## \$1,000 BOND

### Georgetown Resident Committed For Trial

Provincial Magistrate for Prince Edward Island, James B. Johnston, Q.C. presided at a special sitting of the Magistrate's Court in Georgetown on Tuesday. The Crown was represented by Deputy Attorney General, J. Arthur McGuigan, Q.C.

John Charles Martell of Georgetown elected trial by judge and jury on a charge of breaking and entering the residence of Dennis Mossman of Souris and committing the indictable offence therein of assault. Martell was represented by G.R. Foster, Q.C. The Magistrate presided to hold a preliminary hearing with Dennis Mossman, Mrs. Dennis Mossman and Constable Wayne Durling of the Souris Detachment of the R.C.M.P., giving evidence for the Crown. The accused did not present any evidence. Martell was committed to stand trial at the next sitting of the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island was later released on a bond in the amount of \$1,000, with two sureties of \$500 each.

Martell pleaded guilty to assaulting Brian Curley and was fined \$20 and costs. A charge against Martell of causing a disturbance in a public place by fighting was dismissed following evidence. Martell was fined \$10 and costs for failing to transfer the registration of a motor vehicle and was also fined twenty-five dollars and costs on a charge of being the owner of a motor vehicle and failing to furnish the name of the driver of the motor vehicle for an alleged offence.

Ernest Owen Roche of Georgetown, charged with breaking and entering the home of Dennis Mossman and committing the indictable offence of assault, elected trial by Judge and Jury. He was not represented by Counsel and conducted his own defence at the preliminary hearing. Giving evidence for the Crown were: Dennis Mossman; Mrs. Dennis Mossman and Const. Daniel Wayne Durling of the Souris Detachment, R.C.M.P. The accused gave evidence on his own behalf and called his father, Ernest Roche and his mother Mrs. Ernest Roche as defence-witnesses.

The accused was committed to stand trial at the next sitting of the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island and was later released on a bond in the amount of \$1,000, with one surety of \$1,000.

### PLEADED GUILTY

Clifton John Sheldon Burke of Souris and James Robert Cheverie, also of Souris, both of whom, at an earlier sitting of the Court had elected trial by Magistrate and pleaded guilty to forcibly attempting to break out of custody at Kings County Jail at Georgetown, were each sentenced to serve one year in Dorchester Penitentiary.
