WOMAN'S DELIGHT.

Heliotrope combined with red is another fashionable color mixture. Green, hyacinth blue and yellow is another French mélange.

Closely fitted basque bodices are made by many ladies' tailors in preference to either round waists, pointed bodices or Russian blouses.

A pale, rose colored silk bodice, trimmed with narrow black velvet ribbon and cut with a gray silk skirt.

All street, tailor and utility gowns are made to clear the ground all around, but those of every description are cut with a graceful demitain.

Many of the excessively large velvet hats have long ostrich feathers reaching to a great height and also stretching to a great width on the cart wheel brim.

To produce an appearance of slenderness where it does not exist and to emphasize slimmness where it is natural appears to be the aim of all dressmakers at present.

The rage for the Russian blouse will last all winter. Not only does the garment form a part of street costumes, but blouses and blouse effects appear on gowns and toilets both for demidress and full dress wear.

Black braids are very extensively employed to trim either black or colored gowns. Wide military braid laid out straight and flat is used, but elaborate designs carried out in fine black braid are more fashionable still.

Gray in lovely tones and semitones is surely one of the favored colors of the season, and the contrast between the soft, refined Quaker tints and the gorgeous colors which dominate in both dress and millinery is certainly very striking.

Coats single or double breasted are equally la mode, and many of them are decidedly longer than they have been, but with one and all outdoor garments the very high collar is indispensable. Indeed in dress as well as mantles there is a decided favoring of mediet styles.

Among new French gowns are models with princess backs, the breadth in continuous lengths from neck to skirt hem. These give a look of slenderness and length to even a stout figure. As these gowns fasten at the back, any number of bolero, Russian blouse, girdle, corseted and guimpe effects are introduced on the front of the bodice portion.—New York Post.

BEE BUZZES.

Every beekeeper should have a swarming box.

The first bees of a queen's laying will hatch out in 21 days.

In breeding bees the main points desired are usefulness and color.

Wherever a horticulturist can make a living a bee man can also.

Any queen cell after being sealed over can be hatched with artificial heat.

Natural queens are those raised by the bees under natural swarming impulses.

Queens raised artificially are considered as good as those raised from natural cells.

Natural queens can in no way be produced except under the swarming impulse.

If a hive is in good condition in every way, it is nearly always proof against robbers.

There are three classes of worker bees—house bees, wax workers and honey gatherers.

If the colony is weak and the brood chamber not at all full, there is no use putting in section boxes.

Wax is an elaborated substance and requires the consumption of 30 pounds of honey syrup to make one of wax.

Have the colonies strong. A weak colony will never make nice comb honey, no matter how liberal the honey flow.—St. Louis Republic.

Colonel Chandler, who is now Georgia's secretary of state, saved Neal Dow's life in Pensacola, Fla., when the latter, a prisoner of war, was assailed by an infuriated mob.

Philetus Sawyer, ex-senator from Wisconsin, recently celebrated his eighty-first birthday in Oshkosh and said to a friend, "I have many friends to reward and no enemies to punish."

Martin Irons, the great leader in the 1886 strike, has broken the silence of his retirement and now comes forth to champion the cause of Debs' Social Democracy. He is at work in Texas organizing clubs.

Mr. Charles Pollock, a nephew of Baron Pollock of the British high court of judicature, recently crossed the channel alone in a balloon, going from Eastbourne to a village near Abbeville in 6½ hours. He was not the first to perform the feat, however.

John W. Mackay, one of the California "bonanza kings," means to build in Greenwood cemetery, Brooklyn, a superb mortuary chapel, and he will have to get a dispensation from the Vatican before he can have it consecrated as a Roman Catholic place of sepulture should be.

A skating rink is a rather unique home annex, but John D. Rockefeller is going in for one. For some time workmen have been engaged on the west side of his West Forty-fourth street mansion in New York city laying out and asphaltting the grounds for a commodious skating pond.

Thomas L. Henry of Pine Station, Pa., died the other day, and his friends made preparations to give him a fine funeral. But the sad event has been indefinitely postponed owing to the fact that when they were about to put the old gentleman on ice he raised himself up, winked at the prettiest girl in the room and asked what time it was.

"For my part," said Colonel R. G. Ingersoll the other day, "I envy the man who has lived on the same broad acres from his boyhood, who cultivates the fields where in youth he played and lives where his father lived and died. I can imagine no sweeter way to end one's life than in the quiet of the country, out of the mad race for money, place and power."

THE WRITERS.

James Lane Allen, the novelist, will soon visit England.

The London World reports that Rudyard Kipling, who has been cycling in Dorsetshire with Thomas Hardy, is negotiating for the purchase of a house and grounds at Rodwell, near Dorchester.

Sir Edwin Arnold has further centented his marriage with his Japanese wife by having the marriage ceremony performed in English, according to the English law. The Japanese rite consists of the two people drinking a cup of tea.

W. S. Gilbert, the noted humorist, is the possessor of one of the most beautiful houses near London. The author of "Pinafore" always works in his library seated not at a desk, but in a comfortable armchair, with a writing pad on his knee.

Maurus Jokai has gifts of the tongue as well as of the pen. He was introduced to Kaiser Wilhelm when the latter visited Budapest, but was called away to speak to the Archduchess Maria Josef. Returning, he said in apology, "Your majesty must excuse me, but my allegiance to ladies comes even before my allegiance to monarchs."

PROGRESS.

A new wagon wrench has a screw clamp on one side, by which it is attached to the hub of the wheel, the wheel being turned around to unscrew the nut.

To assist in building wire fences a new device has a frame mounted on a wheel, with spindles to carry three or more reels of wire, so that all the wires can be strung at the same time.

A compound called naphthosalicin has been patented in France, intended as a disinfectant in laundries. It consists of naphthol and salicylic acid, rendered soluble in boiling water by borax.

To assist persons in escaping from a building on fire a chair is fitted with two frictional bearing plates operated by a hand lever to grip a rope as it slides through guides attached to the chair.

A recently patented water motor has an endless upright chain of buckets mounted on two axles, with a stream of water at the top to fill the buckets as they start down, the length of the chain determining the power of the motor.
