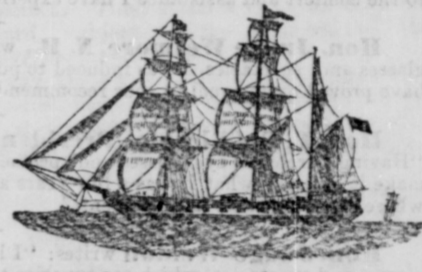

SIR CHARLES TUPPER, and the Hon. J. H. Pope, who will act as Minister of Railways during Sir Charles' absence, are now making a tour of inspection over the Intercolonial Railway.

THE gold fever has struck in at New Annapolis. Those who are interested in the new mines say that the quartz is just the same as that discovered lately at Cape Wolfe.

It is reported that Mrs. Langtry, the Jersey Lily, is to be married to Frederick Gebhardt as soon as a legal divorce can be obtained on the ground of abandonment on the part of her husband, Mr. Langtry.

THE Monahan firemen, while at practice the other evening, took advantage of the opportunity to give their Stipendiary Magistrate, who was driving along, a severe ducking.

AN exasperated hen in West Albany, N.Y., whose chickens were killed last week by rats, has adopted a litter of kittens, evidently intending to be prepared to bring up efficient warriors when the rats attack her next brood.

COL. HEWITT, of the Royal Military College, Kingston, has been appointed a companion of the order of St. Michael and St. George in recognition of his services in connection with the elaboration of schemes for the defence of the Western Ontario peninsula and of Halifax harbor.

JOHN DAY, at Woodstock, N. B., on the 29th ult., was instantly killed. He was underneath a heavy load of timber, which was supported in front by a stand and behind with the hind axle of the lumber wagon, and he was engaged in fixing the tongue of the wagon, when the stand fell and the load of lumber coming down on his head, instantly crushed him to death.

WAR between France and China is now almost certain. The latter has sent one of her best generals to the south for the purpose of organizing a strong army, which he will command in Tonquin.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Hanlan-Kennedy Boat Race.

BOSTON, June 1. In the great boat race between Hanlan and Kennedy, rowed yesterday afternoon, at Point of Pines, Hanlan won easily, defeating Kennedy by more than twenty boat lengths.

Treason-Felony.

LONDON, June 1. The Grand Jury returned True Bills against the London dynamite prisoners for treason-felony.

French and English Difficulties.

LONDON, June 1. In the event of war between France and China, Germany will support England in refusing to recognize the blockade of Chinese ports.

High Commissioner to England.

TORONTO, June 1. The Mail announces definitely that Sir Charles Tupper will succeed Sir Alexander Galt, as High Commissioner of Canada to England, and will, at the same time, retain his portfolio in the Dominion Cabinet.

Czar's Coronation Proclamation.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 1. The Proclamation made by the Czar on his coronation day has created a bad impression in St. Petersburg. Riots are continually occurring with fatal results.

Telegraph Notes.

Only one case of agrarian outrage against the person occurred in Ireland in the month of April.

Juror Field has been awarded £3,000 and the Huddys £500 compensation for the outrages to which they were subjected.

An intelligent London fish merchant has made a calculation showing that 72,000,000 oysters are annually consumed in London.

Kennedy Isbister, M. A. LL. D., who was instrumental in freeing British North America from the Hudson Bay Company, is dead.

Published statistics show that Germany, Austria, and Italy, can outweigh the whole remainder of Europe in naval and land forces.

A fire in the Pretloff iron works at St. Petersburg, caused a loss of 3,000,000 roubles. Among the work shops destroyed were those in which rails were made.

The losses at the fire at Lynchburg, Va., aggregated \$300,000; insurance \$100,000. Five men were killed, being buried under falling walls of the Virginian building.

An action of damages for \$10,000 has been taken against the C. P. Railway by Dame Mafreniere, of Montreal, on account of the death of her husband, who was killed some time ago at Hochelago.

The Roman Catholic bishops of the ecclesiastical Province of Quebec have, in a joint pastoral letter, ordered an annual collection at Pentecost throughout the province in aid of the Indian schools of the Northwest.

A very destructive tornado passed over the counties of Clay, Owen, Johnston and Shelby, Indiana, on Monday evening, unroofing houses and barns and uprooting trees and tearing up fences.

The Emperor and Empress attended the opera on the evening of the 30th. The scene in the Opera House was one of extraordinary splendor. The audience rose in a body and cheered as their Majesties entered.

A By-Law for Levying and Specifying the rate of an Assessment on Real Estate and Incomes in the City of Charlottetown.

BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows:— 1. The rate of Assessment for the year commencing the 1st day of January, A. D. 1883, and ending 31st December, A. D. 1883, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one cent and one-tenth of a cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate within the City of Charlottetown, according to the valuation of such Real Estate as assessed by the Assessors of the said City, in their valuation roll of such Real Estate, made and duly returned by them on the sixth day of April A.D. 1883.

2. The rate of Assessment for the year commencing the 1st day of January, A. D. 1883, and ending 31st day of December, A. D. 1883, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-tenth of a cent on every dollar of the amount of the net yearly income, salaries or receipts of all persons, partnerships, and corporations, as assessed by the Assessors of the said City, in their valuation rolls of such Income, made and duly returned by them on the sixth day of April A. D. 1883.

[Passed 19th May, 1883.]

A By-Law for allowing a rate discount on the Assessment on Real Estate and Incomes for the Current Year.

BE it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows:— 1. A discount at the rate of two and one-half per cent, shall be allowed to all taxpayers who shall, on or before the thirtieth day of June, A. D. 1883, pay to the City Clerk, at his office, the taxes severally due by them for the current year on Real Estate and Incomes.
