

**Toronto Airport
Busiest in '63**

OTTAWA (CP)—Toronto International Airport was the busiest in Canada in 1963. For the fifth consecutive year, the Toronto airport had more planes taking off and landing than any other airport in the country.

The federal transport department said 80,002 take-offs and landings were clocked last year compared with 80,376 in 1962. The figures do not include local traffic remaining under tower control.

Behind Toronto was Montreal International Airport, with 40,831 aircraft movements compared with 42,441 in 1962. It was the fourth straight year that Montreal held second place.

Ranking behind the two big airports were, with 1962 figures in brackets:

Vancouver International Airport, 72,881 take-offs and landings, (67,237); Winnipeg International, 64,763 (61,790); Ottawa, 61,555 (58,569); Calgary, 57,044 (53,916); Edmonton, 46,810; (44,110); Charlevoix, Que., 41,277 (39,353); Toronto Island, 32,442 (26,862); and Victoria, 20,964 (31,293).

Dick Cullen is spending some time in the city with Mr. and Mrs. Charlie MacDonald, following his serious illness.

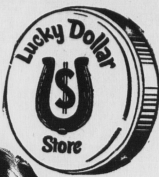
The condition of Harold Douglas in the Charlottetown hospital where he has been for two months remains poorly. Mr. Douglas has suffered several heart attacks.

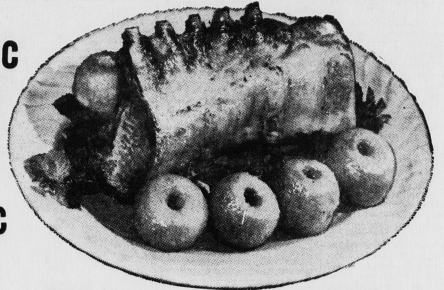
