SHIPPING NOTES.—A Halifax despatch of the 17th says: Schooner Jacques, which arrived this morning from Charlottetown, was ashore at Marie Joseph, where she had her keel and part of her rudder damaged. She is now leaking badly.

Schooner Bony Young, for Boston from P. B. Island, put in here to-day for a harbor. Schooner Katie Stewart, before reported ashore on Pictou Island, got off after jettisoning part of her cargo.

FROM HALIFAX.—The steamer Coila arrived here from Halifax, via eastern ports, at 11 o'clock last night, bringing a general cargo. Captain Crews was in charge. Captain Macdonald having remained at Port Hwkesbury to look after the wrecked schooner Scylla. The steamer sails on return to Halifax via intermediate ports, this afternoon, taking a full cargo of potatoes, pork, oats and canned meats. The potato shippers are Carvell Bros., John Kelly & Co., and C. H. Selarman.

Nov 6—J. W. Smith, Beaver, 1125 bush potatoes, 217 bush turnips, 135 bush oats, and 700 lbs pork; Pioneer, Miller, 937 bush potatoes, 250 bush turnips, 30 bush oats, and 85 head cabbage; Mary Margaret, Cahoon, 617 bush potatoes and 43 bush turnips.

Nov 10—William Taylor, Hume, 1470 bush potatoes, 130 bush turnips, 500 bush oats, 1320 lbs beets and 373 lbs carrots; Julia A. McKinnon, 600 bush potatoes; Evangeline, Baker, 700 bush potatoes and 240 bush turnips.

Nov 11—Carrie C. W. Westover, 2100 bush potatoes, 1000 bush oats, and 600 bush turnips.

There are now four vessels loading. The roads, after that spell of wet weather, were in a shocking condition; but on account of the fine weather which we are now having they are becoming dry and firm, thus giving the farmer, living at a distance, a better advantage to bring his produce to market.

Prowse & Sons closed their starch factory on Thursday. They have undoubtedly received a fair share of potatoes this season—46,000 bushels. They have also a mutton factory in operation. Up to this date they have put up 500 cases. For the starch there seems to be a fair demand, but for the sale of mutton the prospects, as far as can be ascertained, are rather unfavorable.

The telephone communication to this place and the money and the office are undoubtedly two great advantages to the people. Our popular and efficient postmaster, J. R. Prowse, superintends both; and I will say, without partiality, that one more courteous and impartial could not be found among our citizens to perform the duties of his office.

The next thing we need is a railway, and why should we not obtain it? We are now taxed for the railway which extends over various parts of the island, and have no real benefit from it. This is certainly unfair. People leaving here for Boston, say it is as difficult to get from Murray Harbor South to Charlottetown as it is from that to Boston. Why should this be the case? This question has been agitated before, and I do hope to see it meet due consideration in the near future.—Cos Nov. 15, 1890.

Mr. Parnell's Case.

OPINION IN HIS FAVOR.

DUBLIN, Nov. 18.

A meeting of the National League was held in this city to-day. Edmund Leamy, M. P. for South Sligo, presided. Leamy made an address in which he said Parnell was the chosen leader of the party, and the party would stand by him while he stood by them. He would lead the party in combating Parliament during the coming session. The Irish people would be more than ever devoted to him.

John Redmond, member of the House of Commons for North Wexford, indicated the idea of Parnell being prejudiced in politics by the verdict in the O'Shea case. Never in the career of the Nationalists were the members of the party more determined to stand by Parnell. Redmond's remarks were greeted with cheers.

Joseph Penny, M. P. for South Cork, and other leaders, spoke in a similar strain.

MORE DIFFICULTIES.

The Baring Guarantee Fund.

LONDON, Nov. 18.

The leading Scotch banks have subscribed £250,000 each for the Baring guarantee fund. The scope of the fund and the period over which it will extend are still undefined. The debts will be settled according to circumstances. A committee of the leading financial houses has been formed to investigate the condition of the Argentine Republic finances.

LONDON, Nov. 18.

It is rumored that another prominent banking firm is in difficulties owing to its inability to discount maturing bills.

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.

The stock market opened quiet with prices quite irregular, but there was no excitement. Prices were sustained. P. W. Gallandet at 10:45 o'clock announced his failure on the Stock Exchange. Liabilities, \$1,000,000.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Nov. 18.

Mr. Walsh, government engineer of Antigua, leaves for the Maritime Provinces to-morrow, en route homewards. While here he had several interviews with the government on reciprocal trade matters, and intends taking home a number of skilled mechanics to superintend the piers, wharves, etc., now under construction there.

Rev. Mr. Jemmett, Episcopal clergyman, dropped dead while shopping to-day.

Imported Smallpox.

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.

After returning from the steamship La Normandie at quarantine this morning the boarding officer stated that smallpox was on the vessel, and she would be detained for examination and fumigation. She has 430 immigrants in the steerage.

MONTREAL, Nov. 18.

Bishop Bond, of this diocese, who was ordained here fifty years ago after doing good work as a teacher in Newfoundland, will celebrate his anniversary to-morrow. His Lordship will be presented with a check for \$4,000.

Not Guilty.

BANGOR, Me., Nov. 18.

The jury in the Biddford Aldermens case returned a verdict of "not guilty." The Aldermen recognized for their appearance at the next term of the Court to answer to other indictments if the Government sees fit to press them.

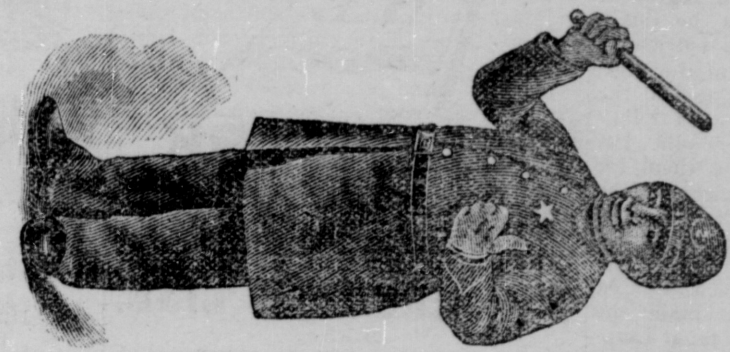
