PAID BRIEF VISIT - Mr. R. B. Perrault, President of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, Montreal, and Mr. Alfred Parks, manager of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce and executive secretary of the Maritime Boards of Trade, left at noon yesterday after a short visit to the Province. Tuesday night Mr. Perrault addressed the Council of the Charlottetown Board of Trade and representatives of other Boards throughout the Province.

He spoke on "the economic future of Canada. Yesterday the visitors called on Premier J. Walter Jones and Mayor J.D. Stewart. They were accompanied by Mr. Frank Curtis, president of the Maritime Boards of Trade and Mr. J. Gordon MacDonald, president of the Charlottetown Board of Trade.

COUNTY MAGISTRATE'S COURT - In Queen's County Magistrate's Court, before Mr. Gilbert A. Gaudet, a City resident pleaded guilty of failing to stop at a stop sign near Vernon and was fined \$5 and costs or ten days, and a resident of Pleasant Grove found guilty of operating a motor vehicle near Marshfield without having first obtained a driver's licence was fined \$5 and costs or 10 days and a resident of Kinkora for speeding near Cherry Valley was fined \$10 and costs or 20 days, while a similar offender from East Royalty for speeding near Hunter River, was fined \$10 and costs or 10 days. A resident of the city was fined \$10 and costs or 20 days for operating a commercial motor vehicle near Galedonia with a load in excess of that authorized. Under the Temperance Act, a resident of the city was sentenced to 20 and costs or 30 days for consuming alcoholic liquor in or near a motor vehicle on North River Road, and for having in his possession intoxicating liquor not procured from a Vendor, a resident of Lewis was fined \$25 and costs or 30 days.

IN MEMORIAM

CLIFFORD GLENN MacQUARRIE The relatives and many friends of Clifford Glenn MacQuarrie were shocked and grieved to learn of his sudden and tragic death which occurred as the result of a plane crash at Cartwright, Labrador, May 18, 1952.

Clifford, intimately known to his friends as "Huck", was born at Victoria, Prince Edward Island, October 19, 1914, the son of Mrs. MacQuarrie and the late Wilfred MacQuarrie. Possessed of a happy and fun-loving disposition, Huck was a friend of old and young alike and will be sadly missed but long remembered by all who knew him. Prior to the Second World War, he was engaged in the fishing industry and was active in the community life of his native village. He served in the R. C. A. F. for four years and upon completion of his war services, returned to Victoria where he entered into partnership with his brother Scott in the operation of a garage.

In the autumn of 1951 he was employed by Maritime Central Airways, Charlottetown, as a mechanic and was later promoted to flight engineer in which capacity he was serving at the time of his death. He leaves to mourn besides his mother and aunt, Agnes Mallard,

with whom he resided in Charlottetown, a sister, Mrs. A. C. Smith, Malden, Mass.; and the following brothers: William of Wakefield, Mass., Scott, employee of Maritime Central Airways, Charlottetown, and Heath, a professor at Brandon College, Brandon, Manitoba. The funeral, which was very largely attended, was held on Friday, May 23rd. Services were conducted by Reverend J. Harvey Bishop assisted by Reverend L. S. Woolfrey at the MacLean Funeral Home, Charlottetown, and the United Church, Victoria. Reverend Mr. Bishop spoke very feelingly and brought words of comforting assurance to the bereaved family and friends. Members of the Victoria branch of the Canadian Legion B. E. S. L.

attended in a body and the Legion burial service was read at the grave. Interment took place in Crapaud cemetery. The pallbearers were: John Knox, William Crawford, James Boulter Jr., Lester MacLeod, Ralph Miller, Lynn Wood.
