They were sixth at Cortina.

Canadian champion Charles Snelling, also of Toronto, finished a surprising fourth at the end of men's compulsory school figures.

Hayes Allen Jenkins of the United States, the Olympic and defending world champion, took first place while two other American-Ronnie Robertson and Hayes' younger brother David placed second and third respectively.

Hayes Allen Jenkins received 1,018.6 points, Robertson 998, David Jenkins 952 and Snelling 910. The men show off their free skating ability today, when the title will be decided.

Carole Jane Pachl of Montreal, Czech-born Canadian women's champion, was forced to withdraw from the singles championships because of an inflammation of her back muscles. Only other Canadian in the women's singles is Ann Johnston of Toronto. Carole Jane finished sixth in the Olympics and Miss Johnston ninth.

Miss Dafeo and Bowden were the popular choice for the pairs title. They drew nearly twice the cheers of their Austria opponents but not the votes of the judges.

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Brundage Says New Concept Of Amateur Needed

NEW YORK (CP)—Avery Brundage, president of the International Olympic Committee, warned Thursday that the United States must gain a new concept of amateur sports if the growing challenge of the Russians is to be met.

"As you know, I am opposed to this idea of throwing one nation against another in the Olympic games," he said. "It is not the Olympic idea. But we cannot ignore the fact that Russia is putting tremendous emphasis on development of its sports teams."

Brundage, wealthy Chicago hotel owner, arrived here by air Thursday from the winter Games at Cortina, Italy, where the Russians won unofficial team sixth.

In making comparisons we must remember these three things," said Brundage. "First, sport is a bigger thing in Russia than in America; two, the athletes over there haven't the distractions which confront our boys and girls; third, they train constantly."

Brundage said the benefit of training was evidenced in Russia's hockey victories over the United States and Canada.

"The Russian team was an instrument of precision. We and the Canadians have had better individual players. But they had the best team. They had played together for months as a unit. Our team was picked up from here and there."

Swaps Returns To Racing Scene

ARCADIA, Calif. (AP) — The long-delayed return to racing of California's thoroughbred pride, Swaps, appeared assured for today after the horse was formally entered in the \$15,000 Los Angeles County Handicap at Santa Anita Park.

Mesback Tenney, who trains the 1955 Kentucky Derby winner for owner Rex C. Ellsworth, seemed satisfied with weather conditions and prospects as he named Swaps and his stablemate, El Drag, for the 1-16 mile feature.

A brisk chill wind Thursday all but assured a fast track—which Tenney demands.

If all goes well, it will be Swaps' only chance for a tune-up for the \$100,000 Santa Anita Handicap a week from Saturday and his first race since he re-injured his right front foot in the famous and losing match race with Nashua in Chicago last August.

Sonshine's Co. Into Bankruptcy

TORONTO (CP)—A Toronto furniture company, partly owned by Harry Sonshine, team manager of Toronto Argonauts' football club, has filed papers in bankruptcy court listing liabilities estimated at \$384,240.

The Hart Equipment Corporation, Ltd., of which Sonshine is named as secretary-treasurer, made the bankruptcy assignment Tuesday. It named William Louis Walton of Toronto as trustee.

Mr. Walton's office said a creditors' meeting will be held here within three weeks when inventories of the Hart company's assets have been made. Assets were estimated at \$390,000.

Sonshine's interest in the Hart Company is only one of many business interests it is said. Besides being unpaid team manager of the Argos, he owns a plywood-door manufacturing company, a steel-tubing company, a steel-door and hardware company and a bowling alley.

The 41-year-old businessman told Maclean's Magazine last year his assets were around \$3,000,000.

New Tribe Owners Put Up Less Than Announced Price

CLEVELAND (CP)—When a new group takes over the Cleveland Indians, it will put up less than half of the announced purchase price of nearly \$4,000,000, the Cleveland News said Thursday.

Shares held by the present stock owners are valued at \$1.550 each. But for each share, the new owners will pay \$800 in cash and issue a note for \$750. The News said.

Three men—investment broker William R. Daley, Tribe General Manager Hank Greenberg and oilman Ignatius A. O'Shaughnessy—are expected to take over the team for \$3,961,000 in the next few weeks.

Canuck Holds Commanding Lead

ST. MORITZ, Switzerland (Reuters)—Douglas Connor, 38-year-old Canadian world cresta champion from Montreal, held a commanding lead at the end of the first day of the Curzon Cup on the ice-coated cresta tobogganing run here Thursday.

He went down the 1,000-metre course three times for an aggregate time of 137.3 seconds. His second run of 45.6 seconds was the fastest of the day and was only one second outside Connor's own world record made a year ago.

Nino Bibbia, Italy, held second place with 138.0 seconds, and Christian Stucki, Switzerland, was third with 139.1 seconds. Each competitor will have three more runs today.

St. John Beavers Whip Amherst 4-1

SAINT JOHN, N. B. (CP) — Three first period goals were more than Saint John Beavers needed to down Amherst Ramblers 4-1 in a tame Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League fixture Thursday night.

Saint John added the lone tally of the middle frame to complete its total, Jackie Schmidt, aided by Bob Gray and Pierre Brillant, averted a shutout against Ramblers well along in the third.

Beavers who clinched first place in the regular schedule earlier this week, are 16 points ahead of second place Amherst.

Lloyd Hitchberger opened the scoring and then helped Nick Nicolle. Ron Rubic made it 3-0 before the first session ended. Rubic and Gerry Smith assisted the second period tally by Bill Barrett.

Basilio-Saxton Sign Contracts For Title Bout

CHICAGO (AP)—Welterweight champion Carmen Basilio and challenger Johnny Saxton Thursday signed formal contracts for their March 14 title bout at the Chicago Stadium.

The contract calls for each fighter to get 30 per cent of the net gate and a similar cut of an expected \$50,000 or \$60,000 from TV and radio. A re-match stipulation is expected to be agreed upon.

The bout originally scheduled for Feb. 15, was postponed because of Basilio's illness.
