THE SECOND DAY.

Judging the Horses and Cattle.

Great Racing on the Trotting Park.

Clear, Cool Weather and Good Attendance.

The second day of the Provincial Exhibition was clear and cool—excellent for the Exhibition but rather too cool for the races. A moderate size large crowd was in attendance this forenoon, and the judging of the horses and cattle went on from an early hour. Unfortunately Professor Craig, of the Agricultural College, Madison, Wisconsin, who was engaged to judge the live stock, had not arrived. It is stated that he was delayed at St. John en route. Under these circumstances it became necessary to select local judges, who were appointed this morning as follows: For the beef cattle, G. C. Gardiner and Patrick Blake, milk breeds, Fred Macdonald, Glenalade, for sheep, Francis Belli for pigs, Richard Bagnall and George Madson. There is no objection to the knowledge and ability of the local judges selected; yet to avoid the slightest suspicion of prejudice, it is regretted that Prof. Craig is not present. The work given the judges to do was most difficult, there being as the competition in the various classes is larger and keener. The judging of the live stock and remainder of the forenoon in the presence of hundreds of spectators made the grounds lively the forenoon.

THE CHEESE AND BUTTER EXHIBIT.

The dairy exhibit is the largest ever shown at our Provincial Exhibition, and suggests much to the enquiring mind. To a casual observer, the forty-five fine, white cheeses, competing for four prizes, meant well, just forty-five cheeses, and nothing more. But to one interested in the industry which is now of paramount importance in this little "Isle of the Sea," it suggested, possibly, finer factories scattered over this fair Province, each with its complement of skilled workmen, who in a few hours, transform the rivers of milk that flow from the heavily-laden wagons into cheese which, commanding the highest price in the markets of the world, richly repay our farmers for their labor, and increase both their bank accounts and the value of their farms. Fifteen factories were represented. Cornwall did not compete, as Mr. C. J. Brown, manager of that factory, was appointed judge of the exhibit, which barred him from competition. Mr. Brown has had twenty-three years' experience in cheese-making, but it taxed his fine discernment, using all the utmost to determine which was most worthy of a prize, as the whole lot was a remarkably fine and even one, and the "boys" who failed to win more comfort than they could get from "it" came so near there was no fun in "it"—for the judge. As announced in the prize list Messrs. Head, Venning, Dwyer and Raly took prizes in the order named. The lot of home made cheese exhibited was a very creditable one indeed. In butter, the exhibit was large and the competition keen. The creamery butter from the Government dairy stations was exhibited for the first time. In tub butter, Crayford and Trigon Creameries, completed each showing "Gilt Edge" butter in large painted tubs which are coated on the inside with paraffine wax, and then with a paper lining paper, thus ensuring the butter from getting "off flavor" in the slightest degree. Two boxes of print butter from Crayford creamery were on exhibition, there being no class for prints. These boxes were very much admired for their neat, tasteful appearance and the "concentrated sunshine" which they contained evoked remarks such as "well, that looks nice, and it tastes better than it looks, for I've been using it right along, and intend to." The prints were brick-shaped, weighing one lb. each, and wrapped in paraffine paper, and bearing label, "Dominion of Canada Government Dairy Station."

In home-made butter the class was a large one, and the quality was excellent. In the class for "prints or rolls" Mr. Macdonald, Glenalade, exhibited a box of prints up in a similar manner to that of the Crayford Creamery. This is not Mr. Macdonald's first exhibit, and the high quality of his butter is well known. Messrs. T. J. Dillon, Dairy Superintendent and J. R. Moore were the judges, and they were surrounded by owners and friends of the butter undergone examination, who looked on, asked questions, and received pointers right through the chapter. Score cards were used, the maximum score being as follows: Flavor 45, Color 25, Grain 15, Salting 10, Packaging 10. These cards, with the number of points scored, are attached to each exhibit, and should be helpful to the makers. Those to whom, in a great measure, is due the rapid strides taken in dairying by the people of this province, have every reason to feel proud of the very creditable exhibit of cheese and butter at the Provincial Exhibition of 1894.

The number of passengers in the trains to-day compared favorably with that of former years. Lieutenant Governor Howland arrived at the races during the afternoon and was given a place on the judge's stand. All the cattle on the government stock farm, forty-three head, will be shown at exhibition grounds, tomorrow, and the number of upstarts of two hundred special exhibit of numerous pug dogs together, and the famous poor man's cow with her heifers is a great attraction for the young people.

RACES THIS AFTERNOON. The exhibition races were called at 1:30 this afternoon. The track is in good condition, with a strong wind from the north-east. The attendance of spectators is fairly large and constant, and increasing. The officials of the track are as follows: W. A. Whittier, Old Orchard Beach, (starter); James Tuplin, New Annap; A. A. Toosie took the lead at the start, but was overtaken by Fleetwood, who pushed Toosie hard from the half to the finish, but broke just before coming under the wire. The finish was close between Toosie and Isawood, the former winning by a few feet with Isawood second, Nyanus third, Fleetwood fourth, and Deceiver fifth. Time, 2:38. Second Heat—A start was effected on the fourth score. Toosie led from the start and was never headed, coming in the winner by about a length. Isawood and Nyanus made a good fight for second place, which was won by the latter by a few feet, with Nyanus second, Fleetwood fourth, and Deceiver fifth. Time, 2:35. Third Heat—The horses were started on the sixth score. Toosie broke at the first turn but soon regained her feet, and did not lose position. Toosie continued to lead, with Isawood close behind and the others close together until the three-quarter pole was reached, when she broke, and Isawood took first place, with Nyanus second. Isawood led to the finish, coming in several lengths ahead of Toosie, Fleetwood a good third, Nyanus fourth, and Deceiver fifth. Time, 2:44. Fourth Heat—The horses were sent off on the fourth score.
