THE ASYLUM AGAIN.

It is pleasing to have an assurance from Dr. Blanchard that he visits the Hospital for the Insane once a day, and sometimes twice—Sundays excepted,—even though it was obtained only upon a presentment of the Grand Inquest of Queen's County. The Doctor states that he keeps a record of every case admitted to the Hospital, "showing the daily condition of each patient," etc. What is still needed is an official record of the doctor's visits and the length thereof,—so that persons interested, and having access to the Doctor's record of cases, may be assured that patients requiring medical attention receive it. That curable patients shall be cured, is what their relatives and friends expect and what the public demands. Dr. Blanchard receives a salary of \$1,000 per year; and it need not be said that a mere visit once a day, sometimes twice, without substantial results in the form of cures, is not a satisfactory return for the money. We do not mean to say that Dr. Blanchard should devote all his time and skill to the Hospital for the sake of \$1,000 a year, or that he should be present in the Hospital during certain hours of each day. The Medical Superintendent of the Hospital holds a highly responsible position, and may well claim a freedom of action denied to other servants of the public. But he ought, certainly, when a curable or doubtful case is placed under his care, to give it careful attention and sympathetic interest until develops into a cure or deepens into confirmed lunacy.

The statements of THE EXAMINER as to the need of room in the Hospital are borne out and confirmed by the Grand Jury. But the leaderless spoilsman now in charge of the public offices can, of course, do nothing towards correcting the blunders that have been made in that regard. The interests of our lunatics are as nothing in comparison with those of our Liberals who occupy public positions for the sake of the salaries attached thereto.

REFORMING THE SENATE.

THE Patriot reports, without comment, that "Joseph Arthur Paquet, Esquire, of the City of Quebec, has been appointed a Senator for the Electoral Division of La Salle, in the Province of Quebec." This Paquet, if we mistake not, was the leading genius of the Baie Chaleur Railway Scandal—the most corrupt job ever exposed in Canada. It is thus that our Liberals reform the Senate! Such Liberal as David Laird are relegated to little commissionships about penitentiaries. The honorable and responsible representative positions are kept for such gentlemen as Paquet.

BAY VIEW AND OTHER NOTES.

Dominion Day passed off quiet y here. A few went over to Stroud to the races. There was one picnic down at Cavendish Capes. The Cavendish school children had a group picture taken. Miss Annie Clark, of Bay View, was the artist.

There is at present an epidemic of matrimony in Rev. G. C. Robertson's congregation,—two weddings some days. He expects to make seven or eight couples happy in the course of a week. The boys are honoring these occasions with charities. In Cavendish a few nights ago a large number of the boys who had a wedding, were treated to cake and shock hands with the bride, and on their way back to Stanley smashed up all of the milk stands en route.

W. H. Pethick, V. S., gave a very interesting address in Stanley Hall a few days ago on tuberculosis. He described this disease in cattle as being the same as consumption in the human being, and explained how it is diagnosed by the "tuberculin test." Mr Pethick said that in his duties as Government Inspector of tuberculosis he has not found many cases of it on the I-land. He tested a herd for Mr. Woodside at Clinton lately that the owner was suspicious of but they gave no reaction from the test and were pronounced healthy. He also spoke of another disease which he says he finds more prevalent "Actinomyces" or Lump Jaw. This is also a germ disease that he stated to be contagious among cattle, and the meat from cattle affected with it would be condemned by an inspector.

The half-yearly examination of Bay View school was held on Thursday, the 30th of June. The scholars acquitted themselves well. All of the visitors present expressed themselves as well satisfied with the progress made during the term. Mr. H. S. McLeure, of North Rustico, who has been in charge for the last two years, has been engaged for another year.
