During the ceremony, Mrs. Zimmerman sang "The Wedding Prayer" and "The Song of Ruth" during the signing of the register. The bride, given in marriage by her father was in a floor length sheath of peau de faulle, overlaid with panels of lace, with the lace motif repeated to frame the scoop neckline and three quarter sleeves. The gown featured a billowing taffeta train, which flowed gracefully from a bow at the waist. Her elbow length, scalloped veil was held in place with a headpiece of

organza petals, trimmed with pearls. The bride wore a delicately engraved gold bell necklace, an heirloom sent by her maternal grandmother. She carried a bouquet of sweetheart roses.

Diane Roberts was maid of honor, and the three bridesmaids were Barbara Weale, sister of the bride, Carol Ann Graham, and Mary Calder. The attendants all wore floor length gowns of peau de sole identical in empire style, designed by the bride.
