

Anniversary Items.

WEDNESDAY, Dec. 3.—This is the anniversary of the death of Dr. Tait (Archbishop of Canterbury) in 1882. An Archbishop of Canterbury is Primate and Metropolitan of all England, and the first Peer in the realm, having precedence of all officers of state, and of all Dukes of the blood royal. Canterbury had formerly jurisdiction over Ireland, and the Archbishop was styled a Patriarch. This See has yielded to the Church of Rome 18 Saints and 9 Cardinals; and to the Civil State of England 12 Lord Chancellors and 4 Lord Treasurers. The Cathedral was sacked by the Danes anno 1011; burnt down 1067; rebuilt and finished 1130; again burned 1174; rebuilt 1178; the great central tower 1495. The gorgeous shrine of Becket was stripped at the Reformation, and his bones burnt. Both in 1872 and 1876 fire threatened the Cathedral.

SUDDEN DEATH.—Andrew H. King, proprietor of the stage line through Annapolis Valley before the opening of the Windsor & Annapolis Railway, died at his residence, Halifax, on the 1st inst., without warning. He was known to travellers and tourists all over the continent.

A DISPATCH received by Hon. L. C. Owen, from Capt. Leadwell, of the brig, Lauretta to-day, reports his vessel at Ship Harbor, and further that the Lucy Pope has passed through Canso to Georgetown. She had a stormy passage, and lost several stanchions.

A PARLIAMENTARY election was held in Down, Ireland, on the 29th ult. for the purpose of filling the vacancy caused by the succession of Viscount Castlereagh to the rights and titles of his father, the late Earl of Londonderry. The Conservatives carried the day, electing their candidate, Mr. Kerr. He received 4,387 votes, while Mr Crawford, the Liberal candidate, polled 3,998.

AT St. Andrew's Dinner on Monday night the Chairman read a telegram from James Coleman, Esq., Superintendent of the P. E. I. Railway, regretting that he could not be present, business having called him from the city that evening. A letter was also received from James Currie, Esq., Collector of Customs, expressing his regret at being unable to attend because of an urgent call to the country in connection with the duties of his department.

THE steamer Worcester, Capt. Allen, arrived from Boston this morning with freight and the following passengers: Miss Priscilla Morgan, F P Martin, Miss Mary McWade, Benjamin Beer, A Campbell and L Jones. Capt. Allen reports that at nine o'clock on Tuesday morning he passed the bark Lucy Pope at anchor off Sand Point, Canso, inward bound, and wished to be reported. Also passed the brig Zelica off Cape George, she also asked to be reported.

A FEATURE of the observance of Thanksgiving Day in Richmond Va., was a largely attended Thanksgiving supper given by the Union Democratic Club, at which a mammoth English plum pudding was served. The pudding weighed 219 pounds—one pound for each Cleveland electoral vote. An enthusiastic citizen paid \$15 for the privilege of cutting the first piece, weighing twelve pounds, representing the electoral vote of Virginia, to be sent to Gov. Cleveland. "Mite" boxes were distributed about the table, and a large amount of money was contributed for the poor of the city.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The British Navy.

LONDON, Dec. 2. In the House of Lords to-day Earl Northbrook, and in the Commons Sir Thomas Brassey, Secretary of the Admiralty, made statements regarding the British Navy. They showed it was largely superior to the French navy. The Government intend to build five new ironclads. The House of Commons has passed the naval estimates without division. The amount is £5,525,000.

The Redistribution Bill—Irish Opinions.

DUBLIN, Dec. 2. The Freeman's Journal considers the Redistribution Bill an equitable measure, and says that Gladstone has fulfilled his pledge. The Irish Times rejoices that the hearers of both parties were wise enough to create no new Irish grievance, and says their plan was consistent.

An Outraged Husband Taking Vengeance.

NEW YORK, Dec. 2. At Middle Village, L. I., yesterday, August Stellmacher attacked his wife, Barbara, and her paramour Wendolin Schier, with a razor, severely injuring the latter, and probably fatally wounding his wife. He was arrested.

A French Crisis Imminent.

PARIS, Dec. 2. The election of M. Garnier, Bonapartist to the deputies, the recent outwitting of the Government in the deputies, together with public discontent in relation to Chinese affairs, have revived the belief that a Cabinet crisis is imminent.

A Denial.

LONDON, Dec. 2. Mr. Lowell denies the report telegraphed from Vienna on the 27th ult. that he intended to resign.

The Panama Canal.

PARIS, Dec. 2. The estimated cost of the Panama canal is \$120,000,000. It is not known when the work will be completed.

In the month of August, 30 years ago, Mrs. Jane Patterson, of Ringgold, Ga., was bitten on the leg by a rattlesnake that had entered her room. Proper remedies were administered and she recovered for the time being, but in August of every year since then her limb has swollen and she has suffered great pain. In August of this year her sufferings returned, but did not abate as usual, and it was reported she was dying. Mrs. Patterson is the mother of twenty children, but none of them ever exhibited any symptoms of being inoculated with the poison.

GEORGIANA and Josephine Conway, sisters, aged 20 and 22, nieces of ex-Mayor Conway, of New Orleans, shot two young men on the street on the night of the 1st inst. Georgiana shot John L. Logan, son of an ex-alderman, and Josephine shot Joseph A. Devonshire, United States Deputy Marshal. The ladies claim to have been seduced by the men. Logan was shot in the back and the face, and fatally wounded. Devonshire was slightly wounded in the back. The ladies and their brother were arrested.

A LONDON chemist, in an analysis of the tea we drink, found that it contained "nut-galls, iron filings, fibert husks, sulphate of copper, hornets' nests, acetic acid, green paint, tar rope, desiccated door-mats, ammonia, stable sweepings, etc." This would seem to disprove the general belief that tea is adulterated, unless something of the kind may lurk in that suspicious "etc."—Norristown Herald.
