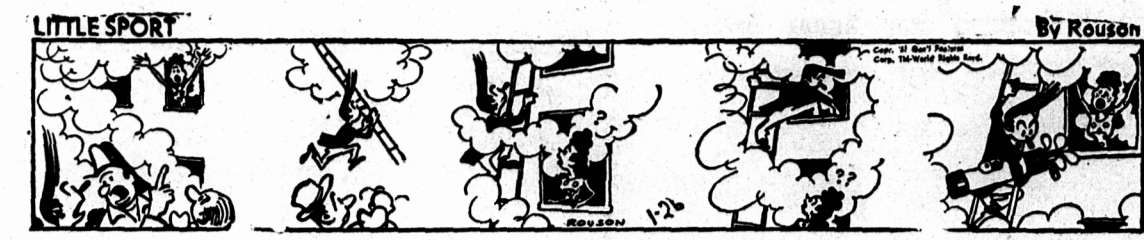

**Five-Goal Splurge In  
2nd Period Gives Halifax  
6-2 Victory Over Beavers**

HALIFAX, Jan. 25—(CP)—Halifax St. John's Beavers whipped Saint John's Beavers 6-2 tonight to boost their margin to seven points over the third place New Brunswick club in the Maritime Senior Hockey standing. Five goals in the second period when they ran through the Beavers as they pleased gave the Saints their lead.

It was a hot and cold hockey game with most of the thrills coming in the last 10 minutes of the third frame when the game opened wide. The Saints were never behind but it took a starchy job of net minding by Eddie D'Aoust in the third stanza to hold off the hard-pressing Beavers.

Irish had a slim edge in the first frame when the clubs divided a brace of goals. In the second, the Halifax defence was so tight that Beavers were able to get only one shot at the Halifax net. D'Aoust fanned on the drive but it was the only time during the game that he looked bad.

In the scoreless third period, both clubs were balked by the stellar net minding of the rival goalies.

Bill Watson, apparently back in form after a three weeks layoff, fired two goals for the Saints, both of them smart efforts. Bill Hughie Campbell also scored two goals coming within seven seconds in the big Halifax second frame. Bill Ford and Pat Powers were the other Halifax snipers. For Saint John, Roger Jodoin and Buck Whitlock were the marksmen.

Cape Breton referee Frank Elliott and Charlie Good handled the game. While it wasn't a hard game to work, they looked good except on offside.

The Islanders splurge didn't end the period scoring, however. Fast-breaking attacks by Beavers paid off with two more goals, and another powerful attack by the locals saw the period end 4-3 for Islanders. One goal by Saint John in a tightly contested third canto that tied the score 5-5, and another in a rousing overtime frame gave the visitors a well-earned win. The payoff goal was also from an open break after Islanders had hammered around the Saint John cage for nearly nine minutes of the extra canto.

For the first time this season local fans saw the Islanders defence a bit lacking and wobbly, which was one of the big reasons why Beavers made the most of the breaks. The other was too many useless penalties. They didn't check like they usually do, and two or three errors in judgement cost them goals. In a brief talk with big Phil Vitale yesterday, he was the first to admit that he wasn't up to par. Phil of course elected to blame the whole show on himself—always ready to go to bat for the rest of the team whether it be a fight or a mistake—but it was not just Phil alone. None of the defence seemed to be clicking together.

Vitale takes the responsibility for two goals against the Islanders himself. Well there is no doubt that he was at least partly responsible. One was on that first goal when he moved out of position to assist Larry Travis in blocking Carnegie coming in over the blueline. They got a big Ossie alright, but it left Buck Whitlock wide open for a pass and a clean break in on Hal Gordon. The other was that slick effort by Whitlock in the second period when he soloed from centre ice on Nicolle's pass. Driving right in over the Islanders blueline, Whitlock split the defence as slick as a whistle to beat Gordon cleanly.

But when one thinks of all the standout performances that the Islanders defence have turned in this season, it was due to happen sooner or later, one tends to shy away from any criticism of such a fine blueline corps for the sake of one bad performance, and you can take it from any local fan, it has been their first. They are the kind of boys who profit by their mistakes, and if they all take the same attitude as Vitale does, then you can figure that it is their first and last performance like that for the season.

NEW YORK, Jan. 25—(AP)—Cuban Kid Gavilan, ranking welter contender, moves against Paddy Young, left-hooking middleweight thumper, tomorrow night in a 10-round natural at Madison Square Garden.

It adds up to quite a fight on paper. First they made Young a 6 to 5 favorite. Now it looks as if the Cuban kid will be 7 to 5 favorite at ringtime. The bout at 10 P. M. EST will be broadcast and televised.

Gavilan is the boy taking the chance in this match. The kid is engaged in a series of welterweight elimination bouts on the premise that Ray Robinson will abdicate after the Jake La Motta fight at Chicago, Feb. 14.

March 14 Chicago bout between Gavilan and Johnny Bratton could be ruined by a one-sided loss or injury.

The weights will favor Young, a stout Irishman from New York's Greenwich Village. Paddy, a legitimate middleweight, will come in at about 155. Gavilan is expected to hit 149.

Gavilan fights them all—lightweights, welter or middles. He met Ike Williams three times, Ray Robinson twice and Laurent Dauthuille and Robert Villemain. Put the dough on the line and the kid will be there.

Young, loser on a close decision to Dauthuille in his last Garden start, Nov. 10, is the people's choice down in Greenwich Village. He recently sold his ice cream store in the village to concentrate on fighting.
