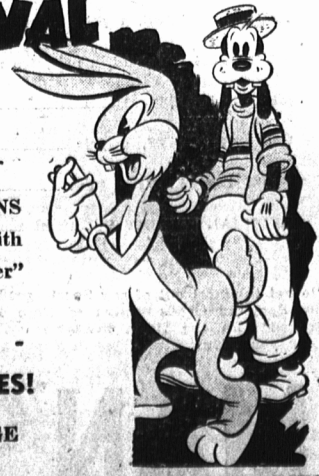

CAROL JOYCE CAMPBELL

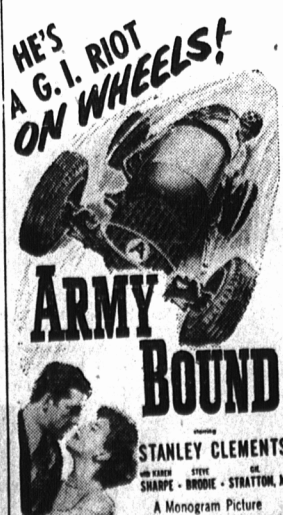
The death occurred at Milo on November 17, of Carol Joyce, only child of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Campbell at the age of two months.

IN MEMORIAM

MAURICE DALEY

...Seldom has news stirred such wide spread sympathy and shocked so deeply a community as that of the sudden death of Mr. Maurice Daley of St. Mary's Road which occurred on Thursday afternoon, November 20th.
That morning, apparently in his usual health, he had assisted at singing the funeral Mass of a dear neighbour who had also died suddenly. In the afternoon he went to a store several miles from home to transact some business. While conversing with the storekeeper he complained of not feeling well, and in a few moments collapsed and died instantly. As Father Mullally was at the time absent, Fr. McArdle of Montague was immediately summoned and administered the last rites of the church of which he was such a devout member.

Born at St. Mary's Road 59 years ago, one of a family of thirteen, the deceased was the son of the late Maurice Daley and his wife Cicely Landrigan. As a young man he went to Haverhill, Mass., where he spent several years. While there he married Jessie Jameson of Sturgeon. Returning later to St. Mary's Road he engaged in farming and with the help and encouragement of his wife built up a fine home which stands as a monument to his industry and thrift.

He was a splendid model of Catholic manhood, a devoted husband and father, a generous and charitable friend, who was always ready to lend a helping hand to the sick and those in need of assistance. He always took a prominent part in parish activities, and was a valued member of the church choir, and for the last number of years fine or stormy weather was present to sing the morning Mass.

His death brought genuine sorrow to his many friends but it is in the home where the void of his presence is most keenly felt. He loved his home and all who knew him will remember him for his hearty hospitality.

Surviving are his widow; one adopted son, Daniel, who flew home from his position as station agent at Galt, Ontario; three sisters, Frances, Mrs. Philip Creed of Sturgeon; Cicely of the Charlottetown Hospital staff, and Mrs. Mrs. Aubin Gallant, of Haverhill, Mass.; five brothers, Lawrence, Augustine and Edward, of St. Mary's Road; Stephen and William of Haverhill, Mass. The latter also was present at the funeral. A sister Margaret (Mrs. William Jameson) predeceased him in 1927; also another sister and two brothers many years ago.

The final chapter in his earthly career came to a close on Monday morning, November 24, when at St. Paul's Church, Sturgeon, a large concourse of people from far and near assembled to pay the last tribute of respect to one, whom all had learned to esteem and revere in life.

The parish priest, Rev. F. L. Mullally, celebrated the Requiem Mass and conducted the services at the grave. Present in the sanctuary were Rev. O. Kiggins of Georgetown and Rev. Wm. McCord of Montague. The choir was under the direction of Rev. Lawrence Landrigan assisted by John A. MacDonald of Cardigan and Eugene Dunn, Greenfield. The organist was William F. Steele of Montague.

The pallbearers were Alex Jameson, Leo Daley, John T. Landrigan, Philip Creed, James Farrell, and Nicholas Lannigan. Interment was in St. Paul's cemetery.
"May his soul rest in peace."
